

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

LOVE FOOTBALL, PROTECT THE GAME

Every football fan should feel safe when watching their team. But last season we saw a minority of supporters ruining the game for others. That's why we're supporting strong measures across football to tackle antisocial and criminal behaviours within football grounds.

These include entering the pitch without permission, carrying or using smoke bombs or pyros and throwing objects onto the pitch, as well as discriminatory behaviour and taking drugs. All of these are illegal, dangerous and have no place in our game. For everyone's safety, clubs will report anyone carrying out these offences to the police, which can result in a permanent criminal record. These measures could also now apply to the parents or quardians of children involved in these activities.

From the start of the 2022/23 season, anyone who enters the pitch and those carrying or using smoke bombs and pyros will now automatically be banned by their club. These measures reflect the seriousness of the risks to fans and staff - pyros can burn at 2000 degrees Celsius and cause lifechanging injuries, while entering the pitch endangers players, managers and match offcials - it is impossible for anyone to tell the difference between a celebrating fan and a violent attacker.

The football authorities are working with clubs and the Football Supporters' Association to make sure everyone feels safe on matchdays. We ask all fans to come together to show that those who commit these illegal acts do not represent the majority of supporters.

EE reflects on just how very important your football friends are.. so cherish them

en's social circles are shrinking. As we have ventured back to reclaim social lives and normality, reports have suggested a profound decline in close friendships - over the past three decades, friendship groups have become smaller.

And men appear to have suffered a far steeper decline than women. Thirty years ago, majority of men (55%) reported having at least six close friends. Today that number has been cut by half. Slightly more than a quarter (27%) of men have six or more close friends today. 15% of men have no close friendships at all, a five-fold increase since 1990.

Women have witnessed a friendship decline that is far less pronounced. In 1990, roughly four in ten (41%) of women said that they had six or more close friends, compared to 24% today. 10% of women report having no close friends.

We all know how important friendships are. They provide emotional and personal support. Men particularly struggle to articulate their feelings, hence the rise in suicides not only in the UK but around the world. It is the number one killer of men under 45 in the UK.

So what has this got to do with Planet Wealdstone? Well, friendships ebb and flow, growing from acorns at school, mates going out, work, through university and, as parents, with other parents at school as your children enter the school system.

Some endure for a lifetime, others fall away - but those of us that watch football regularly have another group to lean on, our football friends.

ve always thought that football mates end up being the ones that last longer than most. As we grow older, and our traditional groupings move away (my brother's four 'closest' pals now live in four different countries) your football mates remain a constant.

When we were growing up, your football friends you saw when you watched the game on a Saturday, maybe midweek too, then played football with them on Sundays and saw them at training too. They became your mates too.

Now as we grow older, and as friendship circles change and develop, your football friends

are a constant - you see them more than your so-called closest friends.

The beauty of your football friends (not literally!) is that they are probably a more diverse social and

demographic mix than in any other part of your life. A world where people from different jobs, ways of life, income brackets mix for a common love of their shared football team.

After two loans to the Stones it's no surprise our 'new' ex-Hammers keeper looks a bit familiar!

ootball never fails to amaze with its random tales of success and glory... although the flip side, of course, is when that chance never materialises.

The Stones new 24-year-old goalkeeper Sam Howes still has the chance to hit those heady heights but his big opportunity seemingly came and went in the early months of 2016... when he was a teenage West Ham player on loan at Wealdstone!

I'd read about how Sam, the Hammers' bright young shot-stopper with caps for England at under-16, under-17, under-18 and under-19 level (and winning the Euros with the Three Lions at 17) had been close to a breakthrough at an FA Cup tie at Anfield.

But I never put two and two together and realised that was why he suddenly became unavailable again in the middle of his loan spell at Grosvenor Vale.

"Yeah, it was a crazy story really" said Sam the day after the epic trip to Gateshead last weekend.

"I'd made my West Ham debut as an 18-yearold on a pre-season trip to Sydney, Australia, but

with keepers like Adrian and Darren Randolph and a couple more ahead of me I knew my chances were slim. Adrian was just brilliant, ridiculously so, and when Wealdstone contacted them for an emergency loan (Northy had got injured) I was off to the Stones for my first-ever loan spell. And I liked it! Gordon Bartlett was the manager and I made my debut in 2-0 win at Chelmsford.

"Then a couple of draws, a horror pitch at Gosport, a five-times postponed Trophy game at Weston (which Sam wasn't able to play in) and then a trip to Eastbourne we lost 3-0... and then I was preparing for the next Stones game when I had the call to return back to Upton Park.

"West Ham were at Liverpool for a 4th round FA Cup tie and short of keepers... I was No.3 in line but in the hotel on the morning of the game Adrian had to leave as his wife was giving birth! So I was on the bench - and just a few minutes into the

game Darren Randolph took a heavy knock and my heart was beating fast!"

am was told to warm up and for a minute or two it looked like he would be handed

his big chance. But Randolph recovered and had an outstanding game in the goalless draw... and Hammers even won the replay 2-1 at The Boleyn Ground, the last season of football at the club's iconic home.

"So you nearly got to play in front of 50,000 at Anfield?" I asked him. I remember the game, and in my capacity on the Mirror sports desk would doubtless have come up with a cheesy headline, something like 'Howe's that for starters' as Sam wowed the crowd with a Cup debut clean sheet.

But it wasn't to be. Instead he has the memories of that magnificent stadium, days after turning out on a sodden pitch at Gosport where Sam remembers the game being in serious doubt "until a bloke turned up with a tractor with a ton of sand and dumped it in the centre circle!"

When the keeper returned to West Ham the stones had to apply for ANOTHER emergency loan and Joe Taylor arrived from Fleetwood, quickly followed by James Bransgrove from Colchester who stayed until Northy recovered to complete the season.

Six keepers in one season, if you include the forgettable Garry Malone and Scott Dutton!

Meanwhile, the one we wanted to keep returned to the first team squad at West Ham for an unhappy season.

"I knew I wasnt going to get close to a start" said the realistic Sam. "Tony Carr, the legendary Academy Director left and the new man didn't really fancy me. That's the way it often is in football - so I cut my losses and went to Watford, who also

had a stack of keepers!"

Sam says he quickly knew that his chances at the Hornets were slim. "At one point they didn't have a goalkeeping coach so I spent some sessions playing out as a midfielder - which ironically made me a better keeper as we are expected to be as good with our feet as with our hands these days. I was out there playing with half the current Stones squad, people like Ashley Charles, Dom Hutchinson and David Sesay".

The writing was on the wall at Vicarage Road for the 6ft 1in keeper especially with the revolving door of Italian managers and the constantly evolving squad of players - so Sam accepted a two year offer to go to Woking in the Conference, teaming up with Alan Dowson who had been his boss when earlier on loan at Hampton & Richmond Borough.

"You must have played against the Stones a few times after being out on loan at Chelmsford,

Hampton and Eastbourne during those Watford days?" I asked him.

"Mate, I played against Wealdstone LOADS of times!" he laughed. "We always seemed to be playing you when I was at Hampton, in the league and in county cup finals. And I used to hate coming to the Vale 'cos the ground is so tight and intimidating and the away changing rooms aren't the best!

"But my worst memory was playing against the Stones for Eastbourne a few years ago when I was sent off after six minutes for volleying Tarryn (Allarakhia) in the face. I hope he's

forgiven me for that".

fter being left out of the Woking side Sam turned down the offer of a further year at Kingfield and opted to drop two divisions and play for his local club Horsham in the Isthmian Prem.

"A pal of mine from schooldays said 'why not come and play here?' And, to be honest it was the best thing I've ever done."

Sam was born in SE London but was brought up in East Grinstead - and moved to Horsham with his girlfriend Emma when he dropped out of the full-time pro game.

He's now set up his a grassroots goalkeeper-coaching business with friends across Sussex, a one-to-one training scheme that has expanded from just a few young keepers to around 120.

That proximity to home was a big appeal.

"I just needed to be playing games and I played 63 or 64 for Horsham last season! We won the League Cup 4-0 in the final against Margate and finished halfway in the league - so when our season was over the last thing I was expecting was a phone call from

Jason (Scannell) at Wealdstone. I'd not spoken to him in nearly a year so I thought 'what on earth does he want?

"He told me George (Wickens) had concussion and the Stones needed a keeper for the two games over the May Bank Holiday - could I help

them out?' I nearly said 'no, I've played 64 games and I'm on holiday' but I'm so glad I didn't!

"I played against Dagenham and then at Yeovil and I thought 'I enjoyed last season but this is the level I want to be playing at now'.

6 4 The National League is a big step up and certainly different from six years ago when I last pulled on a Wealdstone shirt. Then it was more physical, more direct, we got the ball from back to front more guickly and it was a case of hitting the ball onto the head of Jonny Wright on the right wing!

"When I had the call from Stuart Maynard

in the summer it was a nobrainer to come and sign... I really liked the club before, the people and the fans but I've noticed the ground is bigger, new stands and a great playing surface but it's still got that intimidating feel for the opposition.

"We had those hiccups in preseason - being 6-0 down to QPR was a shock, despite the calibre of their players, and then the 3-0 defeat by Chelmsford - but I really think it did us a lot of good. It shook us up and we knew we had to defend the box better, and after the poor first half against Bromley we've got better every game".

asked Sam if his performance at Gateshead was his standout display so far. "Personally? Yes it probably was, everything seemed to stick to my gloves but it was a team performance of real character - we showed a great mentality and maturity to defend for that entire second half with 10 men but I think we deserved it. We showed how tough we can be.

"By the time I got back to Horsham it was about half past midnight but we were all buzzing from the performance and the fact that we are top of the league. But we're not daft, we know the main target is to avoid relegation but the way we've started has made people take notice. Long may that continue".



What attracted you? I liked how close you were to the pitch and the players which was a nice change from top level football. What was your first 'live' match? That was a couple months before the Harrow Borough one, it

was a boring 0-0 draw between Arsenal and Everton at the Emirates. Not a great start admittedly! I was brought up as an Arsenal fan and do still keep an eye on their results to an extent but these days I'm not really too interested.

The most memorable game you've ever watched? That is probably the Euros final last year, I'm sure I

don't need to go into much more detail on that one...

And most memorable Wealdstone game? There are a few contenders but I'd say the 3-1 win away at Barnet last year (pictured left). It was a great performance and an unreal away end to be in, and it also felt like a

WOKING FC



THE CARDS

oking Football Club, known as the Cards (from the Cardinal red of the red and white halves), was formed in 1889. The Club joined the West Surrey League in 1895/96, winning the title by one point on the final day of the season. However, within 21 years of being formed, the Club was in danger of folding for financial reasons. The turning point came when, in January 1908, Woking played Bolton Wanderers in the First Round of the FA Cup, having battled through five qualifying rounds. Despite losing the away game 5-0, the Club made it into the national press. Bolton Wanderers, impressed by the minnows they had defeated, travelled to Woking for a friendly match the following season, which kept the Club solvent.

In 1911 the Club joined the Isthmian League, maintaining their place in the top division for 72 years and finishing as runners-up to Wycombe Wanderers in 1956/57. That achievement was eclipsed the following season when, in front of a 71,000 crowd, the Cards beat Ilford 3-0 in the last FA Amateur Cup Final to be televised live. Sadly, the Club then went into decline, culminating in a first-ever relegation in 1982/83. By the end of the 1984/85 season the Club had plunged to Division Two South of the Isthmian League. It was during that season that former player, Geoff Chapple, was appointed as manager. Although he was not able to save the Club from relegation, the renaissance was underway. Just missing out on promotion at the first attempt, the Club clinched the Division Two South title in 1986/87 and, after two third place finishes in Division One, they were promoted back to the Premier Division at the end of the 1989/90 season.

The next season saw the Club become part of FA Cup folklore. Entering the competition at the Fourth Qualifying Round, they beat three Conference sides



to set up a Third Round tie away to West Bromwich Albion. Recovering from being a goal behind, Woking triumphed 4-2, thanks to a supero team effort and a never-to-be-forgotten hat-trick from Tim Buzaglo. To be drawn out of the hat with a home game against Everton was beyond everyone's wildest dreams. The tie was switched to Goodison Park and, against a team packed with internationals, the sides were separated only by a solitary Kevin Sheedy goal. Over 34,000 people remained in the ground to give the players a rapturous standing ovation.

Promotion to the Conference was achieved in 1991/92. The Isthmian League title was clinched in early April, with seven games still to be played.

The FA Trophy was won in 1994, 1995 and 1997 and the Cards also achieved five successive top five finishes in the Conference, including being runners-up in 1994/95 and 1995/96.

At the end of the 1996/97 campaign, having just clinched the FA Trophy for the third time, Geoff Chapple and his coach, Colin Lippiatt, left the Club and joined Kingstonian. John McGovern, the former Derby County, Nottingham Forest and Leeds United midfielder, was appointed. Hopes were high that he would lead Woking into the League but, although the Club finished in third place, his style of play and his personality did little to endear him to the

fans. A poor

start to the 1998/99 campaign led to his dismissal. Brian McDermott, the former Arsenal player, joined Woking on a non-contract basis and achieved a temporary upturn in fortunes, guiding the team to a ninth place finish.

Significant events had taken place off the field. The downturn in the Club's fortunes had led to a financial crisis. With the Club facing administration or worse, successful businessman and long-time fan, Chris Ingram, came to the rescue, becoming Chairman in February 2002. He continues to own the ground, with the Club enjoying a 125-year lease at a peppercorn rent, but his financial backing of the Club and involvement in its running ceased at the end of the 2010-11 season.

The Club went full-time in the summer of 2003. The fans' hopes were borne out by a much better season, with the Cards achieving a ninth place finish, having been on the fringe of the play-off places until the last few weeks. Again, only a poor finish the following season deprived the Cards of a play-off place, but a final placing of 8th with 68 points was the best achievement since 1997/98. Disappointingly, the Cards failed to mount a challenge for a play-off place in 2005/06, finishing in 11th place. 2006/07 was another season of underachieving and, despite bringing in fresh faces during the January transfer window, d the Cards finished in 15th place.

disappointment, culminating in the Cards' relegation in summer 2009 from the BSP after 17 years in the top flight of non-League football.

A storming end to the 2009-10 season saw the Cards clinch 5th place. Dover Athletic were beaten in the play-off semi-final but the Cards lost to Bath City in the final.

The Club went part-time in summer 2010, with Baker and Dack both being awarded new two-year contracts. But, in spite of good runs in the FA Cup and the FA Trophy, both decided to leave the Club in January 2011, with Garry Hill taking over the reins till the end of the season, with Steve Thompson as First Team Coach. A dramatic upturn in league fortunes took the Club into 5th place, but the Cards lost to Farnborough in the play-off semi-final.

The revival continued apace in the 2011-12 season, with the Cards reaching the top spot in late September and staying there throughout the campaign in spite of being pushed hard by Dartford. The BSBS title was won by nine points, with only five games lost all season.

The Cards finished in a comfortable 12th place in their first season back in the Conference Premier, playing an entertaining brand of football, and did even better the following season, ending in 9th place after showing great form in the second half of the campaign. The 2014-15 campaign saw the Club finish in a commendable 7th spot, missing a playoff place by only three points. Garry Hill maintained his record of top-half finishes the following season as the side ended in 12th position. But the summer of 2016 saw the loss of some experienced players and the side struggled throughout the 2016-17 season, eventually averting relegation thanks to generally improved form from the new year onwards, finishing in 18th place.

In May 2017, following an announcement that new investment would take place in the Club, Anthony Limbrick was appointed manager, with Jason Goodliffe joining him as assistant manager shortly afterwards. The Club also announced that it would be moving gradually to full-time status.

2018/19 saw the Cards promoted back to the National League after beeting Welling 1-0 in the play off final.

Opposition in focus WOKING FC

1. ETHAN WADY - GOALKEEPER

The promising young goalkeeper signed for the Cards on a season-long loan deal in the summer of 2022 from Chelsea. The American-born shot-stopper has been with the Premier League side since midway through the 2017/18.

2. KYRAN LOFTHOUSE - MIDFIELD

An attacking wide player who has been utilised as a full-back, wing-back, and out-and-out winger during his first two years with the Cards. The right-sided player first joined Woking on loan in October 2020, a deal which was eventually extended to the end of the season, and after making 41 appearances in all competitions he joined on a permanent deal that summer, signing a two-year deal..

3. JOSH CASEY (C) - DEFENCE

The left-back has been Woking's captain since his arrival at the club in the summer of 2018. Over the past four years he has made more than 150 appearances in all competitions, won promotion to the National League, reached the third round of the FA Cup and an FA Trophy semi-final. During a memorable first season with the club he also won three Player of the Year Awards.

4. SCOTT CUTHBERT - DEFENCE

The veteran defender joined Woking in the summer of 2022 after a hugely successful Football League career. A former Swindon Town, Leyton Orient, Luton Town, and Stevenage centre-back, he played more than 400 EFL games over a 13-year spell, notably winning promotion to League One with Luton in 2018 and winning the Player of the Year Award at both Orient and Stevenage, in 2012 and 2019 respectively.

5. JOE MCNERNEY - DEFENCE

A former Woking academy graduate in his second spell with the club after re-joining the Cards in the summer of 2021. An experienced centre-back, he made over 250 appearances in all competitions during his first spell with the club, scoring 15 goals. He was part of the team promoted from National League South as champions in 2011/12, playing 33 times in that campaign, before becoming a crucial part of Garry Hill's successful Woking side of the mid-2010s.

6. LUKE WILKINSON - DEFENCE

The experienced defender joined the Cards on a two-



year deal in the summer of 2022 following the expiry of his deal with manager Darren Sarll's former club Yeovil Town. The centre-back joined Yeovil from another of Sarll's former clubs, Stevenage, in 2019 and went onto make 89 appearances in three years – helping the club reach the National League play-offs in his first season and serving as club captain during his final year at Huish Park.

7. RICKY KORBOA - FORWARD

A dynamic wide player, he joined the Cards from Sutton United on a two-year deal in the summer of 2022, following the expiry of his contract with the League Two side. He spent one season at Gander Green Lane, where he was predominately used as an impact substitute, with arguably his best moment being a memorable brace in a 3-1 away win at Oldham Athletic. He made a total of 20 appearances in all competitions including 14 in the Football League.

8. JAMES DALY - FORWARD

A versatile attacking player signed in the summer of 2022. He joined the club following his release from League Two side Stevenage, having also played in League One for Bristol Rovers and in the academy setup at Premier League Crystal Palace. An athletic and pacey left-footed player, he is predominately a centreforward, but can also be utilised anywhere down the left flank.

9. REECE GREGO-COX - FORWARD

A right-sided forward, he joined the Cards for a second-spell in the summer of 2022, following his release from League Two side Crawley Town. He previously spent four months with Woking in the 2017/18 season, scoring four times in 18 appearances, in a disappointing campaign which ultimately ended in relegation

from the National League. His efforts were one of the few highlights of that period, with goals against Gateshead, Hartlepool, Macclesfield, and Torquay.

10. PADRAIG AMOND - FORWARD

The experienced striker joined Woking in the summer of 2022 on a two-year deal after leaving League Two side Newport County. The former National League golden boot and promotion winner, who has scored 200 career goals, is renowned for his goalscoring abilities in both league and cup football, having scored ten times for the Exiles in the FA Cup since 2017. Torquay.

11. TYREKE JOHNSON - MIDFIELD

A predominately left-sided midfielder also capable of playing as an outright winger or deeper in a wing-back role. He is in his second spell with Woking having initially enjoyed a successful loan spell in 2019. He re-joined the club on a permanent basis two years later and made 38 appearances in all competitions last season.

12. DAN MOSS - DEFENCE

An exciting and highly rated young prospect, the right-sided defender joined Woking on a two-year deal in the summer of 2022, following the expiry of his contract with Championship side Millwall. The full-back began his career with Burnley, where he became the captain of the Lions' Under-23 team and graduated from the club's academy two years later.

13. CRAIG ROSS - GOALKEEPER

The popular goalkeeper and two-time Fans' Player of the Year Award winner has made more than 150 appearances for the club since joining the Cards for a second-time in 2018. After graduating from the Woking academy in 2008.

17. JIM KELLERMANN - MIDFIELD The box-to-box midfield player joined the Cards on

a two-year deal in the summer of 2022, after

a two-year deal in the suffirmer of 2022, after failing to agree a new contract with fellow National League side Chesterfield. He was a popular figure during his single season with the Spireites, where he made 36 appearances in all competitions, helping the club reach a play-off semi-final, losing out to Solihull Moors, and the third round of the FA Cup, where they were beaten by Premier League giants Chelsea.

18. JACK ROLES - MIDFIELD

An exciting attacking midfield player who first joined the Cards on a short-term deal towards the end of the 2021/22 season before signing a one-year extension in the summer. He made 10 appearances during his first campaign at Kingfield after joining the club from Premier League club Crystal Palace in February, scoring his first goal in memorable fashion, with a long-range effort against Eastleigh.

23. JERMAINE ANDERSON - MIDFIELD

A physical and athletic midfield player who joined the Cards in December 2021. He made 16 appearances during an injury-hit first six months at Kingfield but did provide a memorable late assist for the winning goal in a 2-1 home win over Wrexham, Darren Sarll's first as Woking manager.

24. ROHAN INCE - MIDFIELD

An integral player at the base of the Woking midfield, he quickly became a firm fan favourite, after joining the club in the summer of 2021 from National League rivals Maidenhead United. A toughtackling defensive midfielder also capable of pushing further forward, he made 37 appearances during his debut season with the Cards, whilst chipping in with two goals and four assists.

25. SID NELSON - DEFENCE

Woking bolstered their defensive options with the signing of the former Millwall, Tranmere Rovers, and Northampton Town centre-back in July 2022, following his release by the Cobblers. He joined the Cards having made over 100 Football League appearances in his career, which included being part of the Tranmere side promoted to League One in 2019.



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

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

At some time during the 1970-71 season, Alan Humphries changed from being

Coach to Manager. So basically, this particular 'C' is going absolutely nowhere and has been a complete waste of yours and my time! For all that, the current set up we have at the club seems to be working quite well regardless of titles.

each slice of ham or cheese had to be cut to the correct size so as to maximise the number of rolls produced given the raw materials available. We were more generous with the onions. these being far cheaper of course. Back then, this was for the most part the only food available at Lower Mead other than CRISPS and CONFEC-TIONERY, so a perfect precursor to the customary trip to the Dominion Fish Bar after the match had finished.

Nowadays it is generally harder to get cheese and onion rolls as the newer catering

outlets tend to focus on healthier options such as burgers and chips, but these are sometimes available in the bar or smaller outlets.

Where to next then? A quick foray back into the 70s again, and this time our former manager Geoff COLEMAN, Geoff joined the Stones in April 1976

from league rivals Nuneaton Borough. Eddie Presland (pictured below left in the cosy dugouts at Lower Mead... with a Coach indeed!) had been sacked the previous week in the car park at Hillingdon Borough after a poor run had left us 20th out of 22 clubs, with only Stourbridge and the dreadful Cambridge City below us. Apart from bringing a more negative defence-oriented approach to the club, he also brought a fine sheepskin coat, immensely popular in those days. According to the Harry O, leading scorer George Duck handed in a transfer request to the club before he even met the Brummie Coleman, so upset he was by the sacking of his friend Eddie.

As it was, Coleman's Stones went down to Weymouth on Wednesday April 7th having not won away since April 3rd the previous sea-

son (let that sink in) and promptly returned home with all the points. John Morton, another regular at the Vale these days may (or not) remember this well. As the Harry O reported, 'Stones looked in dire trouble when Morton who first damaged his right hand on Dyson's head punching clear, fell dazed to the ground after trying to cut out a cross.' Morton continued but was replaced in goal at half time by Willie Watson, with winger Adriaan Eglite coming on as sub in a rather unfamiliar left back position. For those that travelled and witnessed the 2-0 win this was an infamous 'I was there' night.

Geoff COLEMAN also presided over another infamous 'I was there' night – the 'massive night of soccer hate' when six players were sent off at Wimbledon later that month. Numbers that make our red cards against Gateshead and Yeovil seem rather tame. Stones somehow avoided relegation that season despite finishing in the bottom four by virtue of Dunstable's financial demise. Coleman's

stay was short-lived, sacked in February 1977 with the Stones again languishing in the nether regions of the league. His successor was Alan Fogarty - his assistant at both Nuneaton and Wealdstone - under whom the Stones made the 3rd round of the FA Cup for the 1st and only time in their history the following season.

I don't often include current players in this column: however, I feel an exception needs to be made. We are taking CAPTAINS here, so step up Jack COOK to the Wealdstone Alphabet. I am sure that there are many CARDS fans here today that wish Cookie were still with them, but their loss is our gain, and he has been truly outstanding since arriving at the Vale in in the summer of 2021. An absolute warrior, outstanding competitor. scorer of key goals and the ability (sometimes) to run in

the correct direction of the photographer when he does.

I must confess that I was a little concerned during the summer. Cookie featured on an excellent podcast with Stuart and Matty saying all the right things about us. But time moved on and there was no news about him signing on for the new season. I wasn't the only one to be mighty relieved when the news broke that he was staying.... all I ask now is not to put us through this particular wringer again next summer.

n the subject of today's visitors, the first time I saw the CARDS play (if my programme collection is a fair guide) would have been in February 1970. In that programme Woking's colours were listed as 'Cardinal and White,' so when did Cardinal get dropped and standard red adopted? Answers on a postcard please. Whilst I remember little of that match, it would be remiss of me not to mention my first ever trip to Kingsfield in September 1975 – that

I do remember well, probably one of the greatest comebacks from a Wealdstone side I have ever seen. Just the small matter of turning around a 3-1 deficit in an FA Cup replay with 10 minutes to go. We won 5-3 after extra time, definitely worth risking bunking off school early to catch the coach there.



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

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

t was April 1971. Decimalisation (when the British currency moved from pounds, shillings and pence to pounds and pees) was just three months old and the British public was outraged that shop prices were being 'rounded-up' by exorbitant amounts.

Housewives would carry around decimal converters in their handbags - a revolving cardboard wheel that showed the '£sd' equivalent to the new price tags - and everywhere you went the cry would go up: 'What's that in old money?'

Well, if that sounds like a bygone age it was (until just four years ago) the last time Wealdstone and Woking met in a league match. Yes, 51 years ago!

was 13 at the time and remember being concerned that my pocket money wouldn't cover any increase at the Lower Mead turnstiles.

It cost 9d to get in as a junior (that's nine old pen-

nies, the equivalent of 4p after D-Day) and although the price was held until the next season it had risen by a whopping 11p once we'd kicked off in the Southern League Div One North in August!

It was exacerbated by Wealdstone turning pro that summer. It was a few months of upheaval in every quarter of life but exciting as the Stones grasped the expensive nettle

of professionalism and raised their prices accordingly (from what I remember, adult prices jumped from 1/6d for Isthmian League football to 30p for the Southern

League... double the money! Although if you take the rate of inflation as a guide to what 30p is worth today, it should cost £4.30 to get in today).

As a result of bravely leaving behind the era of 'shamateurism' there were a few heavy hearts at the thought of abandoning old adversaries such as Woking.

And the Surrey club will always hold a place in the affections of Stones older fans, like myself, for being our last opponents in an amateur match at Lower Mead. Yes, April 1971. The school Easter holidays.

Some matches always stick in the mind and this one definitely does. I had been out bike-riding in Northwood with my pal Mark during the day and so anxious about getting home in time for the game that he decided to come along too for his first WFC experience.

As a Chelsea fan he maybe felt he was slumming it - but right from the start, Stones clearly wanted to end the home amateur era with a bang. Neither ourselves or Woking were any great shakes; both rooted in mid-table, there was absolutely nothing riding on the game and the crowd was also unremarkable for this landmark occasion - barely 600 - but there was

more intensity in our performance than in any other game that season. I finally managed to unearth the match report last weekand it confirmed the crucial moments that are crystallised in my mind. More so than most of what happened last season! Woking, and especially their

The line-ups for that last league game between our clubs.... particularly memorable because Woking fielded Alfie Christmas at number 7. He featured in a wonderful anecdote concerning Enfield's pantomime villain Alf D'Arcy in the 1960s. Apparently Alfie was a thorn in D'Arcy's side, and when they tangled in a December fixture and the Woking man was about to be booked, the Enfield skipper sidled up to the referee and told him: 'This guy's a real wind-up merchant ref. Watch him - he'll tell you his name's Santa Claus'. And when Christmas gave his name the referee sent him off!

keeper Dave Collyer, kept the rampant Stones at bay in the first half and, with the benefit of hindsight, they were probably all playing with one eye on winning a professional contract the next season. We had promising young players in Bob Williams, Gary Austin and Tommy Mahon at the back, Dave Yerby in midfield and John Ritchie up front but all bar Mahon were jettisoned by manager Alan Humphries in the summer.

ne player who was definitely leaving of his own accord was the veteran Charlie Townsend, our England and Great Britain Olympic midfielder. He was scheming and probing throughout the game and as we changed ends, kicking towards the Elmslie End for the second half, he combined with Rob Williams to open up a chasm in the 'Cards' defence. Our long-haired No.10 Alan Pentecost danced through the gap, rounded Collyer and put us 1-0 ahead!

There was only one winner now and Ritchie (the former Arsenal voungster who went on to star for Enfield) made it two from close range after a poor back pass. With ten minutes left Townsend got away on the right and played a delicious cross into the near post for Ritchie to glance in No.3 with his head.

The crowd were delighted. A few weeks later we beat Wembley 5-1 in the President's Cup second leg at Lower Mead (winning 5-2 on aggregate) and we all went home convinced that we'd smash it when the new pro era started. It wasn't quite that easy...

League double for Stones after 47 years...

o what happened to Wealdstone's and Woking's fortunes in the almost-five decades between the 1971 and 2018 meetings? Well, the Cards had gone into decline in the late 70s and early 80s and when the Stones were at their 1985 pomp (winning the non-League double, as we like to remind all and sundry) the Surrey side were languishing in the Isthmian League Div Two South. four levels lower. That was when the legendary Geoff Chapple took over the reigns at Kingfield. Within a few vrears he'd got the Cards back into the Premier Division... and then of course came the titanic 4-2 FA Cup win at West Brom, followed by promotion to the Conference and THREE Trophy wins at Wembley! Those were days when Stones were in the Isthmian League Div Three doldrums, literally passing Woking on our way down but never meeting in the same league. Until 2018 of course! Woking had suc-

cumbed to relegation from the Conference and found themselves playing at the Vale in the fourth game of the season in front of a 1,400 midweek crowd... and under the lights it was a

late Matt Lench penalty (after Dave Pratt had been felled in the Bulla End box) that secured a terrific 1-0 win. In January 2019 the teams met again. this time at Kingfield and with Woking flying high (the title clearly between them and Torquay) it was the Stones who shocked the 2,075 crowd with an impressive 2-0 win.

Tarryn Allarakhia (on a loan spell from Crawley) and Pratt filched the goals.

The two sides met for a third time, of course, in May that year when Stones somehow snuck into seventh place and won our play-off eliminator at Bath. We were 2-0 up at Woking but a thrilling fightback (thank you Max Kretzschmar) edged the game 3-2, and they went on to win the final 1-0 against Welling.
