STONES: Fifth straight home win takes side 10th

Wealdstone tear up form book to beat Truro City

WEALDSTONE settled better into conditions more suited to a sailing competition as Abobaker Eisa's double gave them a wind-battered 2-1 win over Truro City at Grosvenor Vale.

The Stones were two goals up before the break through Eisa's quickfire brace, with both goals seeing him double his league tally.

Tyler Harvey's late consolation gave manager Bobby Wilkinson a fright as Truro tried in vain to protect their 10-game unbeaten streak.

But instead Wealdstone moved to 10th, four points off the play-offs, on the back of a fifth straight home win

Storm Brian added an extra element to proceedings at the Vale, where Wilkinson made three changes from the stalemate at Chippenham, including a recall for Eisa following some eye-catching performances from the bench.

The conditions took some getting used to for both sides, and it was 22 minutes in before the first chance would fall for Truro, but Jonathan North stood tall to deny Cody

Cooke from close-range.

The slow start was only a smokescreen, it appeared, when Wealdstone took the lead five minutes later.

Truro goalkeeper Tom McHale misjudged the lightning pace of Eisa and the forward robbed him as he attempted to shield the ball out of play, before slotting in from a tight angle.

Two minutes later the wind could claim an assist for his second, as a clearance boomeranged back goalwards and to the feet of Eisa again, and he tapped home gleefully.

The conditions favoured Truro after half-time, and the visitors were denied several times by North, with Cooke, Alex Hartridge and River Allen all kept out. Danny Green's free-kick and

Danny Green's free-kick and Shaquille Hippolyte-Patrick kept McHale busy at the other end, as the game became increasingly endto-end despite Storm Brian's best efforts.

With nine minutes to go Truro gave themselves a lifeline, when Harvey beat North from inside the box, but they never threatened an equaliser and Wealdstone wrapped un victory

HARROW dropped to seventh in the Bostik Premier League after a disappointing defeat to Brightlingsea Regent at Earlsmead.
