



Written in Stone

WELCOME TO 2023

ood afternoon/good evening, take your pick! A 'double-header' programme is something we always try to avoid, but not only are the games just three days apart but Christmas print deadlines mean this is written even before the Chelmsford City FA Trophy clash last month... so we don't even know if we are in Round Two, let alone which opposition awaits for next Saturday afternoon!

Of course, these days everybody is in constant touch online so it's not so important... normal service will be resumed for the clash with former Premier Leaguers Oldham on January 17 (7.45pm) and maybe even a home Trophy tie on the 14th.

Wealdstone wishes every one of its wonderful fans a sparkling 2023 and I think it's fair to say that 2022 saw an astonishing achievement for this club: the highest level that we have ever competed at, with 15 of the 24 clubs having played in the Football League and the Stones as one of a tiny handful of truly part-time teams.

Yet (excluding the Xmas games against Maidenhead) we have won 17, drawn 11 and lost 19 of the 47 national League games across this calendar year. And we are getting better!

Last season the opening 22 games (matching up to Bromley away in December) yielded 23 points and a league position of 20th; the first 22 games so far this season yielded 30 points and a league position of 12th.

With some big-name clubs still to visit, the crowds here at the Vale have increased from an average of 1,541 last season across the first ten games to 1,695 in 2022-23... although of course the new enforced streaming of games could impact those figures as the season rolls on.

There is no substitute for watching live football as we saw at Bromley pre-Christmas. All those who stayed in the warm, for England or other reasons, missed a fantastic game and one we hope to see repeated time and again in 2023.



Growing up as a Stones fan in the late 1960s and 1970s we seemed to have a production line of brave

and talented keepers through Andy Williams and Chris Swain, on to John Barr, Roy Mackenzie and then the frankly foolhardy John Morton (a regular in the live-stream commentary box in the BCD season) who combined lightning reactions with a recklessness verging on the suicidal.

But then we signed the Liverpudlian gloveman Chris Lightfoot. And we realised that here was a goallie who wasn't just prepared to put his 6ft 1inch, 14 stone frame on the line in every game, but he was delighted to give us the sort of laughs that many Stones fans still reminisce about even today.

WEALDSTONE shattered Hereford in their F.A. Cup first round replay last night.

Hereford, famous Cup fighters themselves after beating Newcastle several years ago when a non-League team, were stunned.

Wealdstone became the first non-League club to beat Here-ford at home in the Cup in 31 years.

Kevin Sheedy, aged 17, got Hereford off to a flying start when he found the net in 86 seconds.

hat was in December 1977 as the Stones knocked out Division Four side Reading 2-1 at Lower Mead on a day of raw drama on the gluepot pitch. "I loved Lower Mead" said Chris. "A quirky, closed-in ground with the crowd up close, always had a great atmosphere and all the FA Cup games were great that season. We beat Maidstone in the final qualifying round 2-1, a real humdinger of a game with George Duck getting both, then the 0-0 draw with Third Division Hereford United at home... and the away game was amazing.

"I'm an Evertonian and it was Kevin Sheedy, who had a great career for Everton but was only 17 then, scored from outside the box. That seemed to relax us and we played them off the park and went 3-1 up, Bobby Moss headed one goal and Pat Ferry scored two. They got one back near the end but we really deserved that victory.

"Then the next day we had to face the music! Me and Pat were schoolteachers at the same school in Romford, and we'd both made excuses to the Head to get off early so we could make the team coach at lunchtime, never thinking that we'd be plastered all over the newspapers as giantkillers the next day (The Sun had the headline 'Ferry Ferry good' on their report)... well, we had a bit of explaining to do, I can tell you!"

Chris had been larger than life in that momentous cup run, only beaten by a freak goal

from Reading's Lawrie Sanchez in the closing stages of the 2-1 Second Round win at Lower Mead. What did he remember of the Third Round tie at OPR?

"Oh, what a disappointment. For me personally. All anyone talks about is the first goal, the sort of goal we were desperate NOT to concede, and it was down to me. And it was all the worse because I was feeling really, really good about my performances up to that point.

"This is what happened. Rangers'
John Hollins swung in a freekick from
the right and I thought 'I could get this'
then realised it was bending away from
me so took a step back... Don Givens
was favourite to get on the end of it and I
threw myself to the right expecting a bullet header, ready to palm the ball round
the post but he sort of misconnected and
the ball came to me much more slowly
that I expected. So I was in the process
of catching it when the ball caught my arm, hit the

inside of the post and bounced in.

Of course as I keeper you can't make mistakes... you take the glory and you take the flak. All I saw were all the backs of our players shirts as they walked away upfield. The worst feeling in the world, knowing all the expectation and all the fans who'd made the journey hoping for a repeat of our heroics.

"We played well after that point and didn't deserve the 4-0 scoreline at the end. My

other big memory was Stan Bowles scoring from the penalty spot. It wasn't a penalty by the way, but I was a huge Stan Bowles fan and used to go and watch him play whenever I could, so I knew that he always had the same routine - a little shimmy in the run-up, and then he placed the ball into the corner, low to the keeper's right.


So I was ready. He ran up and shimmied, I dived to my right... and he placed the ball in the top left hand corner! I'd never seen him do that before!"

hris was only with the Stones for two seasons, but they were memorable ones. "And I loved every minute" he says. "There were such big characters around: Mossy and Pat Ferry, Billy Byrne, John Arnold, Furze and of course Willie Watson. Willie just cracked me up.

"He used to love to take off the manager Alan Fogarty's accent - he was a Brummie - I remember one game against Dover when Willie was playing at sweeper alongside Dave Parratt and near the end of the game he nutmegged their striker in our own box and flicked the ball past another to set up an attack, and Foggy went ballistic.

"I know you're a good player Willie but you can't do that" he shouted at him. "Remember Bobby Moore in Katowice against Poland? Best defender in the world - he lost the ball and England lost. So what you do is three things: You either pass it back to Chris in goal, or you play it to the full back, or you hit it long. Okay? You got that?"

So the next game Willie was just trotting down the tunnel and Foggy shouted out to him: "So Willie - do you remember? What do you do?".

He looked over his shoulder and called back: "Give it to Martin Peters".

hris was born in Liverpool but his family moved to Crewe, in Cheshire. He went to Nantwich Grammar School and played in



goal for Crewe's A team while he was at Warwick University - but his first club was Atherstone Town in the West Midlands League.

"Six quid a week, £2 win bonus and £1 for a draw; I thought my ship had come in" he laughs. His performances for the Adders earned a move to AP Leamington in the Southern League Div One (North) for several seasons, including a 5-2 defeat at Wealdstone in April 1972 - the Stones very first season of Southern League football.

Chris then got a teaching job in Romford, Essex but was still playing back in the East Midlands at Leamington. 'The travelling was a bit daft but I knew one of the Dartford coaches Robbie Stepney so was I training there midweek, and incidentally the Darts had John Morton in goal. He was teacher too so we kept bumping into each other.

"I then signed for Romford in the Southern League Prem and so played against the Stones in 1974-75....Romford had been one of the big non League clubs but the chairman had built a giant new stand at their speedway stadium and that was a bit of a millstone around their neck. They ended up going the way of a lot of clubs in the 70s and 80, having to sell the ground to survive, like Guildford City and of course Wealdstone eventually.

"Anyway, Geoff Coleman was the Stones manager in 1976 and he had always rated me - he had tried to sign me for Nuneaton several times - and when he asked me to sign that September as cover for Morty (who was injured) it was an easy decision. I'd started the season playing for Leyton Wingate in the Athenian League and, without being funny, it just didn't seem right when I was used to playing at a decent level in front of decent crowds.

"I made my debut at Nuneaton, funnily enough, and although we lost 2-0 it was like being back in the big time. That was always my goal, to play at that level but it wasn't to last. I was FA Cup tied with Leyton Wingate so Morty, now back from injury, played in all the Cup games that season and we had a good run, going out 1-0 at Reading. But I played in most of the league games and ended the season saving a penalty from Jimmy Greaves as we

won 2-1 at Chelmsford. But managers can be strange. They either fancy you or they don't... and when Geoff Coleman left to be replaced by his No.2 Foggy it was clear that it was the latter."

espite Lightfoot's heroics in the early part of the 77-78 season, including the unprecedented FA Cup run, Fogarty was angling to replace his regular 32-year-old No.1 with young ex-Southend and Spurs stopper lan Cranstone.

"Foggy made no bones about wanting to bring !

in the youngster but I was on contract and was left hanging around for the rest of that season, playing for the reserves in front on one man and a dog or being made to report to grounds for first team matches knowing that I wasn't in the team (and no bench duty either in those days).

"That summer I was given the chance to do some coaching in the US in the school holidays and asked Foggy if I could stay in shape out there and be back in time for the

first league game.... of course he put Cranny in goal for the first game at Gravesend (which we lost 5-2) but he wasn't available for the next one against Telford United who had Geoff Hurst as player manager -I kept a clean sheet in a 3-0 win but the manager told me afterwards 'You may have played well but you're never playing for the 1st XI again' - and he then had me in for training for five consecutive nights, travelling across from Romford. That broke me and I agreed to tear up my contract".

I said to Chris "That is so extreme - it must have been all about getting the wage bill down, not needing two keepers."

"Yes, you're probably right but if he'd just told me that I'd have understood, and parted on good terms."

Chris had left teaching around that time moving into leisure management - and the family had moved to Woking. His football career ended in the Athenian League with Epsom & Ewell, and then Carshalton.

e is now retired and living in a village near Matlock in Derbyshire, playing a lot of golf and watching a fair amount of non-League football at Matlock Town, Alfreton and Chesterfield. His very last game of football came some 20 years ago when he turned out for an ex-Stones XI at Edgware against a star-studded showbiz XI... and it ended in agony when he was carried off the field with two broken ribs.

"It was all my own fault - Martin Chivers

chipped the ball towards my top corner and instinct took over as I forgot I was now 55 years old with an unconditioned body. I thought 'I can save this' and took off to try and tip the ball over the top.. and I landed something like point four on the Richster Scale. It was agony!"


But his worst injury came on a bleak Tuesday night at Yeovil in February 1977. "It was the next night after my daughter was born - in those days you wouldn't think twice about going off to play football with your wife in labour - and I collided

with Willie Watson's kneecap halfway through the game. I was concussed and actually lost my memory... I spent 24 hours in Yeovil hospital but couldn't remember a thing about the game for days afterwards.

"It makes me laugh these days when you hear about how brave a keeper is when he makes a routine save at a forward's feet. Being brave for £200k a week. I was brave for a fiver!

"Thinking back, Yeovil wasn't a happy place for me... the fans were always horrible there. Though what I remember most about going to Yeovil was being forced to wear a red goalkeeper's top when I was playing for Romford, who wore blue and gold. Obviously I couldn't wear blue, or my usual green as that was what Yeovil wore... but I wasn't going to wear red as I'm an Everton bluenose through and through!

So I found a black top of my own and wore that. The referee wasn't happy but I got away with it!"

used to watch the Stones at Lower Mead along with a referee friend of mine called Bill Cowan who was a milkman and a massive fan - some current fans may remember him. Interestingly he only had one eye! I think my first match was around 1982

prior to winning the double. We went to many away games along with Bob Lewis, another refereeing friend.

What were your first impressions of the club? Night matches at Lower Mead were fantastic and I did play once at the ground and also refereed there. The old clubhouse had great atmosphere. though I do remember the car park being very wet in winter!

What was the first football match you ever saw live? Or on TV? The first match I went to was at Stamford Bridge on Boxing

remember big Jim Furnell in goal for the Gunners. I loved watching the Big Match with Brian Moore and it's been great to see some of the re-runs on TV recently. It was the highlight of Sunday afternoons, having played football in the morning, down to the pub for a few pints

then home for roast dinner - then on the settee for The Big Match followed by a sleep!

Do you follow any other team? I have a few. Arsenal and Wealdstone being my first choice teams, but I now also go to MK Dons as they are very nearby. I have a place in Turkey so also like to go and watch Bodrumspoor FC who are in the Turkish championship.

What's the most memorable game you've EVER seen? have a few memorable games, all at the old Wembley. Firstly watching England win the

World Cup 1in 1966 sadly only on TV. Then Charlie George scoring the winner to secure Arsenal the double in 1971, and finally Wealdstone winning the FA Trophy to also secure the double by beating Boston Utd in 1985. It was a tight game with Denis Byatt missing a penalty, but we managed to hold on. A truly great day!

Who introduced you to the Stones? It was Wealdstone chairman Fred Deanus who my mum knew from work. Fred persuaded me to buy an A share and five B shares in the club all those years ago! He used to have lunch at the White

Bear in Ruislip, and he also asked me to come and watch the Stones - but also my old friend Bill Cowan as mentioned earlier. He and I travelled all over England following Stones at that time, often getting home in the early hours after a long midweek away trip.

What level of football do you prefer? I like all football really, though I'm going off the Premiership a little due to how the players behave especially feigning injury and time wasting. I love to watch the Stones in the National League but still enjoy League One with MK, and also the Turkish League with Bodrumspoor.

• How big a part of your life is the game? I can truly say I have loved football for as long as I can remember. I loved playing the game despite being pretty useless as a goalkeeper, then later as a referee... including being turfed out of Barnet by Barry Fry after they lost an FA Cup tie I refereed.

How do you fit watching football in with your family/working life? Fortunately, my two sons are now grown up so watching games is not an issue.

What is your line of business? I am the

MD of a Company called OSMO - you will see our

advertising board behind the goal! We sell natural oil-based wood finishes.

Did the Stones' flying start surprise you this season? I was so pleased to see the positive start having sponsored the away travel! I have become good friends with club President Paul Rumens and also Chairman Rory who is also a member at Sandy Lodge where I am currently Captain.





THE SPITFIRES

he story of Eastleigh FC since its foundation by Derik Brooks in 1946 as 'Swaythling Athletic Football Club' has been one of upward mobility.

Playing home matches firstly on Southampton Common, and then at 'Westfield' in Swaythling, the new club were promoted into the Hampshire League in 1950 after two campaigns spent in the Southampton Senior League (West). Within another year, Athletic, (that appellation was dropped in 1973) had topped Division Three (West) and won the Hampshire Intermediate Cup. By 1956, Swaythling were playing in the 1st Division of the County league. They would return to that level in 1970 as champions of Division 2. In keeping with their early progress, the club moved to a new ground at Ten Acres in 1957 - which remains home to this day. The change to their current name was made in 1980, six years before Eastleigh F.C. became founder members of the Wessex League. The club settled at that level, until a distinguished period under the management of present Sutton United boss Paul Doswell which began in 2002/2003. Eastleigh were that season's Wessex League Champions. Twelve months later, they finished 4th in the Southern Football League Division One East. The club were beneficiaries of the F.A.'s restructuring of the non-league pyramid, and were elevated to begin 2004/2005 in the Premier Division of the Isthmian League. On-pitch advancement was being matched off the field. A new stand was constructed in time for the Isthmian campaign, which the team finished with a run of 14



hat was anough to earn Footlaid

matches. That was enough to earn Eastleigh a play-off berth, which they capitalised on fully. Victories over Braintree Town (2-0), and Leyton (1-0) ensured that Doswell had taken his team from Wessex League to Conference South in the space of three heady years. Development of the ground has continued, with improvements made in 2006 both to the stand opposite the main grandstand, and that behind the goal furthest from the clubhouse. Eastleigh's present owners, Bridle Insurance, whose purchase of a majority shareholding in the club was confirmed in February 2012, have further upgrading of the 'Silverlake Stadium' high on their list of priorities. Over nine years in the Conference South, Eastleigh have twice flirted with promotion to non-league's highest tier. In 2009, under the management of former Leeds United forward Ian Baird, the Spitfires lost a play-off semi-final against Hayes & Yeading United. A 4-0 extra-time home defeat cancelled out Eastleigh's 4-2 first-leg victory. In 2012/2013, a campaign which saw Baird replaced by current boss Richard Hill in September, the Spitfires' second half of the season form took them from

21st

to 4th place, and a play-off meeting with Dover Athletic, A 3-1 home reverse was wiped out with a 2-0 win in Kent, but, ultimately, a losing penalty shoot-out ended Eastleigh's promotion aspirations. The intervening years brought the Spitfires' only ever appearance in the F.A. Cup first round, and some silverware. The 2009/2010 cup adventure was ended by a last gasp goal which earned then Conference Premier team Barrow a 2-1 home win. Eastleigh's trophy joy came in the 2011/2012 Hampshire Senior Cup. In a final played at Southampton's St Mary's Stadium against AFC Totton - on a night which featured the first live testing of goal-line technology - the Spitfires were 2-0 winners. Eastleigh can lay claim to their part in football history then, but they hope to make headlines all of their own in the coming years. The high ambition of all involved with the club comes at no cost to the inclusive and fan friendly atmosphere which exists at the Silverlake Stadium. That is a fact to which founder, Director, and Life President, Derik Brooks will undoubtedly testify. Eastleigh's success didn't stop there - promotion was gained from the Conference South in 2014, where they won the league title. The following season, the Spitfires made the play-offs, however they couldn't

get past a strong Grimsby Town outfit who went on to gain promotion. The following season saw an impressive FA Cup run, in which Eastleigh took Championship side Bolton Wanderers to a replay. The following season was the same story, with Eastleigh losing away to Championship team Brentford in the Third Round. In the 2018/19 season, under the guidance of Ben Strevens, Eastleigh finished 7th in the Vanarama National League. This meant they would face Wrexham in the Play Off Eliminator. The game finished 0-0 after normal time and it took a Danny Hollands wonder strike to send Eastleigh through to the Play Off semi finals versus Salford. Again the semi final went to extra time after the game finished 1-1. Only for Eastleigh to narrowly avoid a trip to Wembley after being knocked out on penalties.

Eastleigh adopted their 'Spitfires' moniker after consultation with supporters during the close season of 2005. Southampton International Airport (previously known as Eastleigh Airport) was home for the assembly of the Supermarine Type F37/34 Spitfire once the aircraft had been built in nearby Woolston. The F37/34's maiden flight, piloted by 'Mutt' Summers' and watched by designer R.J. Mitchell, took place at Eastleigh Airport on 5th March 1936.

McDonnell joined for the 2020/21 season from fellow National Leagueside Notts County. The 26-year-old also holds Football League experience with AFC Wimbledon, where heplayed for five and a half years before his move to the Magpies. Joe began his footballing career at Basingstoke Town.

2. BRENNAN CAMP - DEFENCE

Camp joined Eastleigh on a permanent basis in June 2022 from Bournmouth where he made several first team appearances. Brennan also spent time on loan at Poole Town, Dorchester Town and Weymouth.

3. MICHAEL KELLY - DEFENCE

Kelly started his career at Aberdeen before moving to Leicester City in 2015. He was then released and went on trial with Stoke City. Michael signed for Bristol Rovers in 2017 and then Yeovil Town in 2021 before signing for the Spitfires.

4. NIGEL ATANGANA - MIDFIELD

The defensive midfielder joined the Spitfires on a permanent deal having played for Exeter City since 2019. In December 2019, Atangana was awarded player of the month by the fans after breaking into the squad following his recovery from an injury. Atangana is well travelled having played for three French teams and a Spanish team before playing for numerous English clubs including Portsmouth, Leyton Orient and Cheltenham Town to name a few.

5. AARON MARTIN - DEFENCE

He began his career Eastleigh, before turning professional with Southampton in 2009. He spent the 2012-13 season on loan at Crystal Palace and Coventry City before He signed with Birmingham City and played eight Championship games, before joining Yeovil in 2014. He joined Coventry City then Oxford United before moving on to Exeter City then Hamilton Academical in 2020. He England at the end of the 2020-21 to sign for Port Vale before returning to rejoin Eastleigh

6. CHRISTIAN MAGHOMA - DEFENCE

Christian began his career at Tottenham and had a loan spell ay Yeovil before signing for Polish side Arka Gdynia. In 2020 he signed for Gillingham from who he joined Eastleigh following a loan period. Christian has represented England at U16's.

He returned to England in 2019 with National League rivals Maidenhead United, scoring 13 goals in 36 games in a season cut short by the coronavirus pandemic. Whitehall then crossed the border into Scotland with Kilmarnock, finding the net twice in 16 appearances for Killie.

10. JAKE HESKETH - MIDFIELD


Jake signed from southampton

where he made four appearances . He has plenty of Football League experience under his belt, with loan spells at Burton Albion, MK Dons, Lincoln City, and Crawley Town across the past three seasons.

11. RYAN HILL - MIDFIELD

Ross has football league experience, most notably with Barnet and Gillingham, the latter of whom he left for Eastleigh. Other destinations during a well-travelled career have been. Fulham, Brighton & Hove Albion, Doncaster Rovers, Yeading, Grays Athletic, Croydon Athletic, and Dover Athletic.

14. TRISTAN ABRAHAMS - FORWARD

Tristan signed from Carlisle. He started his career at Levton Orientbefore he joined Norwich City and he gained further Football League experience with loan spells at Exeter City and Yeovil Town in the 2018-19 season. After leaving Norwich in 2019, Tristan joined Newport County. He joined Carlisle in the summer of 2021 and spent the second half of last season on loan at Grimsby Town, helping them to promotion to League Two via the National League play-offs.

Jubilation! It's the letter J and our head alphabeteer revisits Jolly, Jonah... and those wonderful stickman cartoons

o here we are, our first JANUARY home game of the season. It looks to be a busy one that is sure to test our trusty ground staff, with home league matches scheduled against Eastleigh, Chesterfield, Oldham and Gateshead. On top of this, potentially a couple of cup ties too, with Brentford due to visit in the Middlesex Senior Cup and hopefully an FA Trophy tie.

The latter is of course subject to the unlikely double of a) us winning at Chelmsford and b) being drawn at home. By the time you read this you will know the answers - the perils of having to write an article just after the Bromley game because the printer is selfishly taking a holiday and setting silly deadlines!

Since our return to the National League, we have only won one League match in JANUARY. and that was against rock-bottom basket-case Dover, and they could count themselves unlucky that day.

JANUARY is often a month for postponements with waterlogged or frozen pitches in abundance. THE SPIREITES

otentially five or more teams have been called Chesterfield Football Club at different times. A Derbyshire Times newspaper report from 2 January 1864 noted a scheduled game between "Chesterfield and Norton football clubs", suggesting that a Chesterfield FC, whether loosely or formally organised, was active from at least 1863.

A second Chesterfield FC was formally created as an offshoot of Chesterfield Cricket Club in October 1867. The cricket and football clubs moved to the Recreation Ground at Saltergate in 1871, the same year that they became separate entities. However, a souring of the relationship between the two led to the closure of the football club in 1881, when it found itself homeless. Many players joined other local sides, notably Chesterfield Livingstone, a club that took up using the Saltergate site, and Chesterfield Spital, a team which competed in the early years of the FA Cup.

Three years later, in 1884, a third entity called Chesterfield Football Club was formed, again making its home at Saltergate. It drew in players from the preceding club and both Chesterfield Livingstone and Chesterfield Spital, though records show Spital continued as a separate club. After changing its name to Chesterfield Town, the club turned professional in 1891 and won several local trophies in the following two seasons, entering the FA Cup for the first time in 1892. For the 1892–93 season, the club wore an extraordinary playing strip of all dark blue with the Union Jack emblazoned across the front of the shirt. Chesterfield joined the Midland League in 1896, and successfully applied for a place in the Second Divi-



sion of the Football League at the start of the 1899–1900 season, finishing seventh. After finishing bottom of the League three years in a row, the club failed to gain re-election to the League in 1909, returning to the Midland League.

In 1915 Chesterfield Town was put into voluntary liquidation and a new club with the same name was formed by a local restaurateur to play wartime football using locally based 'guests' from Football League clubs. It lasted only two years before its management and players were suspended by the FA for illegal payments and the club shut down.

The current Chesterfield FC was formed on 24 April 1919 by Chesterfield Borough Council, seeing it as a way to spearhead improvements in local recreational provision. Initially called Chesterfield Municipal, the club made great strides on the pitch in its first season, lifting the Midland League title – and did so despite three changes of management. However, The Football Association and the Football League had already made clear their vehement opposition to a council-run club and ultimately forced it to cut its ties and become independent, reflected in a name change to Chesterfield FC in December

1920.

In 1921–22, Chesterfield became a founder member of the new Football League Third Division North and won the league title in the 1930–31 season and were promoted to the Second Division. Relegation followed in 1933, but the Third Division North title was again won in 1936.

After the war the club achieved their best League position, finishing fourth in the Second Division in 1946–47 but were relegated at the end of the 1950–51 season. They were placed in the Third Division on its formation at the start of the 1958–59 season; future England international goalkeeper Gordon Banks made his professional debut in a Third Division game in November 1958, but was sold to Leicester City for a then-club record £7,000 fee at the end of the season. In 1961 Chesterfield were relegated to the Fourth Division for the first time.

Chesterfield spent eight seasons in the Fourth Division, earning promotion as champions in 1969–70. The Anglo-Scottish Cup was won in 1981. The club was relegated in 1983–84, and won the Fourth Division title the following season. Financial difficulties forced Chesterfield Borough Council to bail out the club in 1985 and the club's training ground to be sold. Relegation followed in 1988–89; Chester-

field reached the play-off competition a year later, but were beaten by Cambridge United in the play-off final. Play-off victories over local rivals Mansfield Town and Bury in 1994–95 to earn promotion to the redesignated Second Division. The 1996–97 season saw Chesterfield beat six clubs including Premier League side Nottingham Forest to reach the semi-final of the FA Cup for the first time. The semi-final match against Middlesbrough was contentiously drawn 3–3 after extra time; Chesterfield lost the replay 3–0.

The club were relegated to the Third Division in 2000. The following year, Chesterfield were deducted nine points for financial irregularities. Amid mounting evidence of fraud ownership passed to a hastily organised fans' group, the Chesterfield Football Supporters Society. Massive debts forced the club into administration, but the team still secured the division's final automatic promotion place. Chesterfield were relegated to League Two at the end of the 2006–07 season.

The club departed its historic home at Saltergate at the end of the 2009–10 season, and moved to newly built B2net Stadium. Chesterfield were promoted to League One after winning the League Two title in 2010–11 season. They went on to win the EFL Trophy for the first time in March 2012, defeating Swindon Town 2–0 in the final. However they were relegated out of League One the following month, before again returning to the third tier as League Two champions at the end of the 2013–14 season.

Chesterfield secured sixth-place in League One at the end of the 2014–15 campaign.

Following relegation to League Two in 2017/1 the club was again relegated out of the English Football League at the end of the 2017–18 season.

In the 2020-21 season Chesterfield finished in 6th place in the National League, losing 3-2 away to Notts County in the play-off quarter final.

Last season Chesterfield grabbed the last play off spot by finishing 7th on 74 points. Having beaten FC Halifax 2-1 away in the Quarter finals, Chesterfield lost 3-1 to Solihulll away in the Semi Finals.

Opposition in focus CHESTERFIELD FC

1. ROSS FITZSIMONS - GOALKEEPER

Fitzsimons rejoined the Spireites after a previous spell on loan at the club from Notts County in the 2019/20 campaign. He had been playing in Gibraltar for St Joseph's. Fitzsimons was at Weymouth last season, following stints at Stockport County and Boston United. Fitzsimons, who started his career at Crystal Palace, spent three years at Notts between 2017 and 2020.

3. BRANDEN HORTON- DEFENCE

Horton joined the Spireites in the summer after making 20 appearances for Doncaster in League One last season. He spent five years with the South Yorkshire club and had two loan spells with Gainsborough Trinity in the Northern Premier League between 2018 and 2019.

4. TIM AKINOLA - MIDFIELD

The young midfielder recently joined the Spireites on loan from Arsenal until the end of the season. Akinola is a tireless defensive midfielder with strong technical qualities who played youth football with Lincoln City and Huddersfield Town before joining Arsenal in 2020. He had a spell on loan at Dundee United last season.

5. JAMIE GRIMES - DEFENCE

The central defender joined Chesterfield last summer after helping Hereford reach the FA Trophy final at Wembley at the end of last season. The 30-year-old's former clubs include Ebbsfleet United, Macclesfield Town, Cheltenham Town and Dover Athletic.

6. LAURENCE MAGUIRE- DEFENCE

Maguire is a proud product of Chesterfield's academy. He was loaned out to AFC Fylde in 2017 for a short spell. Laurence, who is the brother of Manchester United and England star Harry Maguire, has represented England C.

7. LIAM MANDEVILLE - MIDFIELD

Mandeville began his career at Doncaster Rovers, coming through the club's academy before breaking into the first team. He spent time on loan at Whitby Town and Colchester, before spending the 2018/19 on loan at Morecambe. He signed for the Spireites ahead of the 2019/20 campaign. In 2016, he was awarded an EFL Young Player of the Month award for his performances at Doncaster in League Two.

 KABONGO TSHIMANGA - FORWARD Tshimanga was signed following a prolific spell at





Boreham Wood. He was previously at Oxford City and Boston United after starting out at MK Dons. Born in the Democratic Republic of Congo, Tshimanga has represented the England C team. He suffered a fractured leg and dislocated ankle in mid-February, ruling him out for the rest of the season.

10. GEORGE COOPER - MIDFIELD

Cooper started his career with Crewe Alexandra, making his way through the academy and into the first team. He amassed close to 150 appearances before moving to Peterborough United in 2018. Cooper moved to Plymouth in August 2019 where he won promotion to League One. He joined the Spireites in the summer.

11. JACK CLARKE - MIDFIELD

Clarke joined the Spireites on loan from Aston Villa in January 2021. The young midfielder started out with Villa's U9s and had a spell on loan at Yeovil Town before arriving at the Technique Stadium. He was signed permanently last summer.

12. TYRONE WILLIAMS - DEFENCE

Williams was signed from National League rivals Solihull Moors for an undisclosed fee last November. The central defender, who agreed a contract until 2024, joined Solihull in January 2018. He was previously at Kidderminster and Hednesdford.

15. JOE COOK - DEFENCE

Cook was signed from Bognor Regis Town in the summer. The central defender started off his career with a stint at Sheffield Wednesday. Cook joined Winchester after leaving the Owls. A loan at Bognor Regis followed during his spell at Havant & Waterlooville in a move that became permanent in 2020.

16. RYHEEM SHECKLEFORD - DEFENCE

Sheckleford signed for the Spireites in the summer after leaving Maidenhead. He started his career with Fulham, playing for the U18s, U19s, U21s and U23s. The right-back was part of the Fulham squad that reached the 2014 FA Youth Cup final. He gained some first-team experience at **Wealdstone** in 2016 before leaving Craven Cottage in 2017.

17. ARMANDO DOBRA - DEFENCE

Dobra signed a two-year contract to join Chesterfield in the summer after leaving Ipswich Town. The Albania Under-21 international had a season-long loan at Colchester United last term, scoring two goals in 17 appearances..

19. AKWASI ASANTE - FORWARD

Born in Amsterdam, Akwasi moved to England to join Birmingham City, where he settled into the youth system before signing a professional contract with the club in 2011. After being released by Birmingham in the summer of 2014, Akwasi signed for Kidderminster Harriers. Spells at Solihull Moors and Chester followed before he moved to Gloucester City, where he scored eight goals in nine appearances. He was signed by the Spireltes for an undisclosed fee in

20. JEFF KING - DEFENCE

December 2020.

King joined Chesterfield after winning FC Halifax Town's Player of the Year award last season and being named in the Vanarama Team of the Season. King joined Halifax from St Mirren two years ago after playing for a number of clubs including Bolton Wanderers.

22. MICHAEL GYASI - FORWARD

Gyasi started his career with the academies at Northampton Town, Chelsea & Leicester City. He enjoyed spells at Nuneaton Borough, Bedford LAST SEASON

Town, Barton Rovers, Phonix Lubeck and St Ives Town after leaving the Foxes. Gyasi moved to King's Lynn 2020. He moved on loan to Dover Athletic for the second half of last season.

26. DARREN OLDAKER - MIDFIELD

Oldaker started his career in Queens Park Rangers' academy before spending four years with Gillingham. After leaving Priestfield, he had spells at Billericay Town and Westfield. He also spent some time with Welling United. Oldaker moved to Dorking in 2021.

27. JOE QUIGLEY - FORWARD

Quigley was signed from Yeovil Town in January. He began his career at Bournemouth before joining Maidstone United in 2018. The Republic of Ireland U21 international then played for Bromley and Dagenham & Redbridge before joining Yeovil in 2020.

28. OLLIE BANKS - MIDFIELD

Banks rejoined Chesterfield in the summer from Barrow. Banks joined Oldham Athletic in a spell that including loans at Tranmere Rovers and Swindon Town. Banks moved to Barrow in 2021 playing a big part in helping Barrow secure their League Two status for the 2022/23 season.

31. LUCAS COVOLAN - GOALKEEPER The Brazilian was signed over the summer on a

season-long loan from Port Vale. Covolan has played for a number of clubs including Torquay United, scoring for them in the 2021 National League play-off final.

33. BAILEY CLEMENTS -

DEFENCE The young full-back spent 14 years at boyhood club lpswich Town before joining Chesterfield in the summer. He has had loan spells at Hemel Hempstead, Dagenham & Redbridge and Stevenage.

The view from the away end

Our away support is great, plenty of nutters prepared to travel to ridiculous places on Tuesday nights at the other end of the country

Do you live in the town? Yes, I live in Chesterfield, just a 2-minute walk from the ground. Lived in Wales for three years for Uni, but still made sure I made a fair few Chesterfield games via a long train ride.

Who first took you to games? My Dad - he started taking me when I was ten - not sure what my first game was and if I'm honest, I had a couple of seasons where I wasn't that bothered about watching the football, spending a decent chunk of a game kicking a coke bottle around. But then in the 2003/04 season a 2-1 defeat to Colchester on a Tuesday night caught my attention for some reason.. I think it was a dramatic game, and the floodlights were on. Fair play to my Dad for being so persistent, I hope I'm that patient when I have kids!

Your best moment watching Town? That was the last time we won League Two. We secured it away at Burton, 2 goals from Jay O'Shea. We had more fans in their end than I think we were legally allowed, so it was buzzing.

My favourite trips from the last couple of years would be: Grimsby away 2021/22 - won 1-0 in the last minute against a side who we've had plenty of scrapes with in the past. Full away end, amazing celebrations. Chelsea away 2021/22 goes without saving. One of the best moments full stop. Something you'll bore the grandkids with. We took 5,800 fans and filled one end of the ground and scored a late consolation in 5-1 defeat. Maidstone away 2022/23 - a weird inclu-



sion from this season. But it was a classic day of, lots of travel, terrible performance, and a winner with the last kick of the game.

What's the fan base like? We probably have a core 3,000 at home that will always turn up, but have the ability to push that towards 7/8,000 if we're on a roll. Our away support is definitely up there, plenty of nutters like myself to chuck themselves at ridiculous Tuesday night games at the other end of the country. I expect we'll have about 300 there tonight, most of the fans getting down via the club travel, or by Bridge Inn travel, a fan organised one, which I take - it's put together by two lovely people, Paul and Kimberley, who do so much for the club and fan base.

I went to Wealdstone last year. My first time. I really enjoyed it. A nice ground for this level. exactly what it says on the tin. I remember the crowd making it a pressurised atmosphere. and making it really hard for us. My main

memory was Quigley scoring his first goal for us as we won 2-1.

What's the club's natural level? Probably top end of League Two, bottom end of League One if I'm being honest. But we're down here because we deserve it, thanks to our lovely former board. Unfortunately our first two NL years were two relegation battles so far... this season It's definitely like a case of 'get top three and hope we end up close enough to County and Wrexham that we can make them sweat'. Head says 3rd, heart says that they're both bound to have a bad run.

How awful was it losing your EFL status? With all respect to the teams down here, it was a punch in the gut. When we lost in a relegation six-pointer to Grimsby in the last minute, which all but sent us down, I must have sat and stared in to space for 30 minutes.

Is there a stigma to being non-League? There is a stigma, but it was worse because we'd never been there, and were such an old club with a proud history. It's hard to say whether things have matched my stereotype, because we've been so bad ourselves!

Who's been Chesterfield's best-ever manager in your opinion? Paul Cook by a million miles - he nearly took us to the championship, and we didn't even have a striker. The football we played had Championship sides afraid of being shown up. Might not see the likes of it again.

Who are the Town players to watch out for? Our stand out players have been Ollie Banks who runs our midfield and has already pitched in with several assists. Jeff King has been the other star, and has amazing numbers for a full back. He's also scored a lot of free kicks. The scouse Becks.

Has the cost of living crisis affected fan numbers this year? Personally it's been an



expensive year for me, as I got married in April. So there has definitely been times I've had to choose between having money for a social life, and money to drag myself to a game! However I've got it lucky compared to people with children. Football is so expensive, and I've had a few mates who have had to put town to the side to prioritise their family. My wife is very understanding and doesn't question when I suddenly disappear to the other end of the country. Work is more difficult due to the hours I do working in the care sector, but I usually find a way! I'm currently seeing if I can make the

Wealdstone trip - It's a long trip on a Tuesday night, but we take a couple of hundred every where. So I'd expect around that.

Might you watch on the streaming service? It's fantastic for exiles but I'm not a big fan. I do think it will have a negative effect on those sitting on the fence wondering whether to go - it's an easy option to just sit at home. I'm sure it won't be long before you can screen them for free using certain devices and VPNs which will have a disastrous effect. In the end, whether it's right or wrong it's been done to appease Wrexham - which should never be the catalyst for anything.

OUR record on January 10 is quite appalling! Eight recent games and no wins since 1984, when we bashed Barnet 3-0 at Lower Mead to keep alive hopes of the Alliance Premier League title (the forerunner of the National League but with no big ex-EFL clubs in those days).

And our most recent game on this date has quite a story to tell...

Saturday January 10th 2014, FA Trophy Second Round Proper: Wealdstone 1 Bath City 3

OR over 30 years Bath City were our nemesis. We'd played the Somerset club year in, year out in our Southern League days and the 'Romans' were respected as formidable opponents. Indeed we had recorded just two wins against them in all that time ... and when our paths first

crossed again eight years ago in the Conference South (following Stones promotion from the Ryman League) it was

like nothing had changed. We lost 2-1 at the Vale in September 2014 and no one was surprised.

But then we were in the midst of Raidermania, Gordon Bartlett had refashioned and strengthened his team and we had a trip to face Bath at their Twerton Park fortress just before Christmas. And we won 1-0 with a late late goal!

In terms of drama and joyous surprise, it was right up there with Jack Cook's injury time winner at York.

It concluded a run of six wins in seven games, and making his full debut at Twerton was one Jefferson Louis. And Richard Jolly, returning to the



club after a premature retirement, came on as sub to play a part in Joe Turner's 89th minute winner!

I had an interesting insight into Bath City from one of their fans, Martin Powell, who had been a teacher at West Lodge school in Pinner in the 1970s and 80s and (naturally) followed the Stones despite being growing up in Somerset a Bath fan.

He had since returned to the Roman city and was leading a campaign called The Big Bath City bid - alongside director and film producer Ken Loach - to put the club back into the hands of the community after years of stagnation.

Their average crowds in the Conference South were down to a club record low figure of barely 500 in this 2014-15 season (having always been around the 1500-2,000 figure in the Southern League and Conference National years) and Martin was telling me that they needed to spark interest in the club through success in the league (they were mid table) or a cup run.

No sooner had we had that conversation earlier in the season than they were dumped out of the FA Cup 7-1 at East Thurrock United!

But City were slowly building momentum (like the Stones) and it was the sort of tie neither club wanted when the FA Trophy second round draw pitched the two clubs together at Grosvenor Vale on January 10.

We had followed up those successive wins with four successive draws against Sutton (twice), leaders Bromley and Hemel Hempstead and were now unbeaten in eleven games. We had reached this last-32 clash by beating fellow NLS outfits St Albans (3-0 in a replay) and then Hayes & Yeading 1-0 at the Vale, while Bath eliminated Gloucester City 3-1 in a replay... and then shocked the non-League world by winning 2-0 at Bristol Rovers in the First Round Proper.

This was a game that provided one of those coinci-

dences that seem to pop up so often in football: Rovers were relegated from the EFL for the first time in their history and spent just one season in the Conference

before bouncing straight back up, and they had spent ten years groundsharing at Bath's Twerton Park in the mid-80s to mid-90s when they had to leave their old Eastville stadium.

And now they are drawn against their old landlords in their one season in the FA

Trophy!

It was a major shock when City won the tie 2-0 at Rovers' Memorial Ground (the rugby stadium they have called home for 25 years) thanks to two defensive blunders. Rovers weren't too distressed as they were concentrating on winning back their place in League Two, but Martin Powell described that day as one of the greatest he'd experience in 50-odd years of following the Romans.

Yet it was to get better for the increasingly-big Bath following. When they pitched up at

the Vale off the back of that win at Rovers I remember beng impressed at the 250 or more City fans and their many flags and banners. Back in those NL South days an away following of over 200 was a real rarity... and they had plenty to get excited about in a fairytale start to the game.

Lively winger Andy Watkins seized on a half chance in the very first minute to slip the ball under Jonathan North for 1-1. And although Elliott Godfrey threw himself at a clever Jolly cross to head an equaliser five minutes later we found ourselves deservedly 3-1 down at the break.

Andy Kington and Frankie Artus sent two sizzling finishes past the despairing North and the Bath fans cavorted in the Bulla Stand. We just weren't able to get the final ball right and with the evergreen Scott McGleish out of sorts (and wearing what looked like a tea cosy to protect a head injury sustained in the previous week's bruising draw with



Hemel) it simply wasn't our day.

It was summed up for me when a beautiful cross from the left picked out the flying McGleish and he headed badly wide, just six yards out. The tore off his hat and threw it to the ground in frustration.

nd so the Stones were out... but it was just the halfway stage in Bath's greatest FA Trophy odyssey in their history. It is quite amazing that a club the size of the Romans has never played at Wembley: All those years as top dogs or front runners in the Southern League and then the early days of the Conference, and never getting close to the glamour of the national stadium.

Yet eight years ago they thought they were finally making the pilgrimage up the M4. After the win at the Vale, Bath were drawn at home to mid-table Conference National side Altrincham in Round Three

and came through 1-0 in front of a disappoitning 700-strong crowd. The hardworking Dave Pratt (remember him?) scored the only goal...and repeated the trick in a 2-1 eclipse of another Connie National side, Dover, in the quarter final, also at Twerton Park.

Again the crowd was under 1,000 - 893 to be precise - but Trophy fever was building in Bath according to my City pal Martin.

"When we drew North Ferriby United in the semi-final it was perplexing as no-one had ever really heard of them... they were a village team from Hull, population just 4,000, playing above themselves it seemed in the Conference North. So we were confident."

But that was terribly misplaced as the Humberside club raced into a 2-0 lead in the first leg at Twerton Park. The 1,730 crowd were stunned into silence and the atmosphere never really got going until the final stages when a stirring City rally saw Pratt (from the penalty spot) and Nick McCootie salvage a 2-2 draw.

There was plenty of anger aimed at the officials at the end of the game. Including a couple of photographers caught on the wrong end of the lens!

"That was a relief to be going to the away game all-square but North Ferriby were very dangerous - mainly through Jason St Juste who was a real livewire and we couldn't contain him" said Martin.

he St Kitts and Nevis international winger ran Bath ragged but it was City who took an early lead from a McCootie header to delight the 400 travelling

fans in the 1,871 crowd. As the game wore on, Ferriby took a grip and it was no surprise when King levelled from the penalty spot (awarded from a push in the penalty box) to send the game into extra time.

And when it finished all square after 120 minutes Martin just sensed it wasn't Bath's day. "We looked tense. Ferriby seemed more relaxed, as if they were going to enjoy the occasion no matter what happened... and both our first two penalties were saved in the shoot-out". That man Pratt, and



he village side could hardly believe they were going to Wembley. And they were to face Wrexham in the final, whose fans made up the vast majority of the 14,585 crowd that Saturday in May 2015.

Of course the Welsh legions thought they were going to win, but on a rollercoaster afternoon it was the West Indian winger St Juste who was the difference between the sides. Wrexham led 2-0; Ferriby came back to level at 2-2 thanks to substitute Ryan Kendall in the final minutes... and they then led 3-2 until a terrific later Wrexham leveller.

And then it was the Ferriby Fairytale that came true as they triumphed again on penalties. What an extraordinary game this is!
