It took us twenty four minutes to earn our first corner, but as the half wore on we enjoyed more of the exchanges. Wealdstone could very well have gone into the lead on the half-hour when Bill Byrne put one over the bar, with the home defence caught flat-footed. We were checked, however, when Legg put the home side ahead, eight minutes before halftime, to round off a neat approach by the Bath attack.

The second half followed the pattern of the first session, and although we enjoyed a larger share of the exchanges, Tinsley, the home striker put the issue beyond doubt with some twenty four minutes remaining. Dyson replaced the injured Watson in the closing stages, but the home team maintained the initiative. Even the most partisan "Stones" supporter had to concede that Bath were worth winners, on the day. It was a pity that they decided to make some of the exchanges a little more rugged than the occasion demanded, and three names from the home team ended in the referee's notebook, to match the booking of Ray Fulton. Ray was unlucky to be penalised for what looked like an innocuous effort to gain

possession. And so on to this evening. We welcome our visitors from Canterbury, for today's encounter, and trust that they have an enjoyable visit, but we shall be in a resolute mood following Saturday's setback. We would gently remind them that the benefits of pilgrimages usually arise from visits to
