Late agony for Stones after Sutton setback

WEALDSTONE boss Gordon Bartlett believes his team deserved better after two late goals condemned them to a dramatic defeat at Ryman Premier leaders Sutton United.

The Stones were on the brink of a 3-2 win at United on Saturday before they were stunned at the death. Their disappointment continued after a 5-3 penalty shootout defeat to Wingate and Finchley on Monday night in the Championship Manager Cup.

Bartlett said: "I thought we were very good on Saturday and we thoroughly deserved to get a win let alone draw. To concede two goals

in injury time was a bit of a body blow.

"Once again, the work ethic of the players was outstanding. We went to the top team in the league and we were better than them. It was a bitter disappointment for the lads and they didn't deserve it. I could not see them scoring a second goal let alone four. We had a great opportunity to beat the league leaders and their experience just won

Two goals in the space of six minutes from midfielder Alex Dyer fired Wealdstone into a 2-0 lead at Sutton. But the pace-setters pulled

one back on the stroke of half time through Andy Forbes.

Danny Spendlove made it 3-1 before James Hammond put the ball past his own goalkeeper. With 89 minutes played, Simon Downer grabbed an equaliser and Sam Page headed home in the 95th minute to complete a sickening finish for the Stones.

Wealdstone created countless opportunities against Wingate and Finchley but only had goals from Kieron Forbes and Martin Carter to show for their efforts. The team's misses proved costly as Dyer's penalty was saved and the Stones were dumped out of the competition.

Bartlett said: "We probably should have sown it up after half an hour when we could have scored five or six goals. Some of our football was a pleasure to watch but we were guilty of overplaying. We wanted to look pretty rather than being effective. We needed that killer instinct.

"I don't think we have any major problems. We just need to be a little more clinical and professional.
