A very warm welcome to Hemel Hempstead Town this afternoon for our final friendly... and of course our ex-boss Bobby Wilkinson who led the Stones to a both an FA Trophy semi-final and a National

League South semi-final in his 20 months at the helm.

He is putting together pretty much a brand new squad at Vauxhall Road, signing on a dozen new faces and there will be some recognisable ones in the Hemel line-up today. Jordy Mongoy and Michael Phillips both signed in May (though not in the squad list supplied for this programme) while Dan Wishart played much of our first NL season. Striker Eoin McKeown was only briefly at the Vale but the mobile striker scored some vital goals.


The Stones have hardly been comatose in the transfer market, also with 12 new signings - including the latest captures, former Spurs and Orient wing-back (and Cypriot international) Anthony Georgiou and also midfielder Christian Scott (19) who was playing for Farense and Leoes de Faro in the Portuguese Premer League last season. So real quality... and a big welcome to the Stones, Anthony and Christian!

You'd imagine that the Gaffer Matty Taylor would be aiming at fielding his starting XI today but key midfield signing Craig Eastmond is likely to miss out with a groin strain. With strong cover in every position (and maybe a couple of last-minute loans com-

Our pre-season continues to be impressive in parts with work needed in others, with Matty Taylor admitting that 'nailing down the starting XI for Dagenham is the toughest part of my job - we are still trying to achieve our goals, tactically and technically and we are still light on strikers; the market seems really slow in that area of the pitch".

Last Tuesday at Kings Langley was a case in point. Despite dominating possession almost exclusively it needed a Luke Dreher wonder-strike - on the volley from 12 yards - to get us going and the midfielder's sublime pass then sent Sam Ashford scurrying away to lob a smart second over the stranded keeper.

When the impressive Dom Hutchinson picked out Ashford's head for 3-0, shortly after the restart, it seemed Langley were plummeting to a heavy defeat. But a neat near-post finish, and then a breakaway goal, gave the final 3-2 scoreline a far closer look than the reality of the evening.

Now, let's all get mobilised for Dagenham & Redbridge next Saturday!

It's not a difficult journey, down the District Line to Dagenham East and we need hundreds of you there at Victoria Road to get the season off to a flying start. Remember last season and the two late goals from Sean Adarkwa and Tarryn Allarakhia that secured a deserved 2-0 win? Remember the bouncing

I'm sure we will recreate that atmosphere to mark the first game in charge for the new management team.

Defeat to Hemel, year on year until a brilliant Benyon hat-trick one afternoon in 2016

Defeat to Hemel, year on year until a brilliant brilli

I hadn't quite realised how our historical record against Hemel veered so suddenly from the lamentable to the enviable.

And it all happened in the summer of 2012 when the Stones (of the Ryman Premier Division) faced Hemel (of the Southern Prem) at the Vale in a preseason workout similar to this afternoon's pairing.

We'd had a decent end to the 2011-12 season - FA
Trophy semi-final and defeat in the League play-offs but when we stuck four goals past our arch rivals it
was the portent of something special. Just the names
of our goalscorers in the 4-1 win (Richard Jolly 2,
Alex Dyer and Tom Pett) was a guarantee of that.

And, jubilant, I remember going home and looking

up the last time we'd beaten Hemel.... and finding out that we had played them II times since the club changed names (to Hemel Hempstead Town) in the late 1960s, and had drawn just twice. Hemel had won nine.

But the jinx was broken that sunlit afternoon at the Vale a dozen years ago - even if it was only a friendly. We have since faced 'The Tudors' 12 times, winning five, drawing six and losing just the once - so yes, the games have been very, very tight but we have not wilted, as so often happened in the previous 42 years. Even when we were trailing 3-0 in a National League South clash on an icerink of a pitch in February 2015 (the game postponed at half time) we pulled off a gritty 1-1 draw in the rematch thanks to Johnny Wright's late header.

But we still hadn't beaten



It was all the more unexpected as Stones were outof-sorts and Hemel riding high in the table. After a
goalless first half, Jordan Parkes (so often our tormentor) shot the home side ahead but within seven minutes Elliot Benyon acrobatically hooked in an equaliser.
Midway though then half he rounded home keeper
Jamie Butler (pictured below left) for 2-1, and topped it
all off in injury time when Ricky Wellard's pass left him
one on one with Butler again. How our segregated fans
celebrated! (below left).

And we even avoided defeat in the home game when Danny Green cracked in a late leveller to force a I-I draw as the match ended with IO v IO.

The Hemel bogey was well and truly laid to rest, and despite that solitary I-0 defeat at Vauxhall Road at Easter 2018 we followed up with three successive victories.

The last one - our last meeting - was almost a farewell to the National League South as we showed our credentials as eventual champions with a commanding 3-0 win in August 2019. Who remembers the ease with which Dean Brennan (on his return to Hemel alongside Stuart Maynard) masterminded victory?

Michael Phillips, Dennon Lewis and Jacob Mendy Mendy took the goalscoring plaudits.

The surreal quality of the final ten minutes of the 2018-19 season should be distilled into a Ted Lassostyle movie.

The charming but eccentric, renegade manager; the overpaid, low scoring. run-throughbrick-walls striker; the giant Ghanaian midfielder; the twinkle-toed, hugely talented but underachieving No.10; and the underrated substitute who suddenly took centre-stage in the biggest two matches of the season.

That was lake

Sheppard, by the way, realise that the dominoe the former Reading starlet brought to the club by our Reading-based manager Bobby Wilkinson. 'Shepp' had just one substitute appearance to his name until Bobby slipped him into the side at right back in mid-December in place of the injured Rhys Tyler ...and it coincided with three terrible results as we exited the FA Trophy at Biggleswade then lost in the league (at home) to Slough and Oxford City. But Wilkinson persevered with the tenacious Sheppard - even overlooking a red card at Woking - and suddenly we were off on a long unbeaten run.

Tyler came back into the team when we hit a blip on the run-in and Shepp was back on the bench. Still we couldn't worm our way into the top seven - the play-offs - and it looked like we had blown any hopes with three defeats in four games, at Torquay and Hampton & Richmond, and then at home to Dulwich Hamlet. The flame flickered with Easter victory at

rooted in tenth
place (see table
below) while needing to grab three
points and hope
that Dartford, St
Albans and Billericay
all lost.

Quite a tall order! Wilkinson gambled on using Sheppard

(not even on bench for the 3-0 win at Chelmsford) in midfield instead of Simon Mensah, and it looked to have backfired on 36 minutes when Jason Williams lifted the ball over Jonathan North for a classy finish. 0-1. In the packed Bulla, hearts were sinking.

We hadn't been in the top seven since November, and were now down to 11th. It needed salvation, and soon.... and it arrived in the unlikely form of energetic left-back Freddie Grant who folllowed up a rebound to blast past Hemel's Laurie Walker to level the scores. The Bulla was now bouncing and, astonishingly, Sheppard chipped a sublime winner from 25 yards while our phones all registered the miracle of Dartford, Billericay and St Albans all losing to allow us to sneak seventh place. Shepp scored again in the playoff eliminator 3-I at Bath City, of course, and it ended in agony at Woking. But what a Saturday that was!

The attendance was 3,505 but I was there as a neutral having moved to Adeyfield when I was three, after my family had moved down from Glasgow. I was actually born near Partick Thistle's ground and have have never lived in Har-

"I have watched guite a few Hemel games at their old ground in Crabtree Lane, from the early 60's, but cannot recall the first one - and then watched them many times when they moved to Vauxhall Road of course

"I followed Watford (and ground-hopped a bit) as lots of my fellow pupils at Adeyfield School did from 1967 right up until the Stones moved to Vicarage Road... then I switched. That was after I realised that 'family club' Watford were shafting the Stones. Before then I used to meet up with fellow Watford fans from the Harrow area, who occasionally would watch Wealdstone games over the years: I saw Stuart Pearce play three times for the Stones, for

"For instance a couple of seasons ago a trip to Wrexham would have worked out at £65 day return from Hemel by rail (including using an old git's rail card). But we could have instead gone for a day trip from Luton Airport to Berlin for £15 less. In the end we went by car and stayed at a hotel on the Welsh border and took in a Welsh league game as well as a bonus. But we will keep looking for flights up north via Poland or Ireland...

"For this coming season I think the squad is shaping up quite well. I have no great expectations, but any position higher than the bottom four is fine by me. But I would not be surprised if we are in the top third for much of the season. A good run in the FA Cup and or Trophy would be wonderful of course. No pressure boys:)

"Living just a Stones throw from Hemel's ground, many Hemel fans are mates and I previously worked with a lot over the years so I would love Bobby to do well there. I said to Dave Boggins the Hemel Chairman, at a pre-season, game that Bobby was the boy to get them promoted... he's a bit of a Barry Fry type wheeler-dealer with players and I think his se-

lections will come good. Overall, I thought his spell at Wealdstone was good for us. And he rescued Weymouth when they looked doomed. And yes, I would love the Tudors to get promoted... just so I can walk to an away game:)

Hello all and welcome back to the Vale! We welcome a local neighbour today in the shape of Hemel Hempstead and wish them all the best for the oncoming

season next week.

Indeed, we are just seven days out from the rollercoaster ride beginning all over again. I'm sure we will experience all those emotions from agony to ecstasy. I think it will be important to remain processdriven in the long run and try to remain calm and humble throughout the ups and downs.

Since I wrote my last column, we fell 3-1 to League Two promotion favorites MK Dons at home and then ran out 3-2 winners to Kings Langley, both very different exercises. As a player, when you facehigher opposition you're aware that it may be a more defensive exercise than an attacking one.

This was the case with MK Dons and both Crawley and Nott County prior to that.

However, I thought we showed attacking prowess in all these games and posed plenty of problems. There's still plenty of sharpening up to do in the final third I feel, but I expect it to be a little easier when playing against National League opposition.

Of course, the Kings Langley game allowed us to work on these attacking patterns. With the nature of the two teams and where we stand in the footballing

pyramid, we were able to dominate the ball for large spells and create numerous chances on a sweltering evening.... including a fantastic goal from Luke Dreher. To win by only a one-goal margin flattered the opposition I feel, but it was a gentle reminder that we can't switch off in games even if the goals came after several substitutions. The message from the manager and coaching staff coming away from that fixture was one about the importance of keeping high standards on and off the pitch at all times.

We want to take this club to heights which it hasn't seen in its recent history, so whatever standards we have had in seasons gone by will not

> I think something we have discovered in pre season this summer is that we can be flexible with the formations we can play.

We can play with a three or a four in defence. This will come as no surprise to Stones fans who have watched us over the past few years, but it is a little different with the new manager though as he wants slightly different things from certain positions.

For example, in my position (No. 10/attacking midfield) I am encouraged to run in behind, past the striker more which is perhaps something I didn't have to do too much of last season with a slower. more structured build up.

Today v Hemel I feel the result is important to a certain degree. A win and a strong performance would be a nice round-off to pre season and put us in good stead for Dagenham away next week.

I can't wait for it to start for real next week and hear you all in great voice on the terraces! UTS!
