

## Written in Stone

lelcome to Wealdstone! It's not quite as well known as the Wrecsam phrase but it's nevertheless as warm a greeting for York city's players, officials and supporters this afternoon.

Last Saturday's trip to the Racecourse Ground will long be remembered for many things - the biggest ever crowd to watch a Wealdstone league game; a towering performance from the blues especially in the first half; a terrific solo goal from Tarryn Allarakhia.

In my opinion, Wrexham just about deserved to win last Saturday thanks to their power up front. We played some terrific football, drawing plaudits from all and sundry yet the overall taste in the mouth at the final whistle was a sour one as the big decisions (not least Max Kretzschmar's two yellow cards) went against us.

He will be suspended today as we seek to

record our first NL 'double' of the season following the Stones' smash-and-grab 2-1 win at York in November. The Minstermen were under the control of interim Manager Tim Ryan that afternoon (the popular John Askey having just been dismissed) and amazingly they will be bossed by another stand-in today in Mikey Morton after Askey's replacement David Webb was himself dismissed ten days ago!

Morton steered the side to a 2-0 FA Trophy win at Southend last Saturday to reach the quarter finals so we'll have to be at our best today for a repeat of the gritty 1-0 win over Dagenham & Redbridge in our last NL outing here at the Vale.

We're on the road for the next couple of weeks with tough trips to Chesterfield (Tuesday 7.45) and Woking next Saturday 3pm - followed by Halifax away on Tuesday Feb 28th (7.45)

#### OBITUARY - BRIAN LEE

It is with the greatest of regret and deepest sadness that the National League announces the passing of Brian Lee MBE, former Chairman and President of the League. He passed peacefully in hospital on Sunday 12 February.

During his lifetime of achievements in football Brian was so well respected and received wherever he went. Many individuals and clubs will owe a debt of gratitude for his persistence and foresight in laying down foundations on which clubs depend.

The National League recognised Brian's commitment across many aspects of the game when presenting him with a special recognition award at their Gala Awards Evening in June 2022.

High on the list of achievements was the formation of the National League Trust, aided by the Premier League and PFA, which Brian developed the seed of club community engagement into the flower which successfully blossoms across the membership today.

Brian had a playing, coaching and managerial career during his early life and he became director of Bisham Abbey, after his time at

Lilleshall which played a pivotal role as a training base for England's success in the 1966 World

Brian went on to manage Wycombe Wanderers and was instrumental in the move to, and building of, their current stadium, Adams Park.

Involvement with the National League, previously the Football Conference, started back in 1991 as Vice Chairman and then elevated to Chairman in 2007.

Over the ensuing years he led the competition with an assurance and dignity befitting his experience in the game. He stepped down from that position in June 2015 and accepted the honour to become President and in the same year was honoured with an MBE to recognise his service to football.

Brian touched so many lives inside and outside of the game. His influence cannot be underestimated, and his passing is a tremendous blow to the family so soon after the passing of his wife and soulmate Shirley-Ann.

As a mark of respect, the League will observe a one-minute silence before this afternoon's game.

THE UPDATE INTERVIEW BY TIM PARKS

Alex Dyer's on fire! The veteran midfielder explains his return to form..and hands out tributes to his team mates & the management

lex Dyer seems like a new man! After relighting his career at Grosvenor Vale 23 years ago, fresh out of the Northampton Town academy and going on to play in the Swedish and Norwegian top flights, he returned to the Stones as a seasoned 30-year at the beginning of the 2020-21 Behind Closed Doors season and was in great form.

But after barely starting a game in the second half of last season it seemed the midfielder's days were numbered. He was unable to force his way back into the team... and then, suddenly, it was like the 20 year old Alex Dyer had returned, all snake-hips passing and snap in the tackle!

His return to form is captured by two moments in the recent games against Yeovil and Dagenham & Redbridge ... moments that so nearly won all three points at the Huish, and then preserved the win against Daggers at the Vale.

As we pressed for a winner at Yeovil he sashayed past three defenders and stroked a 20-yarder through the legs of the last man... only to be denied by an astonishing save from keeper Grant Smith.

"I didn't really allow the time to dedicate myself to my craft - now I've sorted my life and work and football schedule out, and spend more time in the gym and maintaining my fitness - at my age it's more about maintenance than the value of full-on training.

"The management team have found a way of getting the best out of me, mainly by putting a rocket up my a\*\*\*! When I watched the games back I realised I wasn't intense enough.

"As I said in my last interview with you, I never had any pace so I've not lost any!

"But now I've lost a bit of weight, a few kilos and I'm more switched on, sharper and brighter and it all starts with the brain.

" Plus now we have dynamic and athletic players around me in midfield. Assembling this squad is massive credit to Stuart, Matty and Rory the chairman: In the COVID season it was so difficult with that group of players and the changing


room was fractious... now it's full of respectful, hard-working players and that's the key. No-one works harder than Stuart and Matty and it's the attention to detail and research that makes us hard to beat. And they are part time too!

"People don't realise how incredible that is ... if you were contracted to working half the hours of your competitors you'd fail, but they put in the hard work and have fostered a great culture here."

since we last spoke Alex has moved from Edmonton in North London to Stratford, and is busy (though maintaining that es-



sential football focus) on his property development business. "I also do some work for my cousin's property business and it's going well. We have properties right across London but it's harder work than you'd imagine from watching Homes Under The Hammer!"

Alex played 137 times for the Stones in the Ryman League between 2010-13 and scored 30-odd goals in his attacking midfield role. He then moved to Welling in the Conference - and then famously to Ostersunds in the Swedish second division, where he won promotion under boss Graham Potter. Two years later he signed for fellow top flight side Elfsborg, and then on to Lillestrom in the Norwegian League.

I asked him: is this the best football you've played since those days in Scandinavia?

"Yes, I certainly think I'm in my best form since returning to the club three years ago... our style of play allows me to be free and I have licence to push on and attack, and try to go past players with the ball. We are encouraged to be brave on the ball and I'm really enjoying it."

Towards the end of 2022 we had a 20-strong contingent of Norwegian fans enjoying a boister-



e've had some truly committed players, we've had some outrageously talented players but there are few ex-Stones who have managed to ingrain themselves into the fabric of the club.

Players who put an immediate smile on the faces of the fans. Players who will be recalled by generations of supporters, with happy memories passed around like sherbet lemons.

Players like Peter Dean.

It's ten years ago to the day that cult hero Deano scored four memorable goals in a 6-1 pasting of Lewes at the Vale to join a pretty limited list of players who have hit a quadruple in a Stones shirt. Matt Farrell, Eddie Dillsworth, George Duck, Mark Graves, Robin Wainwright... it's an elite bunch and Pete is flattered that people even remember his name.

That Monday evening in Ruislip is captured forever on You Tube and I asked Deano if he'd seen it. "Of course I've seen it" he laughed. "Blimey, I've shared it with almost

everyone I know!"


What an evening that was. The Stones were pushing for a play-off spot in the Ryman Prem, but eventual champions Whitehawk wrere pretty much over the horizon and Gordon Bartlett's side had lost games against Wingate & Finchley, Canvey Island and Kingstonian since the turn of the year.

Just two days before the Lewes game, Stones were trailing Margate 1-0 at the Vale with ten minutes remaining. Our playoff aspirations looked a bit far fetched ... and then skipper Wes Parker popped with two late goals to nab all three points in a fabulous finale.

In those days the club had opted to play midweek games on Mondays (mainly to avoid competing with all-consuming Champions League games) so it was barely 48 hours later when Stones trotted out again to face the awkward Lewes side.

Bartlett had warned about a lack of energy and said he hoped we could carry on where we'd left off against Margate... and didn't we just! Deano's first: Chappell (No3) puts it on a plate





Within half an hour the Stones were 5-0 up with Deano leading the way with an inspirational hat trick.

"It was one of those nights when everything i touched seemed to go in" said the now 36-year-old striker. "I managed to convert two terrific near post crosses from Chapps (left back Lee Chappell) but the best was my third goal when Jolls' cross was deflected up into the air and I hit

an overhead kick into the net from the edge of the box".

ete doesn't do himself justice with that description: it was a piece of genuine athleticism with the ball arrowing just inside the left hand post as we watched from behind the goal. I was in my usual elevated position at the railings by the tea bar and remember the bemused looks on the faces of the Lewes defenders as Deano ran off towards the Brian Collins stand to celebrate his goal. It was like they'd stumbled into a Lionel Messi

"I loved to be a bit mavericky, trying bicycle kicks and back heels whenever I got the chance. I try them now in five a sides but my body regrets it!" says Deano.

exhibition game!

He reckoned his main attribute was his work rate, which definitely endeared him to the fans. Plus his understanding with the mercurial Richard Jolly which was often telepathic in his three main seasons with the Stones from 2010 to 2013.

"Did you work on that understanding in training?" I asked him. "No not really - we only had an hour and a half on the training pitch every week and none of that was patterns of play, like they do now. We played purely on instinct really and in games when we were attacking from the flanks he'd go one way and I'd go the other.

"Jolls could play games where he didn't seem interested for 90 minutes then he'd pop up, score and take all the plaudits!"

eano was at Watford for three years as a youth and then YTS player before being released - then it was off to Hayes in the Conference where he was sacked by manager Willie Wordsworth after a row on the pitch. He then joined Northwood.

"That was in the Southern League - there was I, a blonde skinny 19-year-old up front on my own being kicked around by these big horrible players. That was the way it was in the Southern

League; it was very physical".

Wealdstone (in the Ryman Prem) were ground sharing at Northwood's Chestnut Avenue and the canny Bartlett lured Deano across to join a talented squad that included Lee O'Leary, Ryan Ashe, Graeme Montgomery and the twin leviathan centre backs Marcus Gross and James Gray.

"We went to Folkestone on the opening day of the 2007-8 season, I scored twice and we won 4-2... even though I had a terrible hangover from the Friday night.

Nobody knew about it!" he said. "But I was young and wanted to play as high as I could, and Bishops Stortford lured me over to play for them in the Conference South".

But it wasn't to last long. "I was living in Ruislip and the journey to stortford was horrible. Then the manager was sacked; I was out of favour and went across to play for Hendon for a couple of years".

he prospect of playing just round the corner in Ruislip was too strong. Gordon Bartlett resigned him just after the start of the 2010-12 season

and Deano ended up playing 52 games and scoring 25 goals ... not bad for a No.10!

"Those were the best seasons of my career" he said. "Some great memories... the Trophy run in 2012 when I was in and out of the side, with Britt Assombalonga coming in on loan, but I got my chance in the Dartford and Cambridge United games. Amazing wins. I didn't think I'd play in the semi final against Newport but Gordon took me to one side and said I was starting... we nearly



nicked it didn't we?"

Pete hit an instinctive low 25-yarder that produced a spectacular save from the home keeper just as Stones threatened to turn the game on its head.


Then there was the play-off semi final against Concord Rangers when Stones led 1-0 until the final moments.

"Again, I didn't think I was playing until right on kick off. And we played so well, I remember the Cowley brothers jumping up and down in the dugout, amazed and delighted to that they'd beaten us".

"And what about the last day of the season against Canvey Island

the next year when we were promoted? And your glorious finale?" I asked him.

"Well, that was just meant to be. It hadn't been a happy season for me... after Glenn Little had come on as sub for me against Enfield back in august or September time, and turned the game around I did t get much of a look-in. Chaps and Chris O'Leary had gone to St Albans that summer when Jimmy Gray was made manager and he asked me over too... I scored on my debut but it didn't work out for me and Wealdstone were on



"I was on the brink of giving up but Gordon got in touch and said 'we need you to sit on the bench and maybe come on to change the game' so I agreed. And so there we were, last half hour of the last game and drawing 0-0 with Canvey. The boss told me to get warmed up. Jonny Wright put Charlie Penny through to round the keeper and put us 1-0 up! The atmosphere was amazing and the crowd were chanting 'If Deano scores we're on the pitch'!"

And then, in the final minute of the final game of the season came the most magical moment... Wrighty's shot came back off the post into the path of Deano... who stuck it away! Jon Taffel's celebration picture that we used on the cover of the title-winning booklet (pictured above) was sublime.

"I love that picture" said Pete. "It summed up the whole afternoon. The looks on the fans' faces, the joy. Brilliant memories."

rom that moment, as the Stones embarked on a first season in the National League South, Peter Dean dropped off our radar. So where did he go?

"Well, Ryman league was more my level so I went and re-signed for Hendon and we did pretty well, losing the playoff final in 2015. Then it was onto Kingstonian until Tommy Williams (the man-

ager) was sacked, then to Egham Town, the odd game for Potters Bar, then on to Southall to play for my mate Max.

"But Covid killed me, to be honest. I went out with a whimper. I just got too unfit and fell out of love with the game... plus I had my two kids, Isla (7) and Hudson (4) and have been running my own dry-lining business (plastering etc) for the past ten years. We now live out in Seer Green in Buckinghamshire".

Deano's mate Max asked him to do a bit of coaching for Southall but he says he couldn't cope with 'the attitude' of today's players. "I'm just a bit old school, I can't be doing with how precious the players are, even at that level. It's all agents, excuses and protein shakes. Can you imagine people like Fergus Moore putting up with it!"

I asked Deano if he could have imagined himself playing National League football in his mid-20s pomp. Did he have the ability to play much higher?

"To be honest, no. Conference South was maybe my top level and I played a few good games there for Bishops Stortford. I really enjoyed playing football, and the social side of football, but I know I wasn't dedicated enough to play any higher.

"I wasn't the kind of player to just drink an orange juice after the game and go home".

he present club was formed in 1922 and prior to their election to Division Three North of the Football League in 1929 played in the Midland League. They remained in the Northern Section until 1958 when they became one of the original members of the Fourth Division. (During the Second World War when the League was suspended from 1939 until 1946 the club operated in the various wartime competitions). Over the next 45 seasons (1958-2004) the club won promotion six times. In 1958/59 and 1964/65 they moved up to the third tier only to suffer immediate relegation.

City again gained promotion in 1970/71 and in 1974 reached the Second Division (Championship) for the first and to date only time in their 91 year old history. In two seasons in the second tier of English football the club competed with Manchester United, Chelsea, Aston Villa, Sunderland, West Bromwich Albion and Nottingham Forest amongst others and in 1974/75 achieved their highest ever League placing when they finished 15th. The following campaign, however, they were relegated and by 1977 were back in the Fourth.

In 1983/84 they won their first major honour when they finished runaway Fourth Division champions with 101 points becoming the first club in Football League history to reach three figures.

City's last promotion success in the League was via the playoffs in 1992/93 when on the club's first ever visit to Wembley Stadium they beat Crewe Alexandra in a penalty shoot out.



On the other side of the coin City suffered relegation six times and over the years had to make seven applications for re-election back to the League. In 2004 the club finished bottom of Division Three (League Two) and dropped down to the Conference bringing to an end 75 years membership of the Football League. During that time they had spent two seasons in the second tier and 16 in the third tier.

In eight years in the Conference City reached the promotion play offs three times. In 2006/07 they lost at the semi-final stage and in 2009/10 went down to Oxford United in the final and then, on May 20th 2012, promotion back to the Football League was achieved when Luton Town were beaten 2-1 at Wembley. This latter game marked the club's 4th appearance at the national stadium in four years and completed a league and cup double that season.

After four years back in the Football League, York dropped back into the Conference finishing in 24th place in League 2 in 2015/16. The following season City suffered a second successive relegation, after finishing in the final relegation place in the National League and will compete in regional non-league football in

2017/18 for the first time since 1929.

4th successive season in the National League, looking to build on the solid foundations that have been put in place by the club's investors, Trinity Sports Holdings. Peter Taylor departed the club after a run of poor form at the start of 2020. Daryl McMahon joined as Manager in early January, with Terry Harris and Steve Gritt his joint-Assistant Managers, and Dave Jupp arriving as Strength and Conditioning and First Team Coach.

#### **Cup History**

Over the years City have earned themselves the title of "giantkillers" and when in the Third Division North reached both the quarter finals and semi-finals of the FA Cup.

En route to the 6th round in 1937/38 they defeated First Division clubs West Bromwich Albion and Middlesbrough before bowing out to Huddersfield Town in a replay at Leeds Road. The game against Town at York attracted Bootham Crescent's record crowd of 28,123.

In 1954/55 City beat top flight clubs Blackpool and Tottenham Hotspur and in the semi-final drew 1-1 at Hillsborough against Newcastle United to become the first Third Division side to appear in an FA Cup semi final replay which was lost 2-0 at Roker Park. In the

mid 1980's the club twice reached the 5th round of the competition losing on each occasion in a replay to Liverpool.

In the Football League Cup they reached the quarter finals in 1961/62 and in the mid 1990's beat Premier clubs Manchester United and Everton in successive seasons.

Whilst in the Conference City won the FA Trophy in 2011/12 beating Newport County AFC 2-0 at Wembley to lift their first major cup competition and were runners up in 2008/09. The Minstermen repeated the feat in 2016/17 when they defeated Macclesfield Town 3-2 to win non-league's premier cup competition for the second time under Gary Mills. The club have won the North Riding Senior Cup 11 times.

#### 1. ETHAN ROSS - GOALKEEPER

London born keeper who came up through the academies of Arsenal and then West Brom where he was coached by City legend Dean Kiely. The 25-year-old has since turned out for Colchester United and Lincoln City in the Football League before signing a three-year deal with Stockport where he has joined from on loan for the season.

#### 2. RYAN FALLOWFIELD - DEFENCE

Energetic right back played for North Ferriby United in the National League and Harrogate Town – where he played a pivotal role in their rise to the Football League.

#### 3. ADAM CROOKES - DEFENCE

Athletic left-sided defender equally comfortable playing left-sided centre back or at left back — Crooksey can also play as a defensive midfielder if required. The 24-year-old was part of the Grimsby Town squad who were promoted from the National League last season.

#### 4. MAXIM KOUOGUN - DEFENCE

joined the club mid-way through last season after a spell playing in his native Ireland with UCD, Warrenport and Shelbourne – where he won promotion to the League of Ireland Premier Division.

#### 5. FRASER KERR - DEFENCE

Scottish centre half who is a big presence standing at 6ft 3in. Came through and played in the same youth team as Mitch Hancox at Championship club Birmingham City. The 29-year-old has extensive experience at the top end of the National League with Gateshead, Hartlepool United, Torquay United and Chesterfield.

#### 6. PADDY MCLAUGHLIN - MIDFIELD

Midfielder Paddy McLaughlin became Steve Watson's first signing as City manager when returning to the club in January 2019 on loan from Hartlepool United. In his second spell with York after winning promotion to the Football League with the club in 2011. His signed on a dual role for 2021/22 as Player/Sports Scientist.

#### 7. ALEX HURST - MIDFIELD

23-year-old exciting winger was bought from Port Vale this summer for an undisclosed fee. Alex can play on the left or right and likes to attack and get fans off seats.

#### 10. OLLY DYSON - MIDFIELD

The 23-year-old who is going into his third season



with the Minstermen. Known for his versatility, Olly can play in centre midfield, right back or right wing. He forged his way to be a regular last season after a period out injured and finished last season's promotion campaign with the top number of assists in the team.

# 11. MAZ KOUHYAR - FORWARD Afghanistan International who signed for City just before the transfer deadline in March from Hereford, the club beating off stiff competition for his signature. Kouhyar came through the ranks at Walsall before making 33 appearances in League One for the Saddlers. After an injury kept him out of the game for two years, he resurfaced at Hereford and in his debut season scored 5 goals in 30 appearances which included a strike against City which prompted Manager John Askey to sign the 24-year-old.

#### 12. ALEX WHITTLE - DEFENCE

Forward-thinking left back who returned to the club this summer five years after his first spell at the club. He has since played for Boston United and Forest Green Rovers before recently finding success with Gloucester City and Chesterfield – with back to back playoff runs with the Spireites in the National League.

14. LENELL JOHN-LEWIS - FORWARD
Experienced forward, nicknamed 'The Shop', who joined City initially on loan from Grimsby Town in February 2022, has spent the majority of his career playing in the Football League for the likes of Lincoln City, Bury and Newport County. After playing a key role in the National League North promotion, John-Lewis was signed on a permanent deal.

#### 15. BEN DALE - DEFENCE

Joined the York City youth team from Carlisle United as a 16-year-old and has since impressed enough at centre half to earn a professional contract this summer.

#### 16. MITCH HANCOX - MIDFIELD

Mitch spent 5 years with Birmingham City in the Championship earlier in his career before playing for the likes of Macclesfield Town, MK Dons and Solihull Moors.Mitch signed initially as a left back from Hereford on loan last season but found form as a central midfielder, firing 11 goals in 37 appearances and scoring some vital goals in the run in for promotion.

#### 17. SAM SANDERS - DEFENCE

Joined the club initially on loan from Nottingham Forest before breaking into the starting eleven and showing calm and composure on the ball at the heart of the defence.

#### 18. RYAN WHITLEY- GOALKEEPER

Highly rated 22-year-old shot stopper who progressed through the younger age groups of the academy and since went on to sign his first professional deal at 18. After successful loan deals at Whitby Town, South Shields and Scarborough Athletic over the past few years he is now set to challenge for the number one shirt for the upcoming campaign.

19. DAN PYBUS - MIDFIELD
Hard-working midfielder who works
his socks off in the centre of the
park. The former Dunferminline
player signed with the Minstermen
in the summer after a successful
trial spell with the club.

#### 20. AJ GREAVES - MIDFIELD

Tough-tackling midfielder with an eye for a pass, AJ joins permanently from Doncaster Rovers after his initial loan spell last season was cut short due to injury.






