



But he was buzzing with the unexpected win and so proud of the players who did all that he asked of them over the 90 minutes.

"After the goalless first half we were anticipating that Altrincham would come out strong so we were prepared to meet fire with fire - and then had the boost of Reidy's really good goal from Dom's (Hutchinson's) cross" he said.


"We had a really good spell but at the end we were defending with our lives. Our hearts were in our mouths when Alty's Matty Cosylo hit the bar in the final seconds of added time but I thought we deserved the win".

Neil is particularly pleased to have added "real quality" to the squad with the signings of Mustapha Carayol and Tyler Walker.

"They are both high standard players, experienced and confident so they had no problems being accepted into the changing

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

IN VIEW of last week's events here at the Eastleigh game the editorial team suggested I might make the theme of this column 'Great Wealdstone fightbacks'.

Problem is - and call it my glass-half-empty personality if you like - I can't think of any. Though I am assured they happened. But matches where we threw away an apparently unassailable lead? Now you're talking!

Who still has nightmares over that 3-4 FA Trophy defeat at Yeovil? Or more recently, Truro and the 4-4 after being 4-0 up? Matches you wished you'd not bothered with before the clock had ticked to five minutes?

Unlike most of you I actually attended (being match sponsor) the pandemic season home game against Dagenham when we were two down in three minutes. And Halesowen away - two down in five minutes so an eventual 5-3 defeat felt like a moral victory.

Sorry, do I sound like I'm revelling in misery here? Call me the Morrissey of programme notes.

Having endured every minute of our back-to-back 4-I defeats at Tamworth and Rochdale, last Saturday I found myself otherwise engaged in the North of England and consequently missed what obviously turned out to be a very exciting encounter with Eastleigh. 


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ALL YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT WOKING THE CARDS

Today's opposition in focus

Woking Football Club, known as the Cards (from the Cardinal red of the red and white halves), was formed in 1889.

The Club joined the West Surrey League in 1895/96, winning the title by one point on the final day of the season. However, within 21 years of being formed, the Club was in danger of folding for financial reasons. The turning point came when, in January 1908, Woking played Bolton Wanderers in the First Round of the FA Cup, having battled through five qualifying rounds. Despite losing the away game 5-0, the Club made it into the national press. Bolton Wanderers, impressed by the minnows they had defeated, travelled to Woking for a friendly match the following season, which kept the Club solvent.

In 1911 the Club joined the Isthmian League, maintaining their place in the top division for 72 years and finishing as runners-up to Wycombe Wanderers in 1956/57. That achievement was eclipsed the following season when, in front of a 71,000 crowd, the Cards beat Ilford 3-0 in the last FA Amateur Cup Final to be televised live. Sadly, the Club then went into decline, culminating in a firstever relegation in 1982/83. By the end of the 1984/85 season the Club had plunged to Division Two South of the Isthmian League. It was during that season that former player, Geoff Chapple, was appointed as manager. Although he was not able to save the Club from relegation, the renaissance was underway, lust missing out on promotion at the first attempt, the Club clinched the Division Two South title in 1986/87 and, after two third place finishes in Division One, they were promoted back to the Premier Division at the end of the 1989/90 season.

The next season saw the Club become part of FA Cup folklore. Entering the competition at the Fourth Qualifying Round, they beat three Conference sides to set up a Third Round tie away to West Bromwich Albion. Recovering from being a goal behind, Woking triumphed 4-2, thanks to a superb team effort and a never-to-be-forgotten hat-trick from Tim Buzaglo. To be drawn out of the hat with a home game against Everton was beyond everyone's wildest dreams. The tie was switched to Goodison Park and, against

a team packed with internationals, the sides were separated only by a solitary Kevin Sheedy goal. Over 34,000 people remained in the ground to give the players a rapturous standing ovation.

Promotion to the Conference was achieved in 1991/92. The Isthmian League title was clinched in early April, with seven games still to be played.

The FA Trophy was won in 1994, 1995 and 1997 and the Cards also achieved five successive top five finishes in the Conference, including being runners-up in

1994/95 and 1995/96, ish.

Significant events had taken place off the field. The downturn in the Club's fortunes had led to a financial crisis. With the Club facing administration or worse, successful businessman and long-time fan, Chris Ingram, came to the rescue, becoming Chairman in February 2002. He continues to own the ground, with the Club enjoying a 125-year lease at a peppercorn rent, but his financial backing of the Club and involvement in its running ceased at the end of the 2010-11 season.

The Club went full-time in the summer of 2003. The fans' hopes were borne out by a much better season, with the Cards achieving a ninth place finish, having been on the fringe of the play-off places until the last few weeks. Again, only a poor finish the following season deprived the Cards of a play-off place, but a final placing of 8th with 68 points was the best achievement since 1997/98. Disappointingly, the Cards failed to mount a challenge for a play-off place in 2005/06, finishing in 11th place. 2006/07 was another season of underachieving and, despite bringing in fresh faces during the January transfer window, d the Cards finished in 15th place.

The following two seasons produced more disappointment, culminating in the Cards' relegation in summer 2009 from the BSP after 17 years in the top flight of non-League football.

In the 2011-12 season, the Cards reached the top spot in late September and stayed there throughout the campaign. The BSBS title was won by nine points, with only five games lost all season.

The Cards finished in a comfortable 12th place in their first season back in the Conference Premier, playing an entertaining brand of football, and did even better the following season, ending in 9th place after showing great form in the second half of the campaign. The 2014-15 campaign saw the Club



finish in a commendable 7th spot, missing a play-off place by only three points. Garry Hill maintained his record of top-half finishes the following season as the side ended in 12th position. But the summer of 2016 saw the loss of some experienced players and the side struggled throughout the 2016-17 season, eventually averting relegation thanks to generally improved form from the new year onwards, finishing in 18th place.

Summer 2022 saw an influx of new players, including established EFL players such as Padraig Amond and Scott Cuthbert, as the Cards found themselves in a playoff race from September onwards.

After a superb run in October and November saw Woking pull away from the chasing pack, cementing themselves in fourth place, the signing of Rhys Browne from Wealdstone proved to be excellent business, with the striker scoring 13 goals in total.

Woking eventually finished fourth, and were edged out in their first ever playoff game by Bromley in front of a full house, but Sarll has continued to add to his side, with playoffs very much the aim again in 2023-24.

Last Season Woking finished in 17th possition one point and one place below Wealdstone.

Will joined Woking in February 2023. The Finnish youth international has Football League experience, most notably with Crewe Alexandra, where he made close to 100 first-team appearances. He moved to AFC Wimbledon in the summer of 2022, but injury prevented from making a league appearance, and he was released in January. His father is former Premier League goalkeeper and Finnish international Jussi laaskelainen.

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
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Milestones MICK FISHMAN WITH A BIT OF A HISTORY

Through all the glory years we were competing as equals...but will that ever be the case again?



I TURNED on the wireless recently and tuned into the Home Service (that's Radio 4 to you youngsters) where the journalist and former ping-pong player, Matthew Syed, was presenting a programme looking back at the

first 25 years of this millennium and how much life had changed over the period.

With that theme in mind, I thought it might be interesting to compare where Wealdstone FC is now compared to our position a quarter of a century ago. The march of time is an odd experience. To me the year 2000 seems like yesterday. To younger supporters it must seem like the Stone Age. However fast time has or hasn't moved, there can be little doubt that much has changed at Wealdstone Football Club.

The most important issues facing a football club relate to the here and now. For us it is the current squad and doing our utmost to retain our place in the National League, closely followed by progress in securing a new stadium. But a football club of stature, which we are, also encompasses its history, good or bad, up or down. We have recently celebrated 125 years of existence, and I thought it would be interesting to take a brief look at where the club stood at its birth, and then at 100, 75, 50 and, finally, 25 years ago. That I can do so is only possible due to the diligent research Roger Slater undertook to produce his book celebrating the club's centenary back at the turn of the century.



125 YEARS

ROGER'S research demonstrated that a Wealdstone football team existed in various forms from 1887 and, 125 years ago in early 1900, Wealdstone were most of the way through their first season as a club competing in Division 2 of the Willesden & District League. They finished 3rd behind champions, Brigade Institute and runners up, Roundwood Rangers. Clubs of our type and vintage almost always started life playing in junior and intermediate level football, and that is where we found ourselves.

The club's first ground was a field straddling Headstone Road (now Harrow View) and Marlborough Hill with dressing room facilities provided by invitation of the landlord of the Queens Arms in Wealdstone. The facilities at Grosvenor Vale are relatively primitive in relation to most in the National League, but almost palatial compared to those faced by the club's pioneers of 125 years ago. The playing kit colours were black and white hoops.

100 YEARS

FAST FORWARD 25 years to early 1925 and the club had progressed significantly. Following the 1st World War, the club moved into senior football and by the 1924/25 season were in their 3rd term competing in one of the senior amateur competitions of the time, the Spartan League. No longer playing teams such as Metropolitan Railway, Harlesden Primrose and Stanmore, the

opposition now contained more familiar names to the modern football follower, like Chesham United (who became champions that year), Walthamstow Avenue, Maidenhead United, Aylesbury United and Botwell Mission (later to be renamed Hayes). Of equal importance was the fact that the rapid growth of the club following the Great War had seen it move from its previous home in Belmont Road (part of where Byron Park is now) to a new facility in Lower Mead, a stadium beloved by all supporters old enough to have seen the us play there. The team finished that season in a rather uninspiring 10th position from a division comprising 14 clubs.

75 YEARS

MOVING forward another 25 years sees the club in a different place. Having left the Spartan

League for the more powerful Athenian League in 1928, the club had done no more than consolidate itself in its position both geographically and at the level in which it was competing. All that changed in 1936 when we started signing players of pedigree in the amateur game, most notably full back Arthur Loveday, prolific goalscorer Charlie Bunce and inside forward Ken Baldwin. The team went from strugglers near the foot of the table to challengers for the title. By the outbreak of war in 1939 Weald-

to win the Athenian League. That ambition was shattered by the war. Many of the pre-war players failed to return to the club whilst others, such as Charlie Bunce and Ken Baldwin, lost their lives in the conflict. The club had to rebuild which they did rather well. The 1948/49 season saw the club enjoy its best performance (to that point) in the FA Amateur Cup by reaching the Quarter Final, stage where they drew 0-0 at holders Leytonstone, before going down 0-4 in the replay in front of a crowd of 13,500, a record that would remain for the rest of the club's tenure at Lower Mead.

stone were one of the favourites

The following season, 75 years ago, would see the club being one of the better performers in the Athenian League and having experienced its best ever run in the FA Cup. The team saw off Hendon, Enfield, St Albans City and Edgware Town before meeting powerful Southern League professionals, Colchester United, in the 4th Qualifying Round, A 1-0 win in front of over 9,000 spectators at Lower Mead set up a 1st Round away tie at Football League side, Port Vale. The heroic 1-0 defeat saw goalkeeper Danny Wiltshire concede his first and only goal in the tournament that season.

Wealdstone Football Club was now a known entity and respected club in senior amateur football, and this team already had in its ranks 6 players who would play a significant role in the squad that 2 seasons later would carry off the Athenian League title for the one and only time. In addition to keeper Danny Wiltshire, full back Charlie Barker, centre half Charlie Edmonds, right half Gordon Norman, inside forward Bill Roberts and winger Alan Benningfield were already in-situ. The Athenian League of the time, while regarded as just short of the status of the Isthmian League, was a powerful division and winning the title was a significant achievement.

The club's heyday as an amateur club was undoubtedly the 1960s when it moved up into the elite Isthmian League and carried off the coveted FA Amateur Cup in 1966.

50 YEARS

BY the time we reached the next milestone, 50 years ago, the club had been a semi-professional club for 3 seasons and was enjoying its first season in the Southern League Premier Division,

having won the Southern League Division I South title the previous term.

We were now swimming in a pond of very big fish. Big old Southern League beasts awaited us. These were heady days and the players who had got us promotion all remained for the challenge along with the added stellar signing of John Morton (left), then acknowledged as the best goalkeeper outside the Football League. John had been a part of the Dartford team

that the previous season had been Southern League champions and defeated FA Trophy finalists.

This was a brief golden era for the club. With players of the experience and presence of John McCormick, Eric Burgess and Terry Dyson; the trickery of John Henderson; the sheer talent and promise of Chris Kinnear, John Watson, Ray Fulton and Bill Byrne; and of course the incredible goal-scoring talents of the incomparable George Duck, this was a terrific time to be a Stones fan. But it

was brief. As injuries, retirements, transfers and loss of form took their toll, the team plateaued through the rest of the decade. Nevertheless, the club, having taken the big decision to turn professional in 1971, was now established as a senior semi-professional outfit. One of the best outside the Football League.

25 YEARS

WHICH brings us nicely to the last milestone – 25 years ago, the start of a new millennium. In reality, it was a minor miracle the club was still in existence. Since being at the very pinnacle of non-league football by winning both the Gola League and the FA Trophy, the subsequent 15 years had seen the club lose its beloved Lower Mead home, be a part of a huge property fraud that had resulted in the club being placed in administration, relegated twice and taken voluntary relegation down a further 3 divisions in order to survive, and being effectively homeless having to be tenants ground-sharing at Watford, Yeading and Edgware Town.

The club had pulled off a minor coup by persuading successful young manager, Gordon Bartlett (right), to move across from Yeading. His first 3 seasons in charge saw the team achieve 2 promotions. There should have been yet another promotion when the club finished 3rd in the Icis League Division I, but in a devastating decision a ground-grading issue prevented the club stepping up. That had been just the season before this one and the effect was to almost implode the club. From a 3rd place finish, the team stumbled to 16th place in 1999/2000. For those who remember the period it was a desperately unhappy time; but the players gave their all and we should all remember players like Paul Benning, Steve Bircham, Phil Dicker, Carl Holmes, Noel Imber, Brian Jones, Paul McKay, Dominic Sterling, Danny Tilbury, Lee Walker, Chris Walton and many others with thanks and affection.

The turn of the century heralded in 8 years of hard slog through the Ryman League Premier and First Divisions, mostly doing our best to retain our status on little money, a crumbling White Lion Ground and then a deeply depressing short period at Northwood.

So, 25 years on and where does the club now find itself?

In short, a very good place. During the first 10 years of the new century 2 things happened which had positive long-term consequences. First, the team scraped past Dulwich Hamlet in a "promotion" playoff for membership of the Ryman Premier League. The second, more important, moment was the club moving into Grosvenor Vale following 17 years of homelessness. Since taking occupation of The Vale in 2008, the club has achieved 2 promotions, being title

winners on both occasions, and are now members of the non-league elite competition, the National League - albeit tenuously at the moment.

It's worth pausing to take that in. We have been at the top of the game three times in our past.

First, in the mid-1960s when a member of the most senior league in southern amateur football and winners of the coveted FA Amateur Cup. Second, when part of the Southern League Premier Division between 1974 and 1979 when that league was then the most senior non-league competition in southern England. Third, when members of the Gola League between 1982 and 1988 during which we became the first winners of the non-league "double".

It has often been expressed that, having been promoted to the National League 5 years ago, we had returned to the level from

which we were relegated in 1988.1 don't think that is quite right. None of the "big" clubs against whom we were competing in the 1970s had previously been members of the Football League and none were full time.

Since promotion in 2020 the club has been competing in a league largely

comprising full time football clubs, several of which could only been described as big ex-EFL teams. In the 4 plus seasons since promotion we have competed against outfits like Wrexham, Notts County, Chesterfield, Stockport County, Oldham Athletic, York City, Rochdale and Halifax Town. This is a very different football environment to the Southern League of the 1970s and the Gola League of the 1980s.


Perhaps we have become a little blasé. Three or four years ago we enjoyed a collective sense of awe when our club was taking the field against some of these huge clubs and, remarkably, standing toe to toe with them. Now we look to take points off any or all of the biggies despite the huge differences in facilities and playing budgets.

When the club hit its peaks in the early 1950s, mid-1960s, mid-1970s and early-1980s, we were a club competing amongst equals. That is far from the case now.

In order to be able to do so, we will have to pursue vigorously new investment and a new stadium. Until both are achieved we will continue to be a small fish swimming in a big pond, and as a result are vulnerable to losing that status.

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AWAY FANS FIRST UP, SHAUN STEVENS HAS STRONG VIEWS

Your name and age? Shaun Stevens, 53. I have been following the Shots since 1978.

Aldershot had a good run in the FA Cup last season after narrowly avoiding relegation, and again this year it's been cup success (FA Trophy) that has caught the imagination. Why has the league again been disappointing? Last season's league campaign was excellent up until the last five games. However, over the summer we lost three key players in Stokes, Tolaj and Mnoga and have unfortunately failed to replace them with players of similar quality. Tommy Widdrington chose to spread the wage bill across a larger number of players to try and give us greater strength in depth. We've also been a little unlucky with injuries - James Henry has real pedigree but is ageing and has regular absences, while the likes of Ollie Harfield, Dejan Tetek, Luke Jenkins and Ollie Scott have all suffered longer-term injuries. Fortunately some decent loan signings have helped us to stay just clear of

Do you think Shots will prevail in the Trophy in two weeks against your biggest rivals? Of course! In some ways this is the biggest game in the history of the

the drop zone so far.

'new' club, as no Aldershot team has ever made it to Wembley. Our Surrey neighbours have been there before, so won't have quite the same level of incentive and motivation. When you add in the home advantage, I'm optimistic that we can get the job done.

Did you see the Shots v Stones games earlier this season?

I was at both games and what a contrast they were! Stones acquitted themselves really well in the initial League game, out-working us and taking a deserved three points. However, I think we learned a lot from it and were able to change our approach and tactics for the Trophy game. We were much more 'ourselves' that day and eventually won it with a bit to spare.

How many shots fan will travel today? We typically take about 200-250 to midweek away games in the London area, so that's what I'd expect for this one.

Have you seen a Shots game at Grosvenor Vale? What did you think of our patchwork home? I was here in the 90s for a

game against Ruislip Manor but the place has changed a bit since then. I came back last season and really enjoyed it. It's a 'proper' non-league ground with the turret, the slope, fans very close to the players and all | line antics and interview com-

the mish-mash of stands and buildings. It has an endearing quality and a decent atmosphere that takes me back to our days in the Ryman League (in a good way), so please don't change it! The only issue was the pitch which was in a very poor state that day and certainly didn't help the quality of football.

Who are the Shots' key performers? A theme of this season has been a lack of consistency across the playing squad, although things have been better in this respect since Christmas. Josh Barrett has all the skills and has scored some absolute pearlers. but he has also been anonymous in many games. Players like Tyler Frost, Ryan Jones and Jack Barham offer bags of energy but not always with an end product. Perhaps our most consistent performer has been Marcus Dewhurst, your old keeper.

Is Tommy Widdrington still flavour of the month? Tommy is rapidly becoming 'marmite' with the fans. He is clearly very passionate and has a great backroom team, but he makes some odd team selections at times and doesn't endear himself to supporters with some of his touch-

ments. The continual inclusion of his son in our midfield, irrespective of form, has become a bone of contention for many fans and it needs to be sorted out for next

When was your first Aldershot game? What are your memories of it? I first watched the old Aldershot FC way back in December 1978, when we beat Doncaster Rovers 2-1 at home. I was only six years old and remember almost nothing about the game itself, but I do recall having tea from a flask at half time and being absolutely hooked!! We had a big powerful Scottish winger called Murray Brodie who kept smashing his way through the opposition full back and he was my first football hero.

How many Shots games have you seen this season?

I'm a season ticket holder so I go along to every home game. My away trips this year have been restricted to just a few of the more local games so far, but apart from tonight I have plans to visit York and Barnet, and of course Wok-

ing on Easter Monday. What are the three most memorable Shots games you've ever seen? That's a tough one! An earlier game that lives with me is our 3-2 win over Sunderland at the Rec in the old Division 3 back in 1988 which was capped off by an absolute banger of a winning goal from Steve Berry. The League Cup game at home to Manchester United in 2011 was really special despite the defeat. And our trip to Swindon last season, finding ourselves 7-0 up after an hour, is one I will never forget. Do you expect the Stones to

record only their second 'double' of the current season over the Shots tonight? I'm sure it will be a tight game. I

think we may have the tactical upper hand after the Trophy win, but with the league table as it is I know Stones will be scrapping for everything. The Shots have been one of the National League's draw specialists this year, so maybe that's the most likely outcome. Can you tell us about plans to

upgrade The Rec, and how

do you feel about that? This is something I'm very opinionated about! I feel the commercial model behind the plans is fundamentally flawed, as the development is split into two phases, only the first of which will be funded as things

The problem is that it includes nothing that will generate new income streams to finance the second phase so we will be left with a half-finished project. Also, the designs presented to fans seem really poor, as they fundamentally change the layout and 'feel' of the ground, paying little regard to the heritage of the club and failing to make the best use of the land avail-

I would very much like to see the Chairman go back to the drawing board by issuing a new brief to the development partners and architects that addresses these points. If the redevelopment can't be done right, it shouldn't be done at all. Like many others, I've put in my comments but the quality of fan engagement leaves a lot to be

memorable in recent years (sorry) for how badly we played before snatching the late winner. Ironically the subsequent win over Welling in the play-off final felt quite anti-climatic after the semi-final drama.

Beating Aldershot Boxing Day 2022 after so many disappointing results against them was a great moment. (Hopefully soon to be repeated).

Do you expect the Cards to record a 'double ' over the Stones today? I hope so but we've not done many league doubles over teams this year.



Paul Canoville. The game changed instantly and by the 85th minute Chelsea were leading 4-3. A last minute foul gave Wednesday a penalty and the game ended 4-4. Chelsea won the toss and seven days later we completed the job by winning the second replay 2-1. Unfortunately, our long awaited trip to Wembley was thwarted by Sunderland and in particular, Clive Walker.

And the best Wealdstone game?

I don't have many in the locker to pick from but it has to be Barnet away at the end of last season. Barnet dominated us for pretty much the full ninety minutes but only led 1-0 as we entered nine minutes of added on time. This was due to the Barnet goalkeeper taking an absolute age to restart the game at every opportunity. We equalised in the 8th minute of added on time. The whole experience was made ten times better when I watched Dean Brennan's meltdown of an interview on the following Monday. He was blaming the referee

and everyone else for his timewasting tactics. It was also better because of his past association with Wealdstone.

Who introduced you to the Stones? During my bowling career I used to hear a lot about Wealdstone from Tony Waller. When I finished bowling and took up running, I was reintroduced to Wealdstone by Steve Paull. Tony has been watching Wealdstone since the 1980s I believe and Steve is part of a group, that I now stand with, who go back to the seventies. Hearing that these two had been so loyal for so long, I thought that I would start watching Wealdstone more this year to see what all the fuss was about.

Which level of football do you prefer? I like watching foot-



And where do you think the Stones will be in five years' time? I hope that Wealdstone are settled in their new stadium and are pushing for promotion to the Football League....







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
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












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ALL YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT ALDERSHOT TOWN THE SHOTS

Today's opposition in focus

Aldershot Town were formed on 22 April 1992, after the demise of Aldershot FC in March of the same year. Joint club founders Graham Brookland and Terry Owens were assisted in this huge undertaking of the creation of a new club by the Supporters Club and the wider fan base, and it was a joyful celebration on the opening day of the 1992-93 campaign when Shots' very first visitors were Clapton Orient, a match which the home side won 4-2.

The "new" Shots began life in Isthmian League Division 3 and opened the 1992-93 season in a carnival atmosphere at the Recreation Ground against Clapton. Braces from Mark Butler and Steve Stairs secured a 4-2 win in front of 1493 fans, which was more than watched their predecessors' last home game at the same ground. The campaign finished with the Shots as champions by a commanding 18-point margin, whilst strikers Mark Butler and Steve Stairs scored a combined total of 62 goals in all competitions.

A second successive promotion (via a thirdplace finish) followed in 1993-94 together with a run to the FA Vase quarter-finals.

Steve Wignall departed in January 1994 to take charge of Division 3 side Colchester United and was replaced by ex-Nottingham Forest winger Steve Wigley. Despite a strong finish to the 1994-95 season, the Shots missed out on a third successive promotion on goal difference. Following fifth- and seventh-place finishes over the next two seasons, Wigley left to take up a post in (former club) Forest's youth set up in the summer of 1997.

Following a spell under the caretaker management trio of Andy Meyer, Mark Butler and Joe Roach, Enfield boss George Borg was appointed in September 1997 and his first season yielded increased crowds and the Isthmian League Division 1 title. In 1998-99, the Shots won both the Isthmian League Cup and the Hampshire Senior

Cup. In 1999-2000, they retained the latter trophy, won the Isthmian League Charity Shield and ended the campaign as runners-up to Dagenham and Redbridge in the Isthmian League Premier Division.

A fourth-place finish was claimed in 2000-01, whilst November 2001 saw a club record crowd of 7500 fill the Rec for

the 6-2 defeat by Brighton and Hove Albion in the FA Cup first round. Following a run of poor results and pressure from fans, Borg resigned in mid-January 2002.

Borg's assistant Stuart

Cash took temporary charge before Terry Brown left his post at Hayes in late March to come to North East Hampshire, thus beginning a five-year love affair with the Shots fans. Following a third-place finish and a third Hampshire Senior Cup win in 2001-02, the squad was overhauled and, having attained top spot in mid-November 2002 the Shots remained in top spot to claim the title and, with it, promotion to the Football Conference; they also retained the Hampshire Senior Cup.

Disappointment followed in 2003/04, when the Shots were beaten on penalties by Shrewsbury Town (after a 1-1 draw) in the play-off final at Stoke City's Britannia Stadium.


More play-off heartache was experienced in 2004-05, this time in the shape of a shoot-out defeat at Carlisle United in the semi-finals. The next two seasons were disappointing for the Shots (13th and ninth places respectively being secured).

In March 2007, Terry Brown resigned to take care of his wife, who had been ill for some time. Assistant Manager Martin Kuhl took caretaker charge for the remainder of the season.

in 2012-13 Former Rotherham United boss Andy Scott was brought in but couldn't stem the tide and relegation back to the Conference Premier (the club's first such event) was confirmed at end of the season as the Shots eventually finished rock-bottom of the table.

On May 2nd 2013, just five days after their relegation from League 2, Aldershot Town officially entered administration with reported debts of £1.4 million.

The Shots began the 2013-14 season with



a 10-point deduction as a punishment for the aforementioned entry into administration. With a hastily-assembled squad (some of whom were signed in the hotel the night before the season's opener at Grimsby Town)

On July 31st 2014, Aldershot Town announced that they had paid off all of their debts, which enables them to exit the auspices of the CVA after just 12 months – a massive two years ahead of the required date! The icing on the cake came with the additional news that the club had made "a modest profit" in the first year of trading under the new owners.

The 2015-16 season was another one of disappointing performances with the Shots finished the campaign having scored just 23 home league goals, equalled the club record for fewest home league wins (7) and most home league losses (12) as well as setting new club records for most league losses in a season (22) and lowest average home league attendance (1607); the season was also the fourth in succession in which the aforementioned crowd figure had dropped.

A new-look side for 2016/17 secured fifth place in the table and a Play-Off semi-final against Tranmere Rovers. Unfortunately, The Shots lost the home leg 3-0 but at least restored a great deal of pride with a battling 2-2 draw in the Prenton Park return.

In 2017-18 the squad picked up where they left off and spent the majority of the season challenging for the title eventually finishing 5th in the table losing to Ebbsfleet in the play offs.

2020/21 saw the Shots placed 15th & 2021/22 placed 20th.

Over the summer of 2022, Mark Molesley put together his squad for the coming season and big wins were garnered over Boreham Wood, Barnet and FC Halifax Town before the team began to slide down the table, ending in Molesley's dismissal after a 2:0 FA Cup qualifier defeat at Chelmsford Town. Academy manager Ross McNeilly was put in caretaker charge and after a run of five wins from eight, was given the role on a permanent basis. until the end of the season.

Current Shots manager Tommy Widdrington has been in charge since 2nd April 2023.





5. CHRISTIAN **MAGHOMA- Defence**

Christian Maghoma signed for the Shots in July 2023. The centre-back was formerly at Eastleigh where he made 42 appearances over two seasons.

The 25-year-old has made a senior appearance for the Democratic Republic of Congo and came through Tottenham Hotspurs' youth ranks. Maghoma has also spent a couple of seasons abroad with Polish side Arka Gdynia where he made over 30 appearances in the Polish Ekstrakalasa (top division).

6. THEO WIDDRINGTON- Midfield

Theo Widdrington signed from Kings Lynn for an undisclosed fee. The midfielder played 40 times and scored six goals in the National League North last season after joining them in 21/22. Widdrington has also played for Havant &

Waterlooville and Bristol Rovers, as well as spending time at Portsmouth.

7. CAMERON HARGREAVES - MIDFIELD

Hargreaves signed for the Shots in June 2024. The midfielder came through the youth ranks at Exeter City before joining Bristol Rovers where he made 20 Football League appearances. He gained loan experience with Hungerford and Chippenham before joining Kings Lynn towards the end of the 21/22 season before making his stay there permanent. Hargreaves will be familiar face to Tommy Widdrington and a number of the Shots first-team, having linked back up with his manager at previous club King's Lynn Town.

8. TYLER FROST- Midfield

Tyler Frost signed for The Shots in February 2023 on a free transfer after leaving Harrogate Town. Capable of playing anywhere across the midfield, the 23-year-old brings with him Football League experience, having made 37 League Two appearances with Crawley Town and 13 appearances in the same division with Harrogate this season.

9. KAI CORBETT - Forward

Kai Corbett joined the Shots in July 2024. Born in Barcelona, Corbett came through the youth ranks at West Ham before joining Peterborough in 2021 and has spent time with Barcelona, Arsenal, Chelsea and Southampton at youth level. Corbett impressed with

18. OLLY SCOTT - DEFENCE

Olly Scott signed for the Shots in August 2023. Scott previously played under Tommy Widdrington at King's Lynn Town and made over 40 appearances in the National League and National League North. The left-wingback has also played for Blyth Spartans and Consett AFC.

22. JACK BARHAM - Forward

Jack Barham signed for the Shots in March 2023 from Maidstone United. The 27-year-old fired the Stones to promotion from the Vanarama National League South in 2021/22 with 18 league goals and has had spells with Dorking Wanderers and Barnet.

27. JAMES HENRY - Midfield

James Henry joined the Shots in August 2023. Henry spent the 23/24 season with Oxford United, who he joined in 2017/18, and made 14 appearances for the now Championship side as they won the League One playoffs last season and made a total of 260 appearances for them. The midfielder started his career with Nottingham Forest and earned England under 19 caps as a youngster and has had brief spells at Norwich, Bournemouth, Reading and Bolton. Henry has made over 200 appearances in the Championship and his longer stints at Wolves and Millwall saw him surpass a century of appearances.


28. MARCUS DEWHURST- Goalkeeper

THE National League is a relentless beast and one of the most competi-

tive football divisions in the world.

Here we assess the likely points target required to survive the dreaded trapdoor. The table below shows the last 10 National League seasons and Points Required to Stay Up (PRtSU) totals. Four of those seasons (2021-22, 20-21, 19-20 and 18-19) come with caveats with several teams reprieved and the two Covid affected seasons where relegation was scrapped or the divisions smaller. But the average PRtSU for the 'standard' six season is 49.3. If that is to be the case this season. Wealdstone need to find 14 points from our remaining eleven games. We are currently picking up 1.03 points per game. but to hit the magical 50 point mark, we need to hit around 1.27.

The basis of any survival campaign needs to be based on a solid defence and the loss of

THE SPRING of 2014 was a great time to be a Stones fan: we were playing Saturday-Monday-Saturday-Tuesday-Saturday-Monday (and even with the occasional county cup match on a Thursday) for 10 weeks, and won virtually every game!

From trailing the powerful Maidstone and Dulwich sides by a few points at the turn of the year we were suddenly catapulted a dozen points clear at the top of the Ryman Prem table with games in hand... and the trip down to deepest Sussex to face Lewes somehow summed up the invincibility of Gordon Bartlett's side II years ago.

"It was a hectic schedule but you never feel tired when you are winning" said the Stones' iconic striker Scott McGleish when I spoke to him last week. He was the person I really wanted to ask about that game as he scored one of the greatest Wealdstone goals of all time.. but it wasn't preserved on film or video!

"I know, the best-goal you've never seen" laughed Scottie when I pressed him for details of that stunning strike.

I'd not seen it either: The game was one of half a dozen matches rained off at the last minute in a desperately wet January, and I wasn't able to make the midweek trip when it was re-arranged.

Though we still had 120-odd travelling fans in the crowd of 356 in the picturesque surrounds of the Dripping Pan.

There were plenty of gloating comments on social media later that night as the clinching third goal was pored over by those lucky enough to have witnessed it. The official match report merely talks of "35 yards out on the right, with one touch, his shot curled into the top corner leaving goalkeeper Rikki Banks helpless".

So let's ask Scottie, who has the remarkable distinction of being the only outfield playing in British football to have featured in over 1,000 competitive matches. He's also scored 358 goal, for clubs as diverse as Charlton Athletic, Orient, Peterborough, Colchester, Northampton, Bristol Rovers,

Wycombe Wanderers, Barnet, Chesham and so on and so on.

He totalled 112 appearances and 44 goals for the Stones. And he was top scorer this 2013-14 season with 23 goals. And I recall him scoring a sumptuous overhead kick to win a tight game at high-flying Kingstonian in December. So was the goal at Lewes really the best?

"Blimey, yes" said Scott. "It was the timing more than anything. We'd had all those tough games in quick succession and were desperate to win the league and go up automatically, after the heartbreak of the play-offs the previous

"So although we were 2-0 up at Lewes going into the last third of the game (Tom Pett and Luke Pigden with the goals) they were pressing strongly and might have made it 2-1. Then Wes Parker, I think, or maybe Jimmy Hammond played a ball into the channel to the right of the box and I was being chased and closed down

by a defender... I knew I had to hit the ball early and it arrived right at the angle of the 18-yard box, sitting up perfectly.

"I didn't have the legs to do much else so I just struck the ball as hard as I could

and it sailed beautifully over keeper Rikki Banks, who'd played for us the previous season,

and pinged off the far post, just under the bar and bounced back into the middle of the net. You could hear the noise as it went in off the post and it killed the game, there and then.

"Sometimes it's good to play games thick and fast as you have a good momentum when you're winning".

We had lost successive league games at home to Hampton and then at Canvey Island at the turn of the year - but then, until the surprise defeat at the Met Police in April we won 13 and drew 4 of the next 17 games! The title was in the bag.

Scott was a huge part of that extraordinary Wealdstone team and he says that he'd never been part of such a tight-knit group before. "Every one of those 20-odd players contributed to the success; none of us felt like we were just bit parts".

He had just turned 40 that season but there was no doubt that he could still score goals at that

level. He'd been lured across from fellow Ryman side Enfield Town where he'd scored 12 goals in 13 games - and he was still potent in his mid-40s as the Stones established themselves in the National League South, especially alongside his fellow semioctogenarian Jefferson Louis!

"Jeff kept changing his age but I'm sure he was a bit older than me!"

Now at the age of 51, Scott still turns up wearing his boots as assistant manager to Fergus Moore at Leverstock Green in the Southern League Division One Central Division, Levvy are struggling in their first season at that level but have an exciting addition to their squad: Stones loanee leffrey Sekyere who scored one goal and assisted two others in the 4-1 win at Enfield last weekend.

"I'd like to pass on some of my knowledge to Jeff, who had a terrific second half after an apprehensive start, but it's so hard getting the players together at training when they are all working and, in Jeffrey's case, travelling up from South London by

public transport. But he's showing a lot of promise". Scott now works full time for the Professional Footballers' Association (having been part-time during his non League career) and looks after seven pro clubs with special focus on their players'



brain health.

"There is growing attention now on dementia among ex and current players, and related causes" he says."It used to be thought that the older, heavier balls was the biggest culprit but now the lighter balls travel much faster so there is now no difference between the damage that can be caused."

Scottie, of course, spent his whole career heading the ball - and even had his head split open by a challenge at Hayes & Yeading ten years ago."! had stitches put in, wore a bandage and was back playing a week later. I wouldn't advise players to do that these days!"
