

Stones allow two-goal slip

WEALDSTONE let a two-goal lead slip away at Hayes & Yeading United in their second pre-season friendly, forcing them to settle for a 2-2 draw on Tuesday. Danny Green and Ross Lafayette had

Danny Green and Ross Lafayette had the Stones in command at the break, but two goals in the dying minutes for the hosts meant Wealdstone failed to build on their previous 4-1 win against Bracknell Town.

In a game made up of two 55-minute halves as opposed to the usual 45, the away side took the lead early on when new signing Lafayette threaded through for Green to finish well.

The new addition then played his part at the end of the half, coolly converting a penalty after Jake Sheppard was fouled in the area.

Hayes pulled one back in the 103rd minute - due to the extended halves - when their striker seized the ball to fire past Dylan Paterson.

Then, in the final minute, Hayes levelled the game as their forward broke free in the box to again fire past the Stones



keeper, ensuring the game ended in a draw.

Meanwhile, the Stones will be hosting a charity match against a Queens Park Rangers legends side on Sunday to celebrate two great servants of the club and raise funds for Wealdstone Foundation Trust and QPR Trust, recognising the contributions of Gordon Bartlett and Leo Morris.

Bartlett was in charge of Wealdstone for 22 years until 2017. He took the team to eighth place in the National League South and won two league titles, one playoff final and reached the semi-finals of the FA Trophy, while Bartlett is still involved with the club nearly 25 years after joining.

Kick-off is at 2pm at Grosvenor Vale and admission is £5 for adults, £2 for concessions and Under-18s and free for Under-14s.



SIGNS OF IMPROVEMENT BUT LEAGUE POSITION REMAINS



HARROW'S winless run extended to seven games despite their second draw in three at Acton in the Middlesex County Cricket League Division Three on Saturday.
