### Nick Woolford on his Fulham FC friend Karl Schmitt

oday's match is sponsored by our generous long-time supporter Nick Woolford in

memory of his friend of almost 50 years, Karl Schmitt. Karl (right), a Fulham season ticket holder, died suddenly just three months ago at the age of 66.

Nick writes... "I met Karl in the summer of 1968 when we started work together, fresh out of school, at at the

British shipping company, Athel Line Limited (a subsidiary of Tate & Lyle) which operated a fleet of tankers, mostly dedicated to carrying molasses. Although we were in different departments we were thrown together by the company at its insistence that we attend night school to study for the membership examinations to

the Institute of Chartered Shipbrokers. This did not go down

well with either of us a we had only recently escaped the school environment - so when Karl suggested one Wednesday evening that we skipped the lecture on Marine Insurance and go to Highbury instead to see Arsenal in some European match, I iumped at the sug-



It was the very first football match that I had attended and I was instantly hooked! My passion for football remains as strong today as it was then, and so my lifetime devotion to football (and Wealdstone) is all Karl's fault!

I kept him informed by text of

every Wealdstone game I attended and we would have a bit of banter about the results on a Monday morning.

He was a season ticket holder at Craven Cottage for about 15 years but started out as a Tottenham fan, switching allegiance when he found that he couldn't stomach

something that Lord Sugar did! He's the only person I have known to change teams like that.

Unfortunately, when you read this I shall be in France with my grandchildren, but hopefully Karl's family will be attending today: his widow, Sonya, his brother, Geoff, and his two sons, Mark and Paul.

We did a lot of business together and I spoke with Karl every working day, sometimes three of four times a day.

I miss him terribly."

Where do you live? Borough of Hillingdon - all my life.

Are you working, and where? Work for one of the big accounrancy firms in central London. I've worked there 14 years.

First Stones game attended? I think it was the last game of the 1989/90 season v Moor Green at Lower Mead, but the first Wealdstone programme I have is from 30/10/1990, Wealdstone v Burnham in the Larchimage Windows Cup 1st Round 2nd Leg according to my list!

What or who persuaded you to become a Stones fan? I went along with school friends as I was too young to go to watch Fulham (my other team) on my own.

**Do you follow any other team?** Yes - Fulham, my first game was 1980ish, then a regular from 1983-1986 and a season ticket holder since 1993 (I was old enough to go on my own then)!

Do you prefer lower-League football? It has its positives and it's negatives!

**Any disadvantages?** Lots, but that adds to the charm sometimes....

How do you fit watching football, and Wealdstone, into your family/working life? I am 'young', free & single so can go where I want when I want... although Fulham and Stones home games did clash a lot last season. I only really go to Fulham games at The Cottage, otherwise it's Wealdstone home and a select few away games... but if a cracking music gig comes up mid-week I might miss the football completely althought that's only happened a

few times so far!

Who are your favourite bands/ style of music? I mainly follow the blues circuit which is far from being the 'blues' and is jam-packed with talent. I also help James Klarfeld with the fundraising gigs at the club and the Tropic on occasions. Favourite live act at the moment is the awesome Rebecca Downes, go check her band out!!

How big a part of your life is the game? A big part, been to well over 1,000 games but equally I don't tend to get sucked into the crazy emotion that seems to linger for days on end with some fans. Once the game is over, it's over, move on to the next one. As I also attend over 100 music gigs a year there is not the time or inclination to

### Rugby League and a Cup semi-final: The Stones- Fulham tie is a tenuous one



WHEN WE LAST MET

ention the name 'Fulham' to your average Wealdstone fan and you'll get one of two reactions.

(I'm talking about long-in-thetooth Stones fans here, not necessarily those who've been watching us since the Ruislip days).

It'll either be: 'Didn't we have the Fulham Rugby League side playing at Lower Mead a few times, back in the 80s?' or 'Don't mention Fulham to me! That was the worst-ever day to be a Wealdstone fan, when we lost 2-0 to Chesham United in the Amateur Cup semi-final at Craven Cottage'.

To be honest, there can't be more than a few dozen current fans who were at Fulham on that Godawful day back in 1968. And those that recall the defeat to little Chesham United (who were at least three divisions below the Stones in amateur football's pecking order half a century ago) can't really pin any blame on Fulham who simply had the misfortune to host the semi-final.

So are there really no other connections between our two clubs?

We've certainly only played the Cottagers a handful of times over the years, and not once in a competitive game. In pre-season 1927, the Stones faced a Fulham 'A' side at Lower Mead and won 5-4... and there was another thriller in August 1938 when the Stones again beat the West Londoners' 'A' side 4-3.

That preceded a great season for the talented Wealdstone side. They finished third in the powerful Athenian League, behind champions Walthamstow Avenue and runners-up Romford, but then war was declared in the summer of 1939. Competitive football was suspended, only to recommence in the autumn in the form of hastilyarranged friendlies. The Stones found themselves playing teams as diverse as Chelsea Reserves, Brentford, Dartford, Cambridge University, Crystal Palace, Gillingham, Tunbridge Wells, Woking... and Fulham.

The teams were made up of whoever was available depending on call-ups for National Service, and where the players were stationed but it was two strong teams when Fulham met the Stones at Lower Mead on December 2nd, 1939.

In front of a crowd of several thousand, it was a welcome distraction for a war-worried population as the Stones chalked up an exciting 4-3 win with right-back Charlie Barker scoring twice and skipper Charlie Bunce and Schofield the others. Barker played for the club for over 10 years and had an amazing scor-

ing record for a No.3 - largely due to his devastating penalty kicks. He scored 140 spot kicks for the Stones and missed only four!

Centre-forward Bunce was the star of the show that first wartime season, however, scoring 58 goals in 40 games. He enlisted into the Army in the summer of 1940, telling friends that he'd be back in a Wealdstone shirt in no time - but there was terrible news within the year when news came back that he had died as a prisoner of war in Malaysia.

Two other members of that team, Bill Parr and Ken Baldwin, also lost their lives later in the war.

Two years after the end of hostilities, the two clubs met again in an end-of-season friendly in May 1947 with a Fulham Reserve side running out 2-1 winners at Lower Mead. Charlie Barker again netted our goal from the spot.

hen came a wait of 35 years until the Cottagers once again visited Lower Mead: Saturday August 7, 1982.

It was an intriguing clash. Fulham put out pretty much a full-strength side - the one that had just won promotion back to Division Two - while the Stones were on an absolute high having won the Southern League South, the Southern League Cup, the Southern Challenge Shield and the Southern League Champions Trophy on the way to promotion back to the Alliance Premier League (today's Conference National).

Allen Batsford had lined up a tough list of pre-season opposition (all at Lower Mead) but the super-confident Stones drew with Wimbledon( who ended up Div 4 champions), beat Second Division sides Charlton Athletic and Crystal Palace both by 2-1... before ending up drawing 2-2 with Malcolm Macdonald's Fulham.

The Cottagers were no mugs: they had just signed Ray Houghton from West Ham (astonishingly on a free transfer) and had a team studded with solid pros like Tony Gale and Ray Lewington, while Gordon Davies and Dean Coney provided the threat up front. I remember Gerry Peyton, the experienced Irish Republic international, played in goal for Fulham that day half a dozen years after he had faced us as a youngster for Atherstone in the Southern League.

But he was helpless to prevent the Stones coming from behind to force a 2-2 draw with Nigel Johnson and Ray Knowles-the-Goals hitting the net. What an interesting team that was... Ray Goddard in goal, Steve Perkins and Stuart Pearce the full-backs; Paul Bowgett and Dennis Byatt rock solid in the middle; Gary Churchouse, Robin Wainwright and Johnson in midfield and new signing Mark Graves, triallist John Peachey and Knowles up front. Midfielder Paul Waites was on the bench.

Alan and Neil Cordice were unavailable, and Roy Davies and Fred Barwick saved for the first league game at Altrincham the following Saturday so it was an intriguing look at the former Plymouth Argyle pair of Graves and Peachey.

# 35 years ago and what a forward line..Knowles, Graves & Peachey. Who?

Gravesey would, of course, go on to become a Stones goalscoring legend but it wasn't until I googled the mysterious Peachey that I realised they had played in the same side at Home Park.

The 30-year-old Peachey had scored a decent number of goals for Barnsley and Darlington in a bit of a journeyman career, and it appeared to be a toss-up as to who Batsford would sign to pad out his thin squad. The manager was well known for only wanting a 15 or 16 players maximum - but happily it was the 21-year-old Graves who got the nod despite only netting once in pre-season.

What happened to John Peachey (pictured right)? He was next seen playing for Barnstaple Town in the Western League and (according to Google) ended his career in the north as coach at Ossett Albion.

And what about Fulham under Supermac? Midfielder Ray

Lewington described him as 'very laid back, while coach Ray Harford was the hard man', and that combination pushed high-scoring Fulham up Division Two until they reached the last game of the season within reach of the top division.

But their threadbare squad, which had lost three games in a row in April, lost their last game 1-0 at Derby County in controversial circumstances - Derby had to win to stay up and the jubilant Baseball Ground crowd swarmed onto the pitch before the final

whistle thinking the game was over. Several Fulham players were bruised and battered as they sought refuge in the changing rooms - and after the referee had at first told Fulham they would have to return to play out the final few minutes, he later changed his mind under police advice.

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Poor Fulham were left in limbo. They were left waiting to see if the FA would order the game to be finished behind closed doors and carried on training for a week after the season had finished, just in case... only to find out the FA's decision was to

let the result stand. Fulham therefore missed out, finishing one point behind the third promoted club, Leicester. QPR had won Division Two with Wolves runners-up.

As for the Stones... well it was a glorious return to non-League's top flight. Former Fulham maestro John Margerrison signed

for Batsford early in the new year and the superbly balanced squad - with the pace and power of the Cordices allied to the guile of Davies, Graves, Wainwright and Margerrison, backed by the solidity of Byatt, Bowgett, Pearce, Barwick and Perkins - pushed eventual champions Enfield and Maidstone United all the way.

We finished third to build the platform that would eventually carry the club to its unprecedented double, two years down the line.
