new challenge. There's already been lots of phone calls. Most people think this is a rest time but it's probably the busiest time of the year in

terms of talking to players."

He added: "There are an awful lot of players available after being released by professional clubs and the next two months are going to be very important.

'I'm expecting it to be pretty busy and it's important that we talk and lay the foundations on board.

The next two months extremely important for what happens in the second week of August.

"I would like to keep the nucleus of the squad together but we also need to make good additions. We have to make sure we're ready for a much harder campaign next year.

"We have to set our stall out a lit-tle bit higher. This is a new environment and we're going into the unknown because we haven't played in the Conference South before.
