


3) The consumption of alcoholic drinks is permitted INSIDE the social club bar, garden and boardroom areas.

4) Vehicles parked on the Grosvenor Vale site are at the owners' risk.

5) Wealdstone Football Club supports the FA's campaign on pyrotechnics (e.g. flares and smoke bombs). Any misuse of such items in and around the Ground will result in those responsible being asked to leave the ground and, in line with football authority guidance, may result in a report to the Police, potential prosecution and a ban from the Club of up to three years. IN THE WORDS OF THE GAFFER: MATT TAYLOR'S VIEW



'I'm as proud as anything of the players: We've been to two pro teams & run all over them'

WELCOME to the Vale for another tough match against a very good Rochdale side.

They scored a late winner to beat Sutton 2-1 last week and are sitting in a handy sixth place in the table... it will be a game between two form sides today as we picked up our seventh point out of the last nine with that 2-0 win at Aldershot last Saturday.

It was an excellent performance: The players out-worked the opposition, did the basics well and got their just rewards.

I think they are beginning to understand the importance of hard work - and when we do that we look a very good team. I am as proud as anything with them.

We've had a bit of a stop-start season so far with injuries to key players - and that's still happening with Mason Barrett probably having to miss a year of football with his knee injury, and Craig Eastmond still out for a few weeks - but you can see now that our belief levels are improving. To a man at Aldershot they were excellent.. and you supporters can see just how hard they are working for each

other and for them. The front two (Sam Ashford and Alex Reid) were excellent again but you can put Sean Adarkwa, Henry Sandat and Micah Obiero into that mix. Sam worked tirelessly and Sean made a huge impression with his pressing and movement.... when he came on you could see the players thinking 'Right, Sean's back" and that was great to see. We've had rotten luck with injuries but we had gone away to a big team in our league. kept a clean sheet and (for a few hours anyway) were out of the relegation zone. That's what we wanted more than anything.

Deon Woodman came straight back in after his Ioan at St Albans and did really well while Jack, who had to play on the left, was excellent. Adrian was brilliant. Enzio dropped back and did well as did Elliot Thorpe, back from his broken rib.

Winning games strengthens the belief they have in themselves. We've had to change a few things in the way messages are delivered but we now have the desire and ability to run over teams: We went to a professional, EFL team in Grimsby and ran all over them, then came to a pro team in Aldershot and ran all over them too. I'm extremely happy with how

things are going and we've just got to continue building.

As for the Wycombe cup game: I'm pleased that our players will get national exposure and they'll never forget the occasion. The financial aspect is also good obviously for the club. Wycombe are top of

League One, so has the perfect feel of the FA Cup.... but to be brutally honest I'm not even thinking about that game as we have to take every match one at a time. I'm just not interested in it right now!

Three wins & a draw ... what a difference four games make in life of a Stones fan!


FOUR games unbeaten (excluding the National League Cup competition) and life as a Wealdstone fan suddenly seems a lot better.

But for a barmy five minutes at Ebbsfleet it would have been four wins on the spin....three of those away from home.

I can't write too much about the Braintree and Ebbsfleet games as I was away on holiday, but waiting for updates whilst sat in a Krakow bar isn't for the faint-hearted when the season (previously) hadn't gone so well. I even had my celebratory vodka shots picture ready for IG as we headed to ninety minutes v Ebbsfleet.... yet celebration turned to misery as the Kent side scored not once but twice to change what had been a confident away win into a draw.

Our FA Cup record isn't too hot as we know.

Some sixteen appearances in the last 125 years in the first round, and when the draw was made sending us to the north Lincolnshire coast and Grimsby Town, there was a collective groan. Despite them



being an EFL club, we'd only been there a couple of years ago in the NL: It's a grim place to be fair and a pig of a journey to make. No doubt this contributed to a much-smallerthan-expected away following for a FA Cup tie, officially just 168, though with complimentary tickets and other factors, 246 were

counted in the away end. Still about half of

what it should have been.

The first half was hard yards to be fair. Had the Mariners gone in three or four goals to the good, I am not sure we'd have had much to complain about. They missed a penalty, there was a remarkable clearance off the line by Jack Cook and a decent double save from Sam Howes just to name a few. But we withheld the storm and in the second half were bar the better side.

Grimsby were limited to one real chance, a header at the far post, but other than that they didn't trouble us. As the game moved into the final few minutes, I was bemoaning the fact that we were being deprived of a replay, possibly a live TV game

due to the scrapping of replays and likely to lose in extra time.

Ye of little faith! As we had one more attack, an excellent combination between Adarkwa, Ashford and Cesay, saw the latter storm into Grimsby's box. For me he was bundled to the ground but, as our fans howled in protest for a penalty, somehow Cesay (either intentionally or accidentally) flicked the ball into Alex Reid's path. His scuffed shot went under the keeper's body and those in the away end celebrated wildly.

We held out easily for the last few minutes. It was the first time we had beaten a FL side since 1977 - only the third time ever, having beaten Third Division Hereford United and Fourth Division Reading in the run that

took us to the third round at Loftus Road v QPR. Those of us that retired to the No 1 pub in Cleethorpes post-match had a wonderful time, with some fantastic locals. Places like Cleethorpes and Grimsby are the antithesis of suburban London, but they can show us a few things about hospitality and friendliness.

The draw for the second round has pitted us with a local derby.

Wycombe is less than 20 miles away down the M40, live on terrestrial TV but at a ridiculous kick-off time of 11.30 am. Now, I know 11.30 kick offs were not unusual on Boxing Day say a decade ago, but it is a potty time to have a game of this magnitude. Spoons is about the only pub that will be open to have any sort of pre-match drink (though it's not all about drinking, obviously - Ed).

The timing and the fact that the game clashes with Watford v QPR - also live on TV - will no doubt affect the gate here at the Vale. That said, it should still be a record Vale attendance. The

Chairboys are flying in EFL I, but the magic of the cup could still see us next at Stamford Bridge in Round 3 (Note: other Premier Division clubs are available - Ed) Last week, we travelled to Aldershot for a "live" game on DAZN.

As you'd expect from a town steeped in military history, the remembrance service was immaculately observed and beautifully orchestrated. The game, however, was not for the purists.

Aldershot started better but we grew into the game and ultimately deserved the win. From Jacob Adams' assured performance coming on as a substitute goalie, to the imperious Jack Cook and excellent Adrian Mariappa at the back, with a forward line that is about as good as Wealdstone have had in a long while, we were by far the better side.

I've said it on X, but if we can keep Alex Reid for the rest of the season, we will stay up, simple as that. I love his s**thousery, his eye for goal and non-stop running. With Ashford, Adwarka, Kretzschmar et al, we finally have goals in our team.

News of loans and ex-Stones: Hutch & Bartolo story

AS Deon Woodman and Dom Hutchinson crossed over from St Albans to Wealdstone somewhere around junction 18 of the M25 last week, it was a happier return for the 6ft 5in defender.

Deon, our summer capture from QPR, had been starring on loan for the Saints in the National League South but was hastily recalled for the Aldershot game following the long-term injury to Mason Barrett. And St Albans were delighted to see winger Dom return to the club - having kick-started their run to the playoffs 18 months ago - and funnily enough, who should he bump into in his second game as Saints travelled to Weymouth last Saturday? Our ex-Gibraltar star Jaiden Bartolo, that's who! The teenage striker's own loan move (from our FA Cup opponents Wycombe Wanderers) has

earned one goal, against league leaders Weston Super Mare in a 1-I draw last midweek. Neither Bartolo nor Hutchinson scored in another 1-I draw in Dorset last week but Hutch DID hit the target as Saints drew in yet another 1-I with Chelmsford last Tuesday week... his latest loan debut at Clarence Park. Jaiden, of course, scored 16 goals in six games for the Stones' under-19s (and 16 in four games for the under-23s) last season before Wanderers swooped.

Meanwhile, Elliott Simmons is dominating midfield for Bedford Town in the Southern League Central Premier Division.

Christian Scott went out on loan last week and was man of the match for Enfield Town in their 1-1 draw with Salisbury in the National League South.





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






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


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THE No.10 VIEW: MAX KRETZSCHMAR TAKES IT TO THE M_3 A_1 N_3

It seems a while since writing my last column and I do feel a lot has changed. Since the 0-3 home defeat to Yeovil in the middle of October, we have gone unbeaten in the league and FA Cup which has included good wins against Braintree and Aldershot, a frustrating draw against Ebbsfleet and a memorable victory against Grimsby in the FA Cup. There has also been plenty of detailed tactical and technical prepara-

tion from the Gaffer and his staff alongside clinical execution from the players to gain these positive results.

But one cannot work without the other, Personally, I believe this change in momentum in our season has stemmed from our all-too-brief psychology session with ex Tottenham Hotspur sport psychologist Dave Burston.

I've been in all too many of these 'sessions' and the academics often delivering these talks can sometimes seem to be talking to a room full of confused foot-

ballers resembling a brick wall.

But Dave was electric, engaging and inspirational. No doubt some of the lads may not have connected to what he was saying like I and a few others did, but that's par for the

Early on in my career, I would classify myself as realistic bordering on pessimistic. As my career has moved on and I've been through injuries and plenty of failures along the way, I've found myself becoming

more optimistic, It's funny what

age does to you.

Dave told us how to think like a hunting animal. There's no worrying about what's happened, what's been and gone. It's forward, forward, forward with unshakeable positivity. So here's to more positivity today and in the exciting games that lurk around the corner! UTS! Max

Hello everyone. This afternoon we welcome the travelling fans of Rochdale to The Vale for yet another massively important league match.

The excitement generated by our fantastic Cup win over Grimsby when nobody outside the club gave us a cat in hell's chance made it all the more sweeter, and we now look forward to a mouth watering and historic 2nd Round clash with high flying League One side Wycombe Wanderers to be broadcast live on ITV, KO 11.30am on Saturday 30th November. A gigantean task without doubt for our boys - but bring it on!

Sadly I was too unwell to travel to Grimsby, absolutely gutted but what a tonic! And a much needed lift for the whole club. We must all savour these moments, on the pitch and the rare oxygen of national publicity off it, quite apart from the financial rewards of course.

But it's now back to the reality and priorities of the business of league survival and the battle recommences. It's relentless.

The scale of the broader challenges faced by the club are clear for all to see. The National League grows tougher and more competitively professional every season and is, let's face it, League 3 in all but name. Resources and relative budgets must keep pace if that is possible. But at Wealdstone most often that is not a realistic option because overextended budgets and untenable spending is a recipe for disaster so 'we are where we are'.

A professional approach and continuing to build a solid club base are ever important factors but the frustration is felt by all of us when we are constantly punching well above a considerable NL weight. It's often hard to accept, exacerbated by raised expectations and pressures as a consequence of the squad being remarkably competitive and obtaining points on merit since we gained promotion to Step I five seasons ago.

Having previously served for some years on the board myself (twice) I can understand the behind the scenes pressures and frustrations that are most often, of necessity, are never made public.

Excellent players (and a management team) that have been brought on and undoubtedly improved at 'Shop Window' Wealdstone and then transferred over recent seasons have provided some financial return but it's not easy to say whether this has stunted some progress on the pitch. Look at the likes of Jacob Mendy and Charlie Barker for example. Victims of our own success one might be forgiven to say. We are over the proverbial barrel until the club is resourced to at least the average level of its rivals.





Despite all of these challenges and current onpitch matters the level of professionalism continues to develop at Wealdstone with structures being laid down for future progression. This includes a big step forward with professional training facilities, the expansion of the Academy, improved stadium infrastructure at The Vale (not least the major pitch drainage works) and, most importantly, focused community engagement that will also grow future attendances

All of this of course comes at a significant cost, adding to challenges when you want funds channeled into the playing side.

We know that the board are working extremely hard on all of these very considerable challenges, including the ongoing and seemingly interminable lease negotiations with hopefully an equitable resolution very soon.

Your WFCSC committee will continue to engage positively and regularly with board members and provide support and significant donations wherever

Turning to WFCSC matters, our Pre XMAS DISCO is next Saturday evening, 23 November, tickets £10 in advance from James Klarfeld today and over the bar. We have discussed the proposed 125 year event at length. ALL YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT ROCHDALE AFC, THE DALE

Today's opposition in focus

Rochdale Association Football Club was founded in 1907 following a meeting at the Central Council Office in Fleece Street. The club was accepted to the Manchester League a fortnight after its formation and joined the Lancashire Combination a year later. Two previous attempts had been made to launch an Association Football Club in the town, but Rochdale AFC as we know it was officially launched in 1907.

After gaining admittance into the Lancashire Combination the club won the competition in 1911. This led to an application being lodged with The Football League. Herbert Hopkinson, probably indignant that Dale received the support of just one club, called for the powers that be to expand their numbers and create a Third Division. His proposal was considered but scuppered by countless objections. The failure to gain League Status led the club to apply for a place in the Central League. The request was granted but reversed by the FA due to objections from the Lancashire Combination who claimed Dale's attempt to progress up the ladder should have been made earlier. The fact that most of their members had successfully applied for membership of other divisions may well have been a truer reflection of their protests.

The club's next application to join the game's elite came in March 1919. The League had decided to expand following World War One and six places were available. While Rochdale gathered more votes than they had attracted on their previous effort - for the record seven clubs were in favour they were still some way behind those chosen. There was some controversy regarding the decision as admittance did not seem to have been based on performance. All the clubs selected had poorer League records than Rochdale. This latest rebuff led some to call for the winding up of the club. The deflection of large number of players only served to heighten this argument but nevertheless

the motion was rejected.

Nine years after Herbert Hopkinson's brainchild of a Third Division, it was finally adopted in 1920. Unfortunately Southern League clubs pushed it through and as a consequence took all the places made available. The notion of allowing Northern and Midlands clubs to form an equivalent division was set to take place a year later. Dale were one of 14 clubs recommended by the Football League Management Committee for acceptance without a vote. Thankfully the

proposal was rubber stamped.

The first ever Football League opposition came in the shape of Accrington Stanley. That game took place on 27th August 1921 with the game finishing 6-3 in favour of Rochdale. It took a little longer to obtain our first away win; almost six months to be precise but it came at Lincoln City courtesy of an own goal.

Despite the good start to the season the club still finished bottom of the league and so had to reapply for membership. Survival was granted on that occasion and Dale picked-up over the next few years, actually finishing runners-up to Wolves in

They finished second in Division Three North again three years later but the next 30+ years saw the club become perennial strugglers in the lower reaches of the table.

The Football League decided to scrap its regional structure and create four national divisions in 1958 and Rochdale were desperate to avoid being placed in the new Fourth Division. Season 1957/58 saw Dale feature in the promotion race until a backlog of fixtures scuppered their chances of going up. However, a tenth-place finish was good enough to secure a place in the new-style Third Division. Goal average was the deciding factor on who was placed above and below the lucky line.

Dale didn't last long in the restructured Division Three and were relegated after just one season, finishing bottom of the league with just eight wins all season. The club remained in the League's bottom division for a further decade but whilst plying their trade in this division they did set a piece of Football League history.



It wasn't until the 1968/69 season that Dale fans tasted success again, but this time it was the ultimate dream as the club won promotion for the first and only time in its history. Manager Bob Stokoe had overseen a large upheaval in his playing staff prior to the season.

The team this time lasted five seasons in Division Three before relegation at the end of the 1973/74 season. Just two games were won all season and crowds dropped into three figures on more than one occasion.

Dark days followed at Spotland as Rochdale failed to even finish in the top half of the league's basement division for 14 years. Attendances were poor, as you'd imagine, and financial hardship hit home on more than one occasion. The only real highlight from this dark era was when Steve Taylor won the Adidas Golden Boot in 1986 with 25 goals in 45 matches in what was a poor Dale side.

The club was thrown into turmoil in the mid-80s when comedian Tommy Cannon (of Cannon & Ball fame), portrayed as the club's saviour initially, allegedly caused controversy and uproar in the town when the new look Board of Directors made a series of decisions deemed not in the best interests of the club. After much financial wrangling they were replaced by the previous Board of Directors who embarked on a crusade to get the goodship Rochdale back in financial safety. After much hardship Messrs Kilpatrick, Morris, Lord, Brierley, Hilton and Walkden saved the club from meltdown.

In 2007/08, the club's Centenary Year, Rochdale enjoyed arguably their best ever season to date, apart from 1968/69 but lost on a rainy day at Wembley when Stockport County won 3-2 in the

play off final.

Twelve months later Dale again reached the playoffs, only to fall at the semi-final hurdle this time after a 2-1 aggregate defeat to Gillingham.

However, in 2009/10, over 40 years of heartache were ended for Dale fans when the team eventually clinched their second promotion from the basement division.

In 2013/14 as Dale finished in third place behind Chesterfield and Scunthorpe.and made it to round four of the FA Cup for the first time in ten years, only to lose at home to Sheffield Wednesday.

Dale were tipped to struggle in League One in 2014/15, but they looked very comfortable among much bigger clubs, ibut ultimately finished in eighth position, which was the club's highest-ever final placing.

Subsequent campaigns saw Dale struggle in League One and after finishing outside the relegation zone on points per game during the Covid-hit 2019/20 season, they were relegated a year later, albeit by a single point.

The 2021/22 season saw Dale struggle in the lower reaches of League Two and eventual relegation to the National League,.

5. AARON HENRY - Midfield

Aaron has joined Dale from Charlton Athletic until the end of the season.

Aaron has been with The Addicks since the age of ten, rising through their Academy ranks before making his first team debut in January 2020, aged just 16. He spent the second half of the 2021/22 campaign at Wealdstone. Last term saw Henry make 13 League Two appearances on loan at eventual promotion winners Crawley Town, before he rejoined Wealdstone for the second half of their National League campaign.

6. ETHAN EBANKS-LANDELL - Defence

This is his second spell with the club after playing 16 games on loan from Wolves in the second half of the 2018/19 season.

The centre-half joined Dale having spent three years with Shrewsbury Town, clocking-up over 100 appearances in League One

7. TARRYN ALLARAKHIA -Midfield

Tarryn is a winger who joined Dale in July 2024 from Wealdstone. signing a two-year deal at the Crown Oil Arena.

Tarryn who featured in a number of attacking positions for The Stones last season, also represented Tanzania at the Africa Cup of

Nations in January of this year. Tarryn was a regular for The Stones, making 76 National League appearances in two campaigns.

8. HARVEY GILMOUR - Midfield

Originally on Sheffield United's books, the 25-yearold gained his first experience of league football after moving to Tranmere in summer 2018. Harvey spent the 2020/21 season with Stockport, before joining Halifax, where he made around 80 appearances and helped The Shaymen lift the FA Trophy in 2023 with a Wembley defeat of Gateshead in the final.

9. KAIRO MITCHELL - Forward

The 27-year-old was signed from Notts County, where he had played over 40 games since moving to Meadow Lane ahead of the 2021/22 campaign, A product of Leicester City's academy, Kairo signed professional terms with The Foxes in 2016.

10. DEVANTE RODNEY - Forward

Devante is a forward who joined Dale from Walsall in June 2022 on an initial two-year contract. The 26-year-old spent his youth career in the academies at Manchester City and Sheffield Wednesday, before starting his professional career at Hartlepool United in January 2017.

II. ODY ALFA Forward

Born in Kaduna, Nigeria, he moved to England during his younger years and joined the Queens Park Rangers academy at 14. Ody progressed through the ranks at Loftus Road and spent time on loan at Spanish side Atletico Baleares, as well as nonleague clubs Billericay Town, Maidenhead United, Dartford, Aldershot & Chelmsford.

12. BRAD KELLY - Goalkeeper

Brad is a goalkeeper from the club's Academy set-up who is in his third season at the Crown Oil Arena.

33. SAM BECKWITH - Defence



I'VE chronicled and waxed-lyrical about Wealdstone's excellent home form in previous editions of this article, but let's now focus to those trips on the road. Where, unfortunately, the form is not quite so good.

In fact, since our return to the National League in 2020, we have collected on average 0.473 more points per game at home than away. That maiden success at Aldershot last weekend came at the 9th time of asking this season, but don't forget that it took 11 attempts for Stuart Maynard to get his first away 'dubya' last season, that being the 2-0 win at Dag & Red just before Christmas. So, perhaps asking an obvious question...but why are points so much harder to gain away from home. The obvious answer is presumably to start with geography and the clue is in the name. The National League. With the Stones being a part-time team for practically all of their five-year tenure so far, does travel and long-distances make it more difficult?

Logic might suggest that the longest Average Round Trip (ART) - where long coach journeys and overnight stays are the norm - is where points are hardest to come by. Wealdstone have really struggled away from home (though the ventures up to the NW and Yorks & Humber have often proved profitable and salubrious) it's the Midlands where the Stones really struggle. We have failed to land a single victory from 13 attempts against Chesterfield, Notts County, Solihull Moors and Kidderminster.

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
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
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
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FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS PROFILES TEN LEADING ROCHDALE MANAGERS

MANAGING TO SUCCEED

BY LEIGH EDWARDS

JACK PEART

Jack Peart managed Rochdale to the Third Division (North) runners-up slot in 1923-24 and 1926-27. A much-travelled centre-forward, he played for Sheffield United, Stoke and Newcastle United before helping Notts County win the Second Division title in 1913-14. He later had spells with Birmingham, Derby County, Ebbw Vale, Port Vale and Norwich City prior to becoming Rochdale's player-boss in February 1923. Also plotting their 1925-26 promotion near-miss, he remained in charge of Dale until leaving in July 1930 to manage Bradford City. He managed Fulham from May 1935 until his death in September 1948.

HARRY CATTERICK

Harry Catterick managed Rochdale into the newly formed Third Division in 1957-58. He was a centreforward with Everton before becoming Crewe Alexandra's player-boss in December 1951.

Appointed Rochdale's manager in June 1953, he remained in charge at Spotland until leaving in August 1958 to manage Sheffield Wednesday. He guided them to the Second Division title in 1958-59 and League Championship runners-up in 1960-61. Rejoining Everton as manager in April 1961, he led them to two League Championship triumphs and FA Cup success, then managed Preston. He died

TONY COLLINS

in March 1985.

Long-serving manager Tony
Collins guided Rochdale to the
1962 League Cup final. He was
an outside-left with Sheffield
Wednesday, York City, Watford,
Norwich City, Torquay United,
Watford again and Crystal Palace before

joining Rochdale in June 1959. Appointed manager in June 1960, he made several shrewd signings and plotted Dale's 1964-65 promotion near-miss, remaining in charge at Spotland until September 1967. He was Bristol

City's chief scout and assistant-manager to Alan Dicks until October 1980. Later scouting for Newcastle United, Manchester United and Millwall, he died in Rochdale in February 2021.

BOB STOKOE

Bob Stokoe had two spells as Rochdale's manager. He starred at centre-half in Newcastle United's 1955 FA Cup final triumph and became Bury's player-boss in December 1961. After a spell at Charlton Athletic, he

took charge of Rochdale in October 1967 and built their 1968-69 promotion team, leaving in October 1968 to manage Carlisle United. He moved via Blackpool to Sunderland and plotted their 1973 FA Cup final success and 1975-76 Second Division title triumph. After managing Bury and Blackpool again, he was in charge of Dale from November 1979 until June 1980, then managed Carlisle. He died in February 2004.

LEN RICHLEY

HARRY CATTERICK

Len Richley guided Rochdale to promotion in 1968-69. A former Sunderland amateur, the half-back had spells with Deal Town and Crystal Palace prior to joining Tonbridge as player-secretary in July 1949. He moved to Hartlepools in June 1951 and became Holbeach United's player-boss in July 1954. Appointed manager of King's Lynn in August 1959, he led them to promotion in 1963-64, then assisted Bob Stokoe at Bury and Rochdale, succeeding him as manager at Spotland from October 1968 until resigning in February 1970. He was later

Darlington's manager, then Newcastle
United's chief scout and died in
October 1980.

DICK CONNER

Aldershot where he became trainer,

Dick Conner managed
Rochdale to their highestever League position in
1969-70. He was a right-half
with Newcastle United and
South Shields, then a
promotion winner with
Grimsby Town in 1955-56 and
Southampton in 1959-60. Later
playing for Tranmere Rovers and

he joined Rochdale as Len Richley's assistant in December 1968 and succeeded him as manager in February 1970. He plotted Dale's 1970-71 FA Cup run and moved to Darlington as manager for a year in July 1973, then coached Grimsby and Rochdale. Later a licensee in Rochdale and Cleethorpes, he died in May 1999.

TERRY DOLAN

Midfielder Terry
Dolan was both a
player and manager at
Rochdale. Initially with
Bradford PA, he
moved to
Huddersfield Town in
October 1970 and
appeared in the topflight. He joined
Bradford City in

August 1976 and starred in their 1976-77 promotion success, moving to Rochdale in August 1981. After assisting Thackley and Harrogate, he joined Bradford City's coaching staff in January 1985 and was manager for two years. He rejoined Rochdale as boss in March 1989, guiding them to the FA Cup fifth round for the first time in 1989-90. Leaving in January 1991 to manage Hull City, he later managed York City and Guiseley.

STEVE PARKIN

Steve Parkin had two spells as manager of Rochdale. Starting with Stoke City, the England U-21 defender was 'Player of the Year' in 1987-88 and joined West Brom in June 1989. He moved to Mansfield Town in July 1992 and became the League's youngest manager in October 1996. Player-manager Paul Simpson guided Rochdale to





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TIM PARKS REMEMBERS THE 1972 AUTUMNAL DAY WHEN

Johnny Haynes: The remarkable story of how the Fulham and England legend came to finish his career at little old Wealdstone

IT IS only now, with the clarity the club in our first season of intervening 52 years, that you realise how extraordinary it Richter Scale. was that Wealdstone - then in the Southern League Division one South - managed to sign

former Fulham and England skipper Johnny Haynes. A bit like Jude Bellingham leaping at the chance join sixth-tier Stones. A bit like Declan Rice shaking Matt Taylor's hand on a one-year deal.

And yet, at the time - in the wake of a plethora of old ex-pros joining

semi-professional football - it barely registered on the game's

We had left the amateur ranks only 18 months earlier and the tactic of replacing our promising youngsters with arthritic campaigners was quickly revealed to be a short-sighted one.

Under manager Alan Humphries (a former Fulham coach) the club stumbled into the lower reaches of the Southern League Division One (North). At first the fans were starry-eyed at seeing men

like former Spurs double winners Cliff Jones and Terry Dyson trotting out in our all-blue kit ... until it registered that their glory days were a decade earlier. And they were the pick of the bunch...

Fortunately, the board dispensed with Humphries and installed the highly sought-after St Albans boss Sid Prosser.

All the old lags were shown the exit door (apart from Dyson, a sprightly 38) and suddenly, with Prosser's contacts and smooth patter we had a decent side that would go on to finish halfway.

But what of Johnny Haynes, you are asking? Well, come November of that 1972-73 season we were short of midfield class with former Watford first-teamer Dixie Hale set to leave the area for a job in South Wales. Young Nigel Franklin had starred for the reserves but Prosser needed an experienced head in the central role - so who better than ex-England skipper Haynes?

The programme notes for his one and only Southern League appearance, against Dorchester Town at Lower Mead, trumpeted the capture of his signature from South African side Durban City for whom he had signed 18 months earlier.

Durban was clearly a money-spinning destination for Haynes after his release by Fulham after an astonishing 594 games. But he was good value: in his only season with Durban he led the club to the National Championship - the only major medal he ever won.

For little old Wealdstone it really was a stellar signing. Even if the red tape of obtaining international clearance (and some expensive phone calls, no doubt with our parsimonious director Harry Benjamin reversing the charges) saw the paperwork only completed at the last minute.

The 38-year-old was courted by a number of Football League clubs but 'FA rules' prevented Haynes from signing a lucrative pro deal during the winter break from South African football. He was only allowed to play at our level.

And this was when it really hit home...Haynes, the first-ever £100-a-week footballer (after his Fulham co-star Jimmy Hill had smashed the maximum wage), the man who was expected to lead England into the 1966 World Cup and the man described by Pele as "the best passer of the ball I've ever seen" was making the Stones only his fourth club in a twodecade-long career.

How humbling it was to see the man capped 55 times by England appearing at Lower Mead for that Dorchester game - and then again v Wimbledon in the Premier Midweek Floodlight League a few weeks later, a competition designed to give squad players a

After Haynes' unveiling for the Dorchester clash (which we lost 3-2 after a couple of defensive lapses) the critics were quick to point out that what the team really needed was energy and youthfulness. Haynes' class was undeniable, but by the time he made his final appearance for the club in another midweek league match at Hillingdon Borough on January 4 it was being openly said in the Harrow Observer that manager Prosser was now the short-sighted one, giving game time to an elderly expro (who was on his way back to Durban in a couple of weeks) when he had youngsters lining up to be given the chance.

Johnny Haynes' last competitive match in England was in front of 320 spectators at the Leas Stadium, West Drayton - surely not the stage he was expecting to exit the English game when played his emotional last appearance for Fulham at the Cottage two years earlier.

Haynes' England career was curtailed after he was badly injured in a car crash at the end of the 1962 season.

His soft-top hire care was blown into the path of another car by high winds and when the stricken Haynes was pulled out of the wreckage the ambulance man (not recognising the iconic star) famously said: 'It's alright son, you've only broken both legs'.

Haynes was reportedly never quite the same player again, although he played another eight years for Fulham in the top two divisions and scored dozens of goals in his favourite inside forward position.

So what is my own abiding memory of Johnny Haynes? Certainly his pass to send fellow ex-First Division star Terry Dyson through to score against Dorchester was sublime and in



Then United were beaten (at Luton) and suddently Reading were chasing down Tottenham's record-breaking II straight-wins-start to the season... which they smashed with victory over Bolton Wanderers at Elm Park on October 5th.

Reading were having trouble fitting everyone in at their old-fashioned stadium - the 27,000 capacity had been slashed to a maximum 6,000 by Margaret Thatcher's government following the tragedies at Heysel (hooliganism) and Bradford City's Valley Parade (fire) at the end of the previous season. Reading's compliance saw that capacity raised to 13,000 for the home game against Wolves which would have seen a League-record-levelling 13th straight win... but the Wanderers pulled off a 2-2 draw that might

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

have raised Wealdstone hopes in the daunting task that faced us a couple of weeks later.

Brian Hall's Stones were regarded as an effective but graceless, agricultural side forged on twin-peak centre-backs Paul Bowgett and Dennis Byatt and the pace and power of the Cordice brothers, Neil and Alan up front. It was a winning machine.

But Reading were shamelessly similar with manager lan Branfoot aping the Route One tactics of Watford, who had soared from Division Four to the top of Division One. The Royals were also brutally effective and in under-rated centre-forward Trevor Senior they possessed the top scorer in English football (31 goals that season) as they powered to promotion.

We remembered him as an awkward, gangly striker scoring for fun at Dorchester Town just a few years earlier, and his playing style saw him overlooked by all the big clubs. Nobody could understand why the 6ft 3in centre forward, who wasn't the quickest and not even very good in the air, had scored so often but he was an Andy Graham figure: blessed with an innate ability to hit the ball early, and hit the target.

His partnership with ex-Millwall striker Kevin

Bremner was key to Reading's success, while the 500 Stones fans among the 7,169 crowd (later reduced to 6,460, handily denying Stones that extra share of the gate money) teemed out of Elm Park at the end of the game utterly furious.

It was bad enough to have been missing our main strike threat in the Cordice brothers - plus top scorer Mark Graves - through injury, but astonishing that in the 67th-minute flashpoint (a late Reading tackle) the referee should have chosen to send off Bowgett and Derek Doyle with just Glen Burvill walking for Reading. The grainy video footage of the incident shows pushing and shoving between both sets of players after substitute Vinny Jones reacted angrily to Martin Hicks' clumsy challenge.

And that came after Stones trailed to a Dean Horrix penalty, awarded when Steve Richardson burst into the box and was obstructed by our winger Brian Greenaway. In those days, indirect freekicks were awarded for exactly that kind of foul... but Sussex ref Alan Gunn went for the more punitive option.

It was a brave, backs-against-the-wall performance by the depleted Stones but, amazingly, worse was to come as we drove home. The local radio station

crackled into life with its match report on the game and live reaction from Reading manager lan Branfoot who described Wealdstone as 'a bunch of

Even in the lead-up to the game, Branfoot had been vocal in the local and national Press about what a tough game it would be against the Stones 'robust' approach, while mentioning that we had had two players set off in a previous FA Cup clash - also at Elm Park - back in 1976. Despite it being a cleanly-fought game apart from the 67thminute dust-up, Branfoot led the assembled postmatch journalists into widespread and undeserved condemnation of the Stones.

Brian Hall's response (below, in the Harrow Observer) showed how furious he was at the Reading reaction.... while one Stones fan, Jon Irvine, actually turned his car around and drove to the studio of the local radio station to demand an apology for their comments.

There is no doubt that the club's reputation suffered as a result of the accusations. And from being non-League's top dogs just six months earlier, the Stones' long, slow drop into obscurity began....

The forgotten story of ... Reading's record start to the 1985-86 season

The Royals' remarkable run of 13 consecutive wins in Division Three helped set a League record that remains to

n August 1985, English football was in an horrific situation, persecuted by a government determined to crush its principal constituency and devastated by avoidable tragedies at Bradford and Heysel. What it needed was a start to the following season that reminded people why they bothered in the first place, and, incredibly, that was precisely what it got; Manchester United and Reading performed with a vim seen only once before and never since, Reading winning a resounding victory in the direct battle between the two.

That they inhabited opposite ends of football's own viciously capitalist stratification was of particular resonance. Through the summer, "the big clubs" had conducted themselves with customary grace, not so much throwing their weight as hurling their mass and threatening a breakaway that proved once again their donation of not a single intercourse for anything

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
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

















