

#### IN THE WORDS OF THE GAFFER: MATT TAYLOR'S VIEW

GOOD afternoon and welcome to our last game before the festive season and I wish you all a happy Christmas.

We have three games against clubs all grouped in our vicinity over the holiday period so we'll be preparing fully for each game (today, Boxing Day at Maidenhead and at home to Boston on New Year's Day) while not overdoing things.

The skill is to push training to a limit and in

our conditioning coach Wayne and the analysts I think we have the knowledge and ability to turn this squad into the fittest Stones side for a long, long time.

I think that's showed in the last few months: the minimum requirement is maximum effort and they are actually enjoying the suffering that comes with leaving everything out there on the pitch. They don't feel the pain when the results are going our way!

Last weekend the players had their annual get-together, staying over in Manchester. All very sensible, going out for dinner together and then spending Sunday together too and coming back in the evening. It's really important to build those bonds of friendship and you could see, judging by the mood at training on Tuesday, how beneficial it is.

It's a real shame that we came away with nothing from the Oldham game as it's heaped a bit of added pressure

on us to get a result today... but we will be well-prepared. We have a game plan and it's up to the players to go out there today and implement it.

As for Oldham, I thought the players were excellent for large periods of the game. We started extremely well and the game plan to press them high worked. Micah had a terrific match and I was so pleased with him, and for him. It's not easy coming to replace someone like Alex Reid.

We scored two goals and looked comfortable away from home to a team that (with the players they have) will be in contention, I believe, for automatic promotion come the end of the season.

The players response to the avoidable goals we conceded either side of the half time break was very good and we had

chances to go back in front.

I must stress though, that to be disappointed in losing 3-2 away at Oldham shows how far this team has come from the start of the season. We got the performance again, however we haven't got the result that we deserved.

And there was another hamstring injury collected at Boundary Park, with Josh Grant having to come off after an excellent first half performance. He's going to be doubtful today, along with Elliott Thorpe who has the same problems. On the flip side though, Craig Eastmond is back in training with the group and he will be an important player for us.

It's frustrating for me as many of our rivals have already begun to start freshening up their squads with new players; we are the mercy of the parent clubs of our loanees and me and

Steve (Boone) have spent the past few weeks in conversation with lots of clubs and players... there will be movement but often we're not in control of that situation. And we have to wait until January 1st before Premier League clubs are allowed to loan out their players.

Neither are we in control of the Alex Reid situation, with his loan running out on January 7th, but what I must say is that he's been a consummate professional and so important

to our recent good run of results. I believe we are still attractive to young players and we'll get the right people in!



# It's bad enough going all the way to Oldham without being stuck in a distant corner...



A LOT of mention has been made this season of our apparently declining away support.

Indeed, in recent seasons I've attended midweek fixtures at the like of Halifax, Altrincham and Rochdale and, yes, been a bit lonely. But despite the odd self-deprecating chant of 'Where's our fanbase gone?' I actually thought the turnout at Oldham last week was pretty good, considering the utter nightmare of pre-Christmas travel and the inevitable pressures to do 'other things' at this time of year.

For me, Oldham is just a relatively short hop across the Pennines and that was bad enough, jammed nose-to-nose on a standing room only Trans Pennine Express full of Christmas shoppers heading for Manchester and hoping nobody around me had Covid or the latest winter vomity virus.

In the nearly five years since we got promoted we've got used to playing the kind of opponents that would once have been dream draws in the FA Cup first round. So maybe we're getting blasé. Or more to the point, is the novelty wearing off?

On the tram back to Manchester I chatted to an Oldham fan who was full of praise for our team and

supporters. As of course he could afford to be, since, for once, we'd left the three points behind. Actually this is the norm since we have been allowed to travel post pandemic: fans of the big clubs have been unfailingly friendly and magnanimous, never mind that there's a bit of condescension towards 'little' Wealdstone.

This, of course, may all change if we start beating some of them more often. But the attitude of the supporters is in marked contrast to the attitude of some of the clubs they support.

When we moved to groundshare at Watford in 1991 we were optimistically and fancifully assured that there would be enough money left in the bank to build a team which would get us to the Football League and fill Vicarage Road.

My response was, if I wanted to watch League football at Vicarage Road I'd have supported Watford in the first place. The experience at Oldham reminded me of this.

We were allocated a 1,500-seat stand, and then get corralled into the most distant corner of it, with the worst view, not allowed near the front, not allowed behind the goal. The message is clear: away supporters are not welcome, and if you really must



turn up we're going to give you the worst possible experience in the hope you don't come back.

Oldham are not exactly unique in this.

Notts County were one of the most blatant offenders. I was actually threatened with ejection from the ground after suggesting, perhaps less politely than I might, that the stewards let us get to the front of our completely empty stand in order to greet our players and congratulate them on only losing 3-0. (Things didn't improve when I pointed out to the stewards that the match had finished and getting ejected wouldn't be too upsetting.)

Thank heavens for the likes of Altrincham, where we can still experience and enjoy the delights of non-league football in all its glory, staggering out of the bar two minutes before kick off and changing ends at half time. They are part of an ever dwindling band at this level. Now don't get me wrong. I don't long for the days of the Isthmian League, and the reason for that is I when I go to a match I want nothing more than to see Wealdstone win; winning is how we got to the National League and winning is what we all hope will keep us here.

Shortly before Manchester United's recent trip to Arsenal I was in the gym and overheard a conversation between a personal trainer and his pupil. The trainer was a Manchester United fan and the pupil wasn't very interested, and like 99.99% of Manchester United fans he wasn't actually going to this match (since we were in Sheffield and the match kicked off in two hours) or probably any others.

The gist of the conversation was that he'd rather Manchester United lost than drew, because although a win would be a good result for Manchester United, a draw would be a good result for Liverpool.

Just imagine a theoretical situation where, say, come the last game of the season, a win

for Wealdstone would see Barnet promoted.

The presence of the 'BELTs' in non-league football is a double edged sword, I won't tire of people saying, when I tell them where I'm going to watch the Stones, 'But aren't Oldham Athletic a big team?' and being able to reply, 'So are Wealdstone now.'

But the reality is we're a long way from truly being able to compete with teams who attract 6,000 crowds or have well-heeled benefactors. I'd like to see the back of the Oldhams and Southends of this world

As their fans are adamant, they don't belong here and it's just a brief interlude. Unlike Oldham and Southend, we are founder members and proud past champions of the National League. Wouldn't they love to be able to say that? **We belong here.**

#### THE No.10 VIEW: MAX KRETZSCHMAR TAKES IT TO THE $M_3$ $A_1$ $N_8$

HELLO all and a big welcome back to The Vale.

With our exits confirmed from both the FA Cup and FA Trophy, it's full focus on the league from here on in and I'm really looking forward to seeing what we can achieve in the next half of the season. We've played all but three teams in the National League so now's a good place to take stock and kick on.

We played Dagenham & Redbridge away in our first game of the season and I think we've come a long way since then. From memory, we had an injury crisis with 4-5 first team starters missing on that opening day. But we played well and there were moments in the game which would have ensured a win that day... but Dagenham did well and took the three points.

I think we are a better team now with goals and assists coming from numerous avenues. I did wonder at times early on in the season where a goal or two was going to come from but I have no such worries now. We have been free-flowing going forward and it's certainly frustrating that we've only picked up one point in our last two games against promotion-chasing Altrincham and Oldham Athletic having scored five goals!

Therefore it's clear that some defensive issues must be addressed to complete the final piece of the jigsaw.

Defending comes down to the whole team, not just the defenders. We have always

been a pressing team in my years here but I think we've added a great structure to our team in what we would call a 'mid block'. With a playing budget incomparable to some in this league, it is a formality that we will have to endure pressure in games this season. I think we now have a great balance in the team to win the ball high (as we did at Oldham Athletic for Micah's opening goal) and to sit off teams and be structured in our defensive formation. So to concede the goals we have in recent weeks has been frustrating.

I absolutely love the energy we have in midfield. Kallum Cesay is rightly taking the plaudits in recent weeks for his outstanding performances on and off the ball: I vividly remember him playing some great games towards the back end of last season and telling him: "You should be playing in the Football League in 12-18 months if you get your head and your body right!!"

Of course, I look forward to watching and playing with Kallum for many more games but I would be very proud to see him play at a higher level whenever that time comes!

Jack Wells-Morrision has been fantastic too. I think he's learnt a lot from his time here so far and has had to adapt and become a different

type of player to start week in week out in this team. His energy and tackling has stood out but those qualities haven't compromised his undoubted technical ability on the ball. I know this loan will be brilliant for his development as a professional footballer.

Dating back to the Braintree game in mid October, we have now put together eight performances in a row (in the National League and FA Cup) ranging from the good to superb.

I think that's really impressive.
We have found a recipe which is working and it's now time to continue that and churn out more positive results over the Christmas period and into 2025.

Today's opposition in focus

Despite only being in existence for 32 years, Dagenham & Redbridge Football Club have had their fair share of highs and lows their highest being promotion to League One following a 3-2 play off final victory over Rotherham United at Wembley Stadium.

The Club came about following a series of mergers which saw Leytonstone, Ilford and Walthamstow Avenue form Redbridge Forest who in turn merged with Dagenham FC in 1992 to form the current Club. All four had proud histories as amateur clubs in the past but due to dwindling attendances, had fallen on hard times.


The first season of Dagenham & Redbridge FC saw them finish third behind Wycombe Wanderers in the GMVauxhall Conference and reach the 1st Round proper of the FA Cup, where they were defeated 5-4 in a thrilling game against Leyton Orient.

Unfortunately after this things began to go downhill for the club especially off the pitch when a Trustee of the Club illegally removing half a million pounds which he was later convicted of. Money was now tight and the 1995/6 season saw the

Daggers finish bottom of the GM Vauxhall Conference and suffer relegation to the Isthmian League.

To ensure the Club didn't continue a downward trend Ted Hardy was appointed to stabilise it. and against all odds took the team to Wembley in the FA Trophy final unfortunately losing 0-1 in extra time to Woking having played for

an hour with only 10 men. League finishes of fourth, fourth



The Daggers installed Garry Hill into the hot seat and in his first season they returned to the Conference having romped to the Isthmian League title recording 20 victories and a draw from

their 21 home league games and an outstanding 101 points. The success story continued into the 2000/01 season as the Club achieved third place. The 2001/2 season saw the Conference championship

turned into a two-horse race with Boston United and the Daggers heartbreakingly missing out on promotion to the Football League on goal difference. The disappointment was made even worse when the Lincolnshire side were found guilty of illegal payments to players but the points deduction was carried into the following season. The following season saw the Club miss out on promotion to the football league for the second season running again by the closest of margins.


Garry Hill departed at the end of the following season and the Club turned to John Still for a second spell in charge. At the end of October the Club were ten points behind hot favourites Oxford United and a play-off place was seen as the best they could hope for, instead they kept up the pressure on the leaders and on the last day of 2006 they took top

spot in the League, a position they
wouldn't relinquish. On 7th April
2007, a 2-1 home win over
Aldershot Town gave them
the Championship and

with it a place in the Football League they had been so close to achieving in the past,

The 2009/10 season saw the Club reach the end of season play off's by virtue of a seventh place finish. In the semial first leg they broke vious play-off records

place finish. In the semifinal first leg they broke all previous play-off records with a six goal rout of Morecambe



and despite losing the second leg I-2, went through to the final at Wembley 7-2 on aggregate. 32,054 attended the final on 20th May and saw goals from Paul Benson, Danny Green give the Daggers the lead on two occasions only for the Millers to equalise on both occasions. Barbados international Jon Nurse struck the winner after 69 minutes as the Essex side continued their amazing climb through the football pyramid.

The size of the task facing the squad in League One was evident & despite all the odds the club went in to the last day of the season with fate in their own hands but with over 1,000 Daggers making the trip to London Road Peterborough ran out easy winner to condemn the Daggers to relegation.

Wayne Burnett signed a two-year contract as manager in May 2013 and in his first full season in charge led the team to a ninth place finish in League Two, playing a more attractive style of football in the process however a poor start to the 2015/16 led to his departure and the return to management of John Still.

The Daggers' 2016/17 season was an eventful season both on and off the pitch for Dagenham & Redbridge, with the Essex side almost returning to the Football League at the first time of asking only narrowly missing out in the promotion Semi-final to Forest Green Rovers. Daggers captain Scott Doe reached 300 appearances for the Club in March as well as the Daggers finishing fourth after being hit

with a number of first team injuries.

In 2019/20 The Daggers embarked on their 4th successive season in the National League, looking to build on the solid foundations that have been put in place by the club's investors, Trinity Sports Holdings. Peter Taylor departed the club after a run of poor form at the start of 2020, Daryl McMahon joined as Manager in early January, with Terry Harris and Steve Gritt his joint-Assistant Managers, and Dave Jupp arriving as Strength and Conditioning and First Team Coach.

Thanks to wins over Eastleigh, Solihull, Barnet and a massive 5-0 win away to Wealdstone, the east London side eventually finished 12th in the league. In the 2020/21 season, the Daggers also reached the second round of the FA Cup having beaten EFL side Grimsby 3-1.

In 2022/23 Dagenham finished in 10th position just 3 points ahead of Wealdstone.

Last Season the Daggers finished in 15th, 1 place above and level on points (55) with Wealdstone.

#### I. ELLIOT JUSTHAM -GOALKEEPER

he Daggers captain joined us after being released by Luton at the end of the 2015/16 season. Elliot previously played for Waltham Forest, Leyton, Redbridge, Brentwood Town, East Thurrock United and Luton Town. He made his Football League debut for the Hatters at AFC Wimbledon in February 20

League debut for the Hatters at AFC Wimbledon in February 2014. He kept his place for the remainder of that season having been a regular on the bench during Town's Conference title campaign the season prior.

#### 3. FRANK VINCENT - DEFENCE

Vincent joined the Daggers in 2023 and signed a two-year deal with the club. He joined following the expiry of his contract with Notts County, where he spent three seasons. Frank started his career in the youth ranks at Queens Park Rangers, before making his way to Barnet and then onto AFC Bournemouth. With Bournemouth, he enjoyed loan spells at Torquay United, Scunthorpe United and Walsall before joining Notts County permanently in July 2021.

#### 7. DION PEREIRA - MIDFIELD

Dion initially joined the Daggers in January 2024 on a six-month loan from Luton Town. The winger scored three goals in his first half-season, including a memorable goal away to Hartlepool, which earned the Daggers GOTM award for April. Pereira then rejoined the Daggers on a season-long loan from Luton on June 4th 2024.

#### 9. JOSH UMERAH - FORWARD

The 27-year-old centre forward was the second addition to Ben Strevens' squad this summer. Umerah joins the Daggers with a variety of experience in League Two and the National League. Umerah began his career at Charlton Athletic's academy and helped the under-18 side win the Professional Development League 2, finishing as top-scorer during the 2014/15 season. He made his senior debut for the Addicks as a 66th-minute substitute for Igor Vetokele in a Championship match against Hull City in January 2016. Following his first-team debut, the striker enjoyed loan spells at Kilmarnock, Wycombe Wanderers and Boreham Wood. After these loan spells, Josh led the line for Ebbsfleet, Torquay and Wealdstone before joining his most recent club Hartlepool in July 2022. At Hartlepool, Umerah won the League Two PFA fans' Player of the Month for January 2023.

#### 24. JUNIOR MORIAS -

The striker rejoined the Daggers on July 25th, signing a six-month loan deal from Notts County.
Junior previously joined the Daggers in November 2021. Whilst with us,

Morias won the National League Player of the Month Award for April 2022 having scored six goals in six matches, including a twelve-minute hat-trick against Barnet.

#### 21. OSCAR RUTHERFORD - DEFENCE

The 20-year-old right back was the first addition to Ben Strevens' squad this season, agreeing a deal until the end of the 2025/26 season. The young defender joins the Daggers with good experience in the National League with Eastleigh, making 77 appearances for the Spitfires over two seasons. Rutherford began his career at Plymouth's academy before making the move to Eastleigh's Elite Development Squad in 2022. Oscar then impressed during pre-season and earned a first-team squad number for the 2022/23 season.

#### 30. PAUL KALAMBAYI- DEFENCE

The 24-year-old was the seventh addition to Ben Strevens' squad, agreeing a deal until the end of the 2025/26 season. PK joined the Daggers with a wealth of experience in the EFL for Wimbledon, making 117 appearances for The Dons. After spells with Dulwich Village, Evolution Sports & Health Academy and Brentford, Kalambayi joined the academy at League Two club AFC Wimbledon in 2015. Despite being age 16, his rate of development saw him feature for the Development Squad before the end of 2015 and he was rewarded his first professional contract in February 2016.

#### 10. RYAN HILL - FORWARD

Hill joined in June 2023 from fellow Vanarama
National League side Eastleigh for an undisclosed
fee, where he spent the three seasons prior.
The 25-year-old spent his youth career at Stoke
City, before moving to Hampton and Richmond.
His performances there then secured him a move
to Eastleigh, where he featured 92 times, scoring six
goals.

Ted Hardy managed Dagenham &
Redbridge to the 1997 FA Trophy final.
He had two spells in charge of the old
Dagenham FC and also managed
Bishop's Stortford, Enfield,
Leytonstone and Ilford, reaching
the Amateur Cup final on four
occasions. After managing the
Daggers' reserves during John
Still's first spell as manager, he
rejoined the club as manager from
April 1996 until retiring in March 1999,

guiding them to three top four finishes in the Isthmian League. Granted a testimonial match against West Ham in May 1999, he was made a life vice president for all the work he had done for the club under different guises over a 30 year period.

#### **GARRY HILL**

PETER TAYLOR

Garry Hill managed a successful era at Dagenham & Redbridge. His managerial career started at Heybridge Swifts, leading them to the Isthmian League First Division (North) title in 1995-96. He then managed St Albans City before taking charge of Dagenham & Redbridge in May 1999. Plotting the Daggers' 1999-2000 Isthmian League Premier Division title triumph and three FA Cup runs, he led them to the Conference play-off final in 2002-03. He left in April 2004, then managed Hornchurch, Weymouth, Rushden & Diamonds and Woking, guiding them to the Conference

South title in 2011-12, since having a spell in charge of Ebbsfleet United.

#### **DAVE CUSACK**

Dave Cusack managed Dagenham & Redbridge to the Bob Lord Trophy semi-finals in 1994-95. Initially with Sheffield Wednesday, the central defender moved to Southend United in September 1978 and skippered their 1980-81 Fourth Division title triumph. He joined Millwall in March 1983, starring in their 1984-85 promotion success and FA Cup run, then was player-boss of Doncaster Rovers, Rotherham, Boston United and Kettering. After helping Grays Athletic to win the Essex Senior Cup, he managed Dagenham & Redbridge from May 1994 until September 1995, then was manager/owner of Basildon United and worked for a fire proofing company.

#### **GRAHAM CARR**

Ex-England Youth wing-half Graham Carr managed Dagenham & Redbridge during the 1995-96 campaign. Starting with Northampton Town, he featured in their meteoric rise to the topflight and joined York City in June 1968. He played for Bradford PA, Telford (1971 FA Trophy success), Poole, Dartford and Weymouth, then managed Tonbridge, Dartford and Nuneaton, rejoining Northampton as boss in April 1985 and plotting their 1986-87 Fourth Division title triumph. Later managing Blackpool, Maidstone, Kettering, Weymouth and Daggers from September 1995 until April 1996,

served Dagenham &
Redbridge in various
capacities. Initially with
Leyton Orient, he joined
Blackburn Rovers in





Different days, different ways:
When we faced Hendon
on a Christmas morning

TAKE a close look at the cutting above, from the Harrow Observer, December 1951. And particularly the caption!

Emancipation clearly hadn't hit the festive football scene with pictures of an entirely male audience crammed

into Lower Mead to watch the Christmas morning local derby with Hendon. While the wives, girlfriends and daughters were left at home to, presumably, prepare the Xmas lunch and tidy up

after the present-opening. Though some, clearly, weren't happy. "Many telephone enquiries were received from women supporters eager to know the score during the game".

Extraordinary!

And extraordinary to have over 7,000 inside Lower Mead for what was an Athenian League clash... although Wealdstone were the champions and Hendon our arch-rivals. The following season saw 5,000 inside the ground for the same game.

1963-64 was my first full season of supporting

the Stones and tales of these traditional home and away games against Hendon were legion. The first festive game would be played on Christmas Day morning with the return fixture on Boxing Day afternoon. Crowds for league games at Lower Mead at that time regularly topped 2,000, but the Christmas fixture would add on anything between 500 and 1,000 people to the attendance. I was told that the atmosphere around these fixtures was absolutely brilliant.

Unfortunately for me, at the end of the previous season Hendon had left the Athenian

League for the more powerful Isthmian League. For regular supporters of the time, losing the festive fixture must have been hugely deflating - and make no mistake, it had been a long-running annual grudge match.

The surprising Saturday morning kick-off for the FA Cup game against Wycombe two weeks ago sparked a lively conversation on the Stonescast 85 podcast between the younger cast members who were astonished that games had been played in the a.m. before. Dozens of times in fact!

Between 1945 and 1960, Wealdstone faced Hen-

don on every Christmas Day morning, most often with an 11.15 am kick off, except for Christmas Day 1949 and 1955 when the games were played on 26 th and 27th December. That is because Christmas Day fell on a Sunday for those years and legislation at the time didn't allow paid entry to watch participation sport on the Lord's Day. It seemed a little ironic that you could normally watch sport though on Christ's birthday!

Christmas Day 1960 also fell on a Sunday and then for some reason unbeknown to

me, the festive games for the 1961/62 and 1962/63 seasons were played against Hayes.

Once we were "promoted" to the Isthmian League in 1964, Christmas rivalry with Hendon resumed. Over the subsequent seven seasons until we left the Isthmian League for the semi-professional Southern League, I had the privilege of being at four of the Christmas morning fixtures at Lower Mead. Tales of the huge crowds and the unique atmosphere had been no exaggeration. Absolutely amazing. The two that remain most powerfully in

my memory are the first in 1964 when that magnificent Hendon side took our very good Wealdstone side to the cleaners by 6 goals to 3. The other was the last one in 1970 when on a snow-covered pitch, the talented and elegant Alan Pentecost equalised after the diminutive ex-Stone, John Wilson, had given Hendon the lead.

Watching your club in the snow on Christmas Day! For a teenager, how could life possibly get better than

that!

One of the joys of supporting Wealdstone at Lower Mead was the edginess of the crowd, but that seemed to dissipate somewhat on Christmas Day morning. The monster crowds appeared to be imbued with a sense of bonhomie that

permeated the occasion. In those days, every Stones defeat left me enraged and spoiled the rest of the day and beyond, but despite not beating Hendon even once during those Isthmian years, I never went home feeling the same level of disappointment. The magic of Christmas maybe?

We never again played a game on Christmas Day morning. Our first season in the Southern League offered up the glamorous and tantalising festive double header against Dunstable Town. From thereon, the Christmas/New Year games have fluctuated between the temporary local rivalry with Barnet, Enfield, Harrow Borough, Northwood and - when we were at our lowest ebb, Kingsbury Town - and the absurdity of games against Dartford and Dover.


While some have brought spectators out in greater than usual numbers and provided some memorable matches (such as the two stuffings of the Borough in

2007/08 and 2008/09, 5-1 and 6-0 respectively) most have largely passed me by.

The huge attendances and special atmosphere created by the Christmas morning games of the immediate post-war period are highly unlikely ever to be recreated. The social norms of the time were different to today - as seen by the Harrow Observer cutting on the previous page.

Men and boys would leave the house for a sound morning's football, while the mums, aunts and daughters stayed home to create the Christmas lunch. Our ability to see a match, partake in a couple of celebratory Mackesons in the Social Club and then roll home in time for the turkey, all the trimmings and the plum pudding are no more.

The festivities would continue with the post-lunch



doze on the couch featuring loud noises and noxious fumes. Eventually, this would be interrupted for the turkey sandwiches (again prepared by mum), dates, nuts, chocolate oranges, tea and mince pies... and all completed with the TV offerings of Christmas Night with The Stars, hosted on BBC by someone like Jack Warner of Dixon of Dock Green fame.

Pre-recorded 15-minute vignettes of established TV sitcoms starring Eric Sykes, Dickie Henderson and Harry Worth would be rolled out with the standard introduction from dear old Jack of, "Well, let's see what Harry Worth has been up to this Christmas". The good old days. Really?

This year's festive fixtures (and the Trophy draw at Aldershot, come to think of it) hit me like a dull thud. We face Dagenham & Redbridge today and then we're away to Maidenhead United on Boxing Day. I have nothing but respect for The Shots, The Daggers and the Magpies. They are all very fine clubs. I just can't get particularly excited about fixtures against teams who have over recent seasons become regular league opposition.

The lack of a that 'special' feeling is simply missing.

However: Boston United visit the Vale on New Year's Day and that meeting **does** stir the blood. We've not faced The Pilgrims since we were relegated from the Conference in 1988 and you cannot look back on a certain day against Boston, three years prior to that, without a big daft grin on your face. And I think that game might get a mention in this programme!



## Will this never END? Blimey, if only they had known this '68 Amateur Cup epic had barely started!

#### SATURDAY DEC 21 1968. FA AMATEUR CUP 1ST RD REPLAY: WEALDSTONE 3 HERTFORD 3 REPLAYS? What are they?

Any youngster, starting his/her footballing life as a player or supporter in 2024 might never see a replayed cup tie. And more's the pity.

As our game lurches towards the Americanisation of sport, where everything is settled on the day in an orgy of drama, many of us older fans will look back wistfully on days like this one 56 years ago.

Stones and Hertford had fought themselves to a standstill in this first round Amateur Cup tie, which had gone to extra time. The Athenian League visitors had held their own despite being rank outsiders to hold Isthmian League bigshots Wealdstone - who had won the trophy in 1966 and been beaten semi-finalists the previous season. But we'd end up playing Hertford as many times as the games we'd played to reach the semi-final at Fulham nine months earlier!

Yes, this game went to FOUR replays! The original meeting ended 1-1 on December 14; the replay featured here was played on Dec 21 and finished 3-3; then the teams met again at Lower Mead (we'd won the toss, as shown in the match report) on Dec 28 only for it to also end in a 1-1 deadlock; meaning a third replay at a neutral venue (Wembley FC's Vale Farm) on January 1st which of course ended in a 1-1 draw; before the teams were finally separated by a sole Dave Swain goal in the last replay at Hertford on January 4. Attendance: 1,663.

We went on to beat Cirencester and Hayes, only to lose the quarter-final 1-0 at North Shields with goalkeeper Andy Williams controversially sent off in front of a baying 5,118 crowd and little Charlie Townsend taking over the gloves. How we'd have taken a replay then!





# Trophy agony Stones

# Moore sees red as last-gasp goal denies Stones an upset

AN equaliser three minutes into injury time cruel-ly denied Wealdstone an PA Trophy upset on Toesday night in a dramatic finish to an incident packed game that the visi-tors finished with only ten men after having skipper Fergus Moore sent off. Wealdstone, who were without suspended leading

goalscorer Brian Jones. seemed set for a notable victory over their Premier Division opponents when they took the lead with a superbly taken goal by Stuart Kent with just four minutes to go.

# Let's have a repeat of last Christmas please.... and not haunted by Ghosts of Dagenham and Redbridge past

TUES OCT 27 1998. FA TROPHY SECOND ROUND: DAGENHAM & REDBRIDGE 1 WEALDSTONE 1. REPLAY: WEALDSTONE 0 DAG & REDBRIDGE 5 MAYBE it seems a bit strange to choose to remember this desperately unlucky Trophy defeat to red-hot favourites D & R a quarter of a century ago.

But, personally, it sums up our atrocious record against the East Londoners: when they were just plain old Dagenham, our head v head was halfway decent. I've bored you before with tales of the wonderful 2-0 FA

Cup win over the all-conquering Daggers of the 1970s at Lower Mead, with George Duck blasting a memorable clinching goal, and another 3-0 win at Victoria Road in the FA Cup final qualifying round in 1986. We also managed to overcome them with some regularity in the early days of the Conference.

But as soon as Dagenham merged with Redbridge Forest in the early 90s our ship was sunk. Until we beat them at Groscenor Vale in Februarey 2023 (with that surprise early goal from Ashley Charles) we'd chalked up no wins in 11 meetings in competitive games. We'd been knocked out of the FA Cup by the reformed side three times and, then KO'd in the FA Trophy in 1998-99 in this pair of matches that somehow summed up our ineptitude (and sheer bad luck) when facing the East Londoners.

I was working when the clubs met at Victoria Road for this FA Trophy clash 25 years ago but was heartened by reports on the club's email list
